# Wiltse to Collect Old Eyeglasses for Needy

Those old or unused eyeglasses which many people have lying around the house are urgently needed by the poor the world over, according to Wilard Wiltse of Wiltse Mortuary.

Wiltse has volunteered to collect discarded eyeglasses for distribution by New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., a non-profit, non-sectarian organization in Short Hills, N. J., whose sole purpose is to help provide better vision for those who cannot afford to buy glasses them selves.

Wayne residents who wish to help this worthwhile cause may bring their discarded glasses to Wiffse Mortuary, where they will be wrapped and sent to New Eyes. Or just call the mortuary and a staff member will pick them up.

According to Wiltse, New Eyes, founded in 1932 by Mrs. Arthur Terry, collects eyeglasses, broken jewelry and pieces of precious metal. The work of sorting, testing, overseas packaging and acknowledging the hundreds of thousands of pairs of glasses received each year is carefully done by volunteers in donated quarrers.

"All metal-framed glasses and jewelry are sold to a refinery," Wiltse said, "and the redeemed cash is used to purchase new prescription glasses for the indigent. Unbroken (re-usable) plastic-framed glasses are tested and sent abroad to medical missions and charitable agencies that are equipped to dispense them properly."

Witse went on to say that metal frames in any condition, unbroken plastic frames (with or without lenses), sunglasses, artificial eyes, cataract lenses and soft cases are all needed by New Eyes.

# **Budget Committee Indicates Coming Appropriation Need**

ceoia, was elected vice chairman.

Sen. Don Thompson, McCook, told the group that a "great deal" depends upon its dectsions. He warned that the future of public power "has been placed in your hands."

Thompson was chairman of the interim committee which drafted LB 220, the bill creating the board.

Gerald Gentleman, general manager of the Platte Valley Public Power and Irrigation District, told the board that the power agencies are "100 per cent behind you. You, must go slowly and not try to gobble too much at one time or more confusion will resulf."

Nonpartisan Legislature

The legislature has given 33-7 approval of a resolution urging voters to think before signing a referendum petition seeking a constitutional amendment for electing legislators on a partisan hasis

electing legislators on a partisan basis,
The resolution was introduced hecause of a referendum campaign by the Federation of Republican Women. It noted that members of the Unicameral have been elected to a nonpartisan basis since 1935 and added "this has worked out very well in pinpointing the responsibility directly to the individual member in each legislative district."
Leaders of both political parties have long advocated a return to a partisan legislature.

Sunday Closing Law

The legislature's budget com-nittee has given some indication what it will recommend in the ay of appropriations for state overnmental agencies during neart two years. Sen Richard Marvel, chair-tain of the committee, has actiched in a general way what, to lawmakers can expect when the massive budget bill hits our desks.

the massive budget bill hits their desks.

The summary given by Marvel shows state agencies asked for \$103,979,993 from the general lund. The committee sliced this to \$89,085,732. For the biennium ending June 30, a total of \$81,108,533 was appropriated.

In addition to being \$14,914,261 below what the various departments asked, the total is also \$3,510,345 less than the governor recommended. At the same time the total will be nearly \$8 million more than the 1961-63 appropriations.

The committee's special during fund levy will be for collection of nearly \$12 million from his source, compared with some \$7.5 million for the current bien-

nium.

According to the committee calculations, the state mill levy against property could remain fairly close to its present level. Helping to supply more financing for the increased budget will be added revenue from higher horse racing, cigaret, liquor and insurance taxes. Approximately \$10 million more is expected to flow to the state treasury from those sources.

flow into the state treasury from these sources. Some of the senators have anx-Some of the senators have anxiously awaited a report from Marvel's committeee. There was some fear that bills enacted into law calling, for increased state spending might cause the state property levy to spiral. After Marvel's summary, a number of the lawmakers said they were pleased with the budget committees work.

work, ere was still some senti-, however, for introduction ment, however, for introduction of more revenue-producing measures. Late last week four bills were brought into the senate, which Sen. Jules Burbach said would bring the state \$3 million a year. The bills called for a five per cent amusement tax, a \$50 tax on each coin-operated cigaret vending machine, a three per cent fax on stann sales by per cent tax on stamp sales by ixing stamps to cigaret pack

All were turned down except he last one. Burbach said lower-ng the fee to the wholesalers rom five per cent of three and one-half per cent of the tax would save the state \$140,000 annually. save the state \$140,000 annually. With the increase in the tax from four to six cents a package, the wholesalers will still be getting paid more than they were before the tax hike. Burbach said

said.

Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scotts-oluff, said he believes the budget oill debate can be wound up in two days.

### Power Committee

Sunday Closing Law

A bill proposing a statewide
Sunday closing law won strong
preliminary endorsement in the
legislature after hours of heated
debate and a lot of parliamentary maneuvering.

