

ZIP Code Adds Speed Mail Service

The number 68787 has just been added to your address if you live in Wayne. If you live in Carroll, you can add the number 68723 and if Concord is your address, add the number 68728.

These are the five digit ZIP Code numbers announced this week by the Postal Department.

In the Wayne instance, Postmaster Don Wightman said, everyone in Wayne is to use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail. The same is true in all towns who have their numbers now.

The new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery goes into effect July 1.

Postmaster Wightman stressed

the importance of all citizens learning their ZIP Code number and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

It should follow the city and state in the addresses. As an example the following is the proper use of ZIP Code.

The new ZIP Code plan for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading. The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get to the proper destination. Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity of human error.

With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined and to speed it on its way. This can cut up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery.

Wightman said when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence.

All heat is turned off April 15th in hotels and public places, regardless of comfort, and patrons just have to make the best of it. Belgium and Germany came next, where we made the first trip of the season up the mighty Rhine River, used more commercially than the highways. We went to Cologne, Heidelberg and through the Black Forest region all on excellent highways built by Hitler during World War II and still in the best of condition.

Then into Switzerland which was very beautiful and mountainous. Also Liechtenstein, and Austria with people and customs similar, and all very thrifty and immaculately clean. Windows and streets were being scrubbed in preparation for the Easter holiday.

From here, our tour took us into the Southern countries, which began to present a very different mode of living. The two weeks

New Corn Reseal Program Points Told by ASCS

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced a corn reseal program under which farmers can obtain extension for a year of current price support loans on farm-stored corn, according to Wayne County ASCS chairman John Mohr, and corn storage payments, after the loan maturity date July 31.

There will be no reseal program for 1962-crop soybeans.

The corn reseal program provides for extension of price support loans on corn of the 1962, 1960 and 1959 crops, said Mohr. Also under this program, farmers may convert purchase agreements on the 1962-crop farm-stored corn to reseal loans.

Loans, said Mohr, on the 1961-crop farm-stored corn were made extendable last year by July 31, 1964.

Price support loans on 1958-crop stored corn will not be extended beyond July 31, this year.

Loans extended on farm-stored corn under the reseal program, announced today, will mature July 31, 1964.

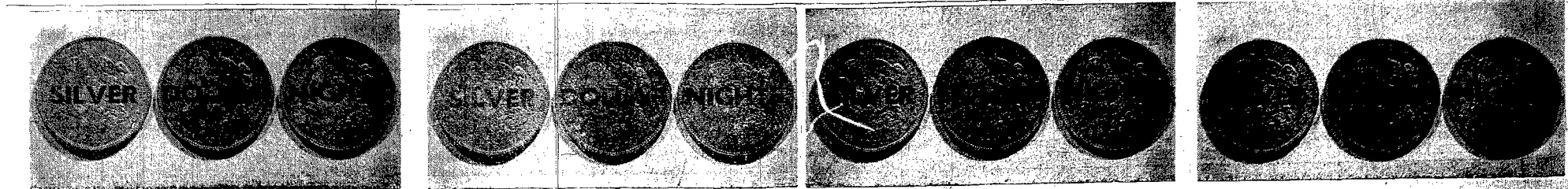

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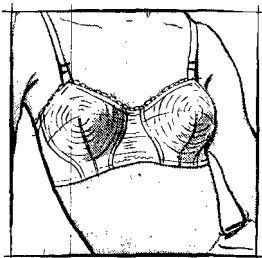

