If you don't have your own vegetable garden, select those that are firm or crisp in texture and bright in color. Avoid any that are over-ripe, blemished or bruised. Wilted vegetables have lost most of their vitamin con-tent.

lost most of their vitamin con-tent. Proper storage is important for the protection of both the food value and flavor. Wash per-ishable vegetables carefully and store them in plastic bags or in the hydrator of the refrigera-tor. Vegetables should not he peeled or cut until just before they are used. Vegetables should be cooked in a small amount of liquid— one fourth to one inch of water— so the color remains bright and strong flavors do not develop. They should be cooked only until tender when tested with a fork.