The measure, LB 710, was
sponsored by Sens. Maurice Kremer, Aurora, and T. C. Reeves,
Central City.

It survived two kill attempts
handfly and was given first round
approval by a 28-7 margin.

As amended, it provides that
so-called "mama-papa" stores
employing no more than two persons, including the proprietor,
may remain open Sundays. (

Some 85 items are listed in the
bill as among goods which can
target the state of the content of may remain open Sundays.
Some 65 items are listed in the
bill as among goods which can
lawfully be sold on Sunday.
A key provision jis that those
who "conscientiously" observe
the Sabbath as a day of rest may
remain open on Sundays, but
they will have to keep their businesses closed on Saturdays.
The bill does not disturb existing Sunday closing ordinances.
Opponents argued that the
measure had strong religious
overtones, which Kremer denied.
He said "religion has no place
in this bill... the family is what
we are thinking about."
Kremer and Reeves said the
basic question involved was economic and not religious.
Sen. Carpenter tried to get the
bill amended so that local communities could have voted on the
Sunday closing question. His effort failed. The new public power review board—faced with the challenge of setting the state's public power problems—has received votes of confidence from the legislature and the industry.

The legislature confirmed the appointment of five men to the board by Governor Morrison.

Musk thistle was first noticed in Nebraska in 1948—in Washington and Nemaha counties—and declared a noxious weed by the legislature in 1959.

Musk thistle is now widely distributed over castern Nebraska. Infestations are common in pastures and waste areas. Many weed districts consider musk thistle their number one problem.

thistle their number one prob-lem.

Experimental plots on musk thistle control were set up by Un-iversity specialists in Nemaha and Richardson Counties in 1987. Some of the questions currently being asked by farmers help bring out some of the facts about this weed and techniques in controlling it:

Q. How can Musk Thistle be identified?

A. Flowers of the Musk Thistle



A. Flowers of the Musk Thistle are large, attractive, and deep reddish purple in color. A solitary head on the end of the stem "notes" or hangs do wn as it grows in size. There may be up to 40 or 50 heads per plant. The deeply-cut leaves have a light green midrib which tends to be translucent. Each leaf segment is spin-etipped; the leaves continue onto the stem. Plant height varies between two and five feet.

Q. How can I control Musk

Q. How can I control Musk nistles in pastures?

A. Early treatment, followed by repeated applications, is ne-cessary to achieve satisfactory control. In most years, treating with 2,4-D ester prior to May 10 is necessary in southeastern Ne-braska, with treatments recom-mended 10 days later as one ap-proaches the South Dakota bor-der.

proaches the South Dakota border.

Treatments delayed until the stem begins to lengthen generally result in unsatisfactory control. Thus, it is important to make 2.4-D treatments on the rosettes of the plant in either spring or late fall. Treatments should be repeated for two or more years.

Chemicals other than 2,4-D will kill the plant, but are more costly and many of them will kill desirable grasses.

Recommended rates of application are one pound of 2,4-D ester in October and one to two pounds of the same material in April or early May.

Q. How can a neighboring

farmer be induced to control musk thistle?

A. As musk thistle was made a noxious weed through an act of the Nebraska Legislature, organized noxious weed districts have the authority to treat noxious weeds where no efforts are being made for their control by a landowner. Charges for treatment can be collected in the same manner as taxes if the landowner fails otherwise to pay for costs of treatment.

Red Spider Mites

Warm weather conditions have resulted in more rapid development of red spider mites than normal.

As they develop on evergreens and oramental plants, they can be reduced with sprays of several miticides such as chlorobenzilate, aramite, dimite, ovex, kelthane, tedion or genite.

Weed Control in Soybeans

The huttric acid derivative, 2,-

Weed Control in Soybeans
The butyric acid derivative, 2, 4DB (Chipman's Butoxone, Amchem's Butyrac) is harmless to sovbeans when applied at the rate recommended by the manufacturer. It will kill small broadleaf weeds in soybeans but if the weeds are as high as the soybeans or higher, there may be some doubt whether 2,4DB will knock them down enough to be profitable.

The 2.4-DB formulations should be especially effective for use on soybean fields where cocklebur is a serious problem. Al rates recommended for controlling cocklebur, certain other broadleaf weeds such as pigweed and annual morning glory will be suppressed or partially controlled. While some temporary, malformation of soybean plants may occur, there will be no permanent effect on the crop.

Apply from 7 to 10 days before bloom up to mid-bloom of soybeans. Do not apply earlier than this stage of growth. Follow carefully the manufacturer's instructions for rate and method of application.

Committments to USDA by various supplying counties have assured a supply of sugar exceeding that of last year by half a million tons.