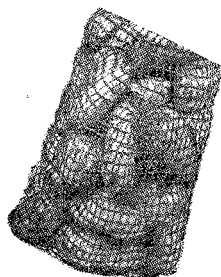

(Continued from page 1) spent in Italy gave us a very limited amount of time to absorb the many interesting scenes of Old World culture, art and customs to be found there. All these are commercialized and played to the American tourist and provide a better living to hundreds of needy people. Venice is different indeed, with no cars, just boats everywhere and houses only a foot above the water line and always damp and moldy. On to Florence, then Rome, the capitol and historical city, also modern and very wicked. Tourists really suffer here. The cleverest criminals in the world congregate here at hotels and airports to prey on the Americans. But all these things are overlooked when you look back at history and historical accomplishments from B. C. like some of the old Roman aqueducts and bridges which are still in use, and much of the irrigation system of Caesar's time still in good repair. Five days in Rome was only enough to hit the highlights of the famous ruins, cathedrals and art museums, etc., so we moved on to Naples, Pompeii, Isle of Capri, Genoa, Monte Carlo and the Principality of Monaco. Then a two-hundred mile drive along the Italian Riviera to Barcelona, Spain, where the group was entertained at the world famous arena, the only one of its kind in the world, their national sport being bullfighting. This was really very colorful and indescribable, and considered one of the highlights of the trip. Valencia—real Spanish country with walled-in cities and farm places all Moorish influence. Then through Sierra Nevada mountains where gypsies live in caves also other natives by the hundreds. Granada, our next stop with the famous Alhambra and Alcazar and orange groves cover the mountain sides here. To Seville and Lisbon, Portugal on the River Tagus, then Estoril, the most elegant beach resort on the Riviera patronized by all European royalty. Lisbon has the most artistic and elaborate flower gardens of any place in the world. From here we visited the Shrine of Fatima where we met the first people making the pilgrimage for May 13th, all walking, carrying camp supplies on their backs, others carrying cripples, with 60 miles to go. We roughly counted several thousand. Also stayed in Lourdes, another world famous shrine and saw a candlelight parade of 10,000 and hundreds of wheel chair patients all hoping to be cured or helped at this shrine. Almost unbelievable. Next, to Spain's Coimbra University, the greatest seat of learning for the past 700 years, where students still dress in old traditional scholar costumes. And to Madrid, a very modern city, Casfile and the Basque country and San Sebastian all small farms and fruit, few herds of cattle, lots of farms where stock is raised for the bull rings. Portugal and Spain were the most thrifty and different countries among the 12 visited, and their people the kindest and most pleasant. France, our last of the program, included Poitiers through the Loire Valley to Chartres and its old cathedral of finest stained glass windows in the world to Paris in the evening, and it was really gorgeous. Thousands of huge horse chestnut trees lined the streets over most of the city, all in bloom and really a sight to behold. Parks and flowers everywhere and so many places of interest. We spent two days at the Louvre and just skimmed over the familiar and important interests there, which included the Mona Lisa, and by the way, we were the only ones viewing her at the time. After a week in Paris, we sailed from Cherbourg which has all the concrete pill boxes still standing on the beaches from world war times and still serving as a national defense. It was a wonderful trip, with each country furnishing different scenery, people, customs, living conditions and food. Some countries as much as 200 years behind America. Our hotels were all first class and some very luxurious with food plentiful and good in general. Our group of seventeen enjoyed it all very much and have many wonderful memories for the years to come.

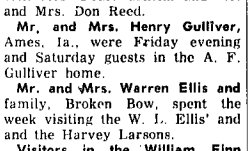

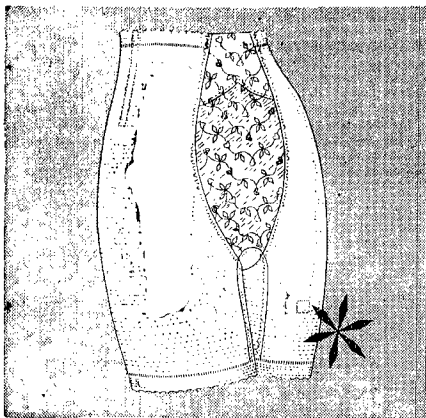

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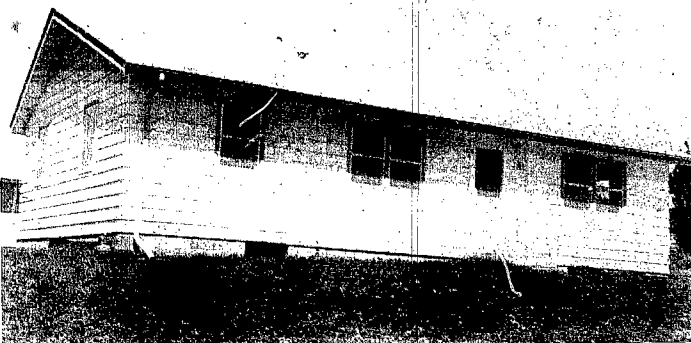
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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The prime purpose behind a Planning Commission is to provide directed progress. To help happen what is beneficial to the community (even at a county-wide level) and to prevent from happen-

The city council is the logical place to start the ball rolling for a Planning Commission, and the city dads should remember they can ask for help, too.

