

Planning Experts Meet with Council on Wayne's Needs

Two community planning experts from the University of Nebraska met with Wayne Kiwanis and City Council Monday to discuss the various possibilities for community planning facing Wayne.

Professor Emory J. Christensen, supervisor of the Community Services Department of the University and director of the Community Planning Department of the Nebraska Division of Resources, and Dr. Otto G. Hoiberg, head of the department of Community Services were in Wayne to speak to the two groups.

At both meetings Dr. Hoiberg emphasized the importance of a community planning council made up of various segments of the community. He told the Kiwanis that such a council would relieve the city administrators of this time consuming task to carry out their daily duties.

He explained to the Kiwanis the three elements of a long range community plan, including research and fact finding, setting up a priority of action and finally implementation.

In addition to Kiwanis members, several city council members, the newly formed recreation board and other interested parties attended the meeting.

At an afternoon meeting of the council, Hoiberg and Christensen discussed the relative merits of several methods of attacking Wayne's planning problem.

The group examined the possibilities of a "do-it-yourself" plan with councilmen and other citizens preparing the plan rather than engaging professionals.

The experts pointed out that federal matching funds were available to defray two-thirds of the cost of the plan providing certain criteria were met. Included in these requirements are establishment of a planning council by ordinance. The council is considering such a move.

The University men also suggested that the council contact other towns that have completed such work or are now engaged in it.

Donald R. Cain, assistant professor of speech, has a master's degree from Wisconsin.

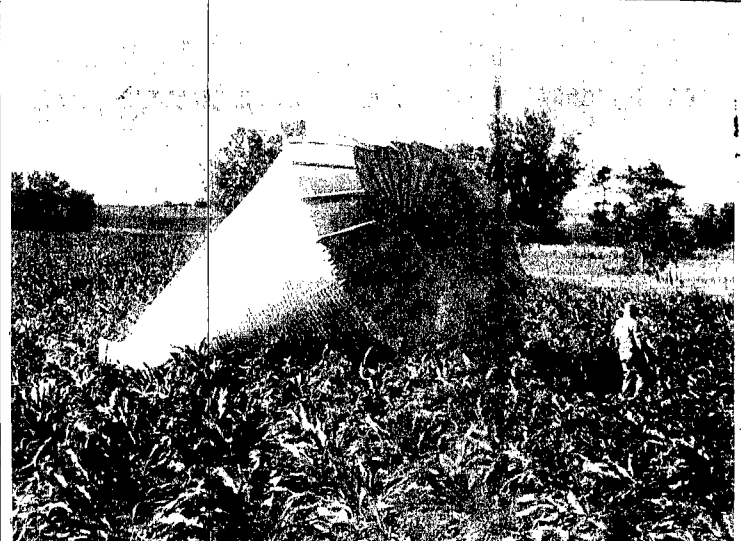
Lester From, instructor in geography, earned his master's from the University of Kansas.

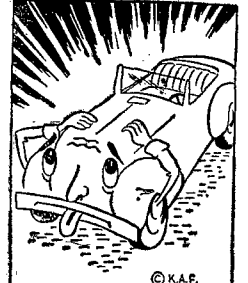
Lower Rates Announced

fabrics are woven on a loom of yarns that are made to stretch. Popular cottons for shirtwaist dresses and casual wear are the wash-and-dry types of ginghams, chambrays and broadcloths.

Cotton has changed and now has many faces, but some of the factors that have made it popular through the years still hold true, such as comfort. It is cool and absorbs perspiration. It gives a pleasant feeling when worn next to the skin. It gives both the appearance and feeling of freshness and with this a sense of healthy well-being.

Of course, true freshness comes from the use of soap and water and cotton fiber is one that can be frequently laundered. It can be washed and ironed under high temperatures without injury to the fabric.