Everyone has to commit a few blunders in order to understand his own limitations.

Capitol News . . .

Budget Committee's Bill to Trigger Debate on Spending

One of the largest and most important tasks of the legislature will be tackled this week when the budget committee brings in its appropriations bill.

Debate on the committee's spending recommendations traditionally spices the final days of every session.

Once the bill is thoroughly reviewed and thrashed out, the lawmakers can ease up as they wait for and their other late measures to get shaped up for final consideration.

Before the senators got a look at the budget bill, they received proposals in connection with LB 439, which would hike the special state building fund levy from 1.1 mills to 1.75 and would earmark the money raised for specific projects at specific locations.

The budget committee figures a levy of 1.75 would raise approximately \$12 million during a two-year period.

This marked the first time that a bill calling for earmarking of the building levy funds has been submitted. Past practice has been to give each of the agencies participating a certain percentage. But each agency was free to use the money in the manner it thought best.

Monday marked the 116th day of the session, and it has become obvious that the lawmakers want to wind up their work and get home as quickly as possible.

Two years ago, the session stretched out 126 legislative days. It appears that unless the legislators get bogged down they might be able to wrap up their remaining tasks in less time than that.

It will be necessary for them to take some time off, however, to give the enrollment and review committee a chance to catch up on its work. The budget bill, after it has been amended, will also have to go back to the printer. Since the measure is so lengthy, it will take some time for the printers to complete the job.

for \$30 per pupil state aid for students enrolled in approved courses in the public high schools. Private and parochial school students could also take the course in the public schools under an amendment incorporated into the measure.

Sen. Edward Danner of Omaha tried to put the ax to the bill, but lost out on a 15-21 vote. He and others think that the responsibility of teaching youths to drive rests first with the parents.

Proponents of the bill, however, said not all parents are good teachers. They also said the cost of the program would be more than made up by lower insurance rates and fewer accidents on the highways.

Among those speaking out for the bill was Sen. Clifton Foster, Bradshaw, who formerly taught driver training in the Stromsburg high school. He said none of the more than 80 students who took the course have ever been involved in a major accident.

Kill Anti-Advertising Bill

The legislature has killed a bill seeking to ban "untruthful, impossible, improbable or misleading" advertising in connection with the sale of ophthalmic articles such as eye-glasses. The bill would also prohibit the advertising of prices of eyeglasses.

The bill motion came from Sen. Dale Payne of Papillion. He said, "A bill of this nature should be given careful study before being considered."

Sen. Sam Klaver of Omaha said the bill "was a mistake in the first place."

According to Payne, the proposal was an attempt to discriminate against competition. He added the bill "would affect every industry and news medium in the state and should not be passed without a careful, definite study."

Tourism Promotion

A majority of the lawmakers have made it abundantly clear they do not want to establish a separate office or department of tourism promotion.

They killed a recent bill asking for creation of a separate office of tourism and, in effect, left the promotional activity in the hands of Mel Steen's State Game Commission.

At the same time, the senators made it plain that if the commission doesn't perform adequately in this area in the next two years, they will be agreeing to try a new approach in 1965.

Steen has argued that he already has the machinery and personnel to do an effective job, but that he has lacked sufficient funds. The 1961 legislature appropriated only \$25,000 for tourism promotion. From remarks on the floor, it appears the commission will be given between \$50,000 and \$100,000 for the 1963-65 period.

Probably helping most to kill the separate tourism office bill was the argument that the change would necessitate the spending of much additional money. Sen. George Syas of Omaha pegged the figure at approximately \$220,000. Sen. Leroy Babensky of St. Paul estimated the total cost might approach a half million dollars.

Counselor Discharged

A senior counselor at the Kearney Boys' Training School has been discharged.

State Institutions Director George Morris said the dismissal was made by Kearney Supt. William Ettinger for policy disagreement reasons.

The person discharged was William Stidham, who has been offered a job at the Men's Reformatory near Lincoln.

In backing up Ettinger, Morris said he could not see "how a superintendent can keep a man who disagrees with the implementation of basic philosophy."

Ettinger employs what he describes as a "relaxed discipline program." Under it, he said, the boys have considerable self-discipline "and have to reason why they made their mistakes."

The superintendent said the program is difficult for some employees to adjust to. But he added he believes it works out best for the boys.

To Set Season

The 1963 Nebraska upland game and waterfowl seasons will be set by the State Game Commission Aug. 19.

Hunting dates and bag limits will be set on pheasant, quail, prairie grouse, cottontail rabbits, ducks and geese.

A split duck season is expected to be discussed. An official of the Nebraska Council of Sportsmen's Clubs last year requested such a season.

Issues Challenge

The question of whether the legislature should be returned to a partisan body keeps popping into the news. The GOP chairman Robert Denny of Fairbury challenged Sen. Arnold Ruhnke of Plymouth to explain why voters of the 22nd district should not be able to vote on the issue.

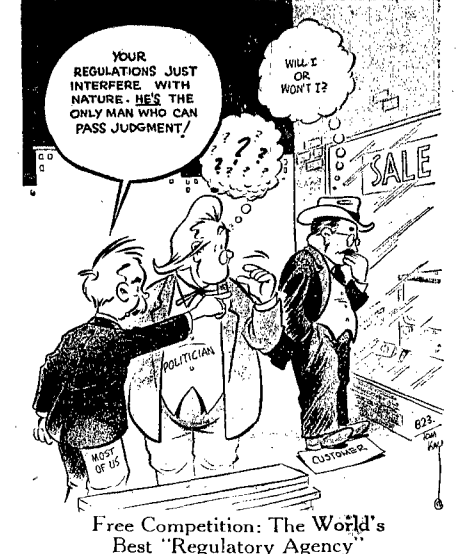
Ruhnke has been prominent among legislators who have urged Nebraskans to think before signing a petition being circulated by the Nebraska Federation of Republican Women. The petition is aimed at permitting voters in 1964 to ballot on whether the Unicameral should be converted into a partisan body.

Denny said: "As a constituent living in Sen. Ruhnke's district, I feel he owes me and the other residents of the district an explanation of why it is wrong for

Extension Notes

Don't Mix and Match Floor Waxes

Many people do not realize that two partially used cans of a self-polishing floor finish—the kind that dries shiny—should not be combined to save space. Different brands have different formulas and there may have been a change in formula between two packages of the same brand because of continuing improvements in the product, according to Mrs. Jerre Withrow, Extension housing specialist at the University of Nebraska.

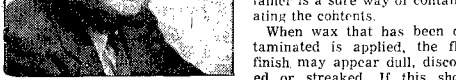
If you are in the habit of pouring some of the wax in a flat pan into which you dip your applicator, never put the leftover portion back into the container. You are almost certain to pick up some dirt or foreign matter on the applicator pad, and this would end up in the pan. Pouring the unused liquid back into the container is a sure way of contaminating the contents.

When wax that has been contaminated is applied, the floor finish may appear dull, discolored or streaked. If this should happen, remove the wax by scrubbing thoroughly with hot water and suds, or a commercially prepared wax remover.

Tornado Safety Rules

At this time of year when tornadoes can strike at anytime, Elvin Schultz, Extension specialist in Rural Civil Defense, advocates these rules:

1. Plan with the entire family where to take shelter.
2. Make a practice of listening to a morning radio weather report.
3. Watch the sky for conditions that indicate a tornado.
4. If you are in an open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.
5. If you are in a city or town: seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows. In homes, the southwest corner of the basement usually offers greatest safety. If the house has no basement, take protection under heavy furniture against inside walls, away from windows.
6. The safest place to be when a tornado strikes is in an underground shelter. This may be a storm cellar, a cave or some other underground excavation.
7. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited.

A Good Breakfast Starts The Day Off Right

What can I do to prevent that mid-morning slow-up? How can I avoid that tired feeling in the afternoon? How can I improve my concentration and efficiency on the job?

Katherine Cooley, University of Nebraska Extension foods and nutrition specialist, says that a good breakfast is the answer to these questions for many people.

Folks who have an adequate meal before work get more done than those who skip or skimp breakfast. The usual break or snack between meals is not an adequate substitute.

A good breakfast provides protein, vitamins and minerals needed to build and repair the body and to keep us healthy; it provides fuel and energy; and not the least in importance, it tastes good.

There is no hard-and-fast rule on the ideal size breakfast. But for most people, particularly children, it is well to ensure that breakfast accounts for a fourth to a third of the day's total food intake. Be sure to include good protein food such as eggs, meat, or milk.

ling equipment that may contain old grain.