Pinking shears should not be used for original cutting of a garment. It is difficult to follow the cutting line of a pattern with pinked shears. If a double layer of fabric is cut, there will be slippage along the edges. Pinked edges are good seam finishes, but pinking should be done as the seams are stitched or after the original cutting of the garment.

Left-handed shears are available for left-handed people. Left-handed persons using right handed shears will find them most uncomfortable and may form blisters. Some larger notion counters stock left handed shears but many times they must be purchased by special order.

Planning and preparing meals can be lots of fun with the many colorful, tasty vegetables which are available all year but more particularly from spring through fall.

Vegetables vary in food value according to their color and the part of the plant eaten. The dark green leaves and yellow vegetables are rich in vitamin A with some vitamin C present.

Proper storage is important for the protection of both the food value and flavor. Wash perishable vegetables carefully and store them in plastic bags or in the hydrator of the refrigerator.

Vegetables should be cooked in a small amount of liquid— one fourth to one inch of water— so the color remains bright and strong flavors do not develop. They should be cooked only until tender when tested with a fork.

Can't Fool the People

west of Beatrice on Highway 4 is the original 160-acre tract of land deeded to Daniel Freeman after he resided on it and cultivated it for five years. It was the first grant under the Homestead Act to be filed at Brownville, Nebraska in the first hour of the first day the Act became law. It might have been the first in the nation; the records are too vague to prove it.

The 160-acre tract has been restored as nearly as possible to its original state. Cub Creek, a docile little prairie stream, is banked by nearly every specie of tree that is native to the area. Nearly eighty types of native prairie grass can be identified on the tract.

The new exhibit and information building located at the visitor center, contains an excellent museum and art exhibit. The museum contains farm implements used during the homesteading period; the art objects depict the life of the early settler. Located in the same area is a Homesteader's Cabin completely equipped as it was used nearly one hundred years ago in the same vicinity.

The rolling open prairie beckons the ardent hiker. Acres of unfenced, uncharted trails make hiking a leisurely, invigorating experience for the explorer.

No food facilities are available at the Homestead; however, the City of Beatrice has numerous restaurants and two excellent parks with picnic facilities. The city has recently made one park available for camping and small trailers.

If you are interested in Nebraska history, and would receive a little inspiration from the deeds of your forefathers, this is for you. See it yourself, and take your friends and relatives who visit Nebraska to see "The Homestead National Monument."

Co. Agent's Column

Corn Shows Worm Damage. Some farmers are reporting severe damage from rootworm in early planted corn. Likewise there is evidence of heavy corn borer infestation. Not much can be done now against corn rootworms except to ridge the rows for added support.

Treatment for corn borer control is recommended when 50 per cent or more of the stalks show feeding signs (pin holes in leaves).

Rabies Danger. All warm-blooded animals, including man, are susceptible to rabies. This disease can be spread by wild animals as well as domestic animals such as dogs or cats.

State 4-H Camp Sets Dedication. Nebraska's State 4-H Camp in the Nebraska National Forest at Halsey will be dedicated in ceremonies on the afternoon of July 17.

John Orr, associate state 4-H club leader at the University of Nebraska, says that the dedication will mark a four-year effort to raise funds for the camp. Although construction is continuing, the main lodge along with the cabins and bath houses have been completed.

Nebraska. Several thousand 4-H members, older youth groups, farm organizations and Ag College alumni used the facilities in 1962.

Poison Ivy Eradication

Poison ivy cannot be eradicated by cutting the top growth— because the ivy grows right back.

It can be destroyed by hand grubbing in the spring or fall. When the ground is soft after rains, the roots come out in long pieces—and you get permanent control.

However, grubbing when the soil is dry is almost impossible since the roots break off in the ground and the ivy soon sprouts back again. Handling of the roots at any time can cause an outbreak on the person if susceptible.

There are several chemical treatments available that can be used to control poison ivy. Use amino triazole—2,4,5-T ester—silyx—2,4-D ester—ammonium sulfamate—or combinations of these. Where chemical sprays are used it is important to obtain complete coverage.