Empty bins may be sprayed with methoxychlor or premium grade malathion. Methoxychlor may be used at the rate of 1 1/2 cups of 50 percent wettable powder to one gallon of water or premium grade malathion at the rate of one gallon to 25 gallons of water.

It's important to spray all surfaces such as the bottom, top and sides. Apply plenty of spray until it starts running off and force spray into cracks.

If grain protectants are used, apply one pint of 57 percent premium grade malathion in 2 to 4 gallons of water to 1,000 bushels of grain. It is important to use fresh chemicals of premium grade. Avoid using agricultural grade or premium grade chemicals that have been stored for any period of time since undesirable odors may result. Follow package directions and make sure for the malathion label calls for use of stored grain.

Phoebants Are Hatching

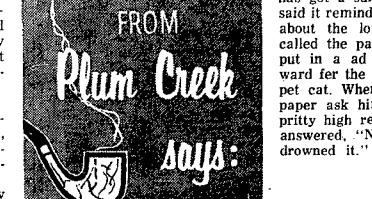
If you want to assure a good pheasant crop in 1963, avoid disturbing nesting areas at least until July 4.

That's the suggestion from Howard Wiegars, member of the University of Nebraska Poultry department.

He says that if this is an average year, the 1963 pheasant crop is hatching like popcorn these days. Normally the peak hatching period is realized in June.

It is during this period that mowing and spraying of roadsides and weed patches probably takes its greatest toll of potential pheasants. Mowing nearly always results in the killing of some hens and the destruction of nests.

Therefore, all persons who wish to assist in a successful pheasant hatch should avoid disturbing nesting cover until at least July 4. This delayed date will give even the late hatches a chance to emerge successfully," Wiegars states.

Q. Please discuss emphysema. Is it a progressive disease and can its progress be stopped?
A. The term emphysema (pronounced em-fy-see-mah) is derived from the Greek word "emphysan," meaning to blow in. Pulmonary emphysema is a condition in which the air sacs of the lungs become dilated or enlarged. The chronic condition may be due to chest deformity, chronic lung infection, chronic asthma, and similar conditions. Much can be done for the relief of symptoms of chronic emphysema but it isn't a condition which lends itself to anything but good medical care. See your physician.

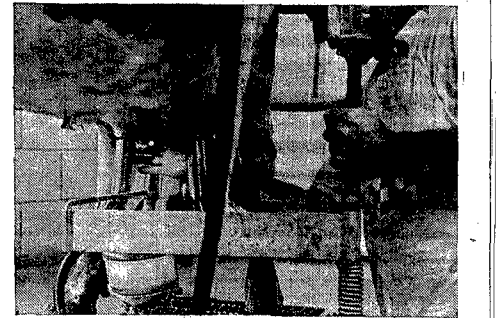

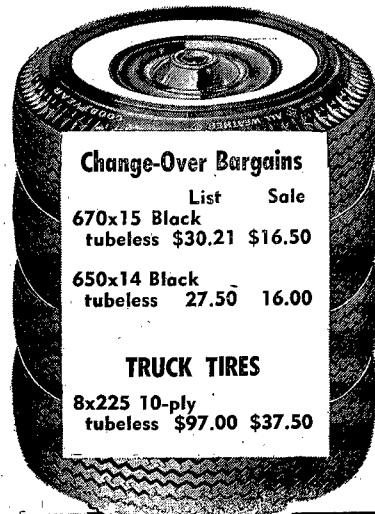

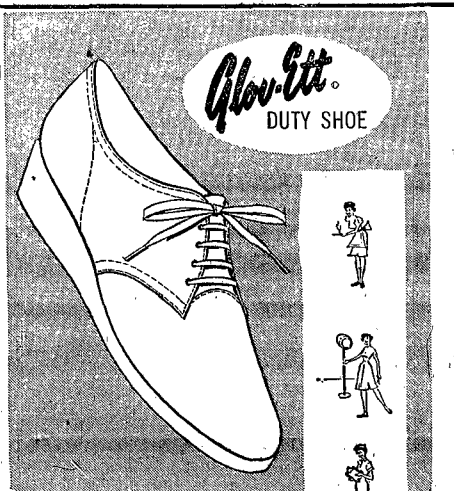
