S. shoppers select reg-ular white milled rice, the most easily stored and most stable. Enriched rice is regular white rice enhanced with vitamins and minerals. The purpose of the en-richment being to return as many of the valuable minerals and vitamins that had been re-moved in the milling (polishing) process as possible. Thiamin, niacin, and iron are required by law to be replaced and the addi-tion of vitamin E and calcium are optional. Two methods of enrichment which are permitted by federal specifications are: (1) addition of super-enriched kernels of rice; (2) addition of the ritamins and minerals in a powdered form. Keeping that in mind it is re-cooking as you'll be pouring hard-to-get vitamins and minera-als down the drain. Brown rice retains all the nat-ural vitamins and minerals be-cause only the outer, inedible hull is removed. The nut-like flavor appeals to many people. Summer Garden Planting There is still plenty of time to There is still plenty of time to grow fresh vegetables this sum-mer. Late gardens often produce higher yields of quality vege-tables than those planted in the There are a few problems that spring. There are a few problems that are peculiar to planting in mid-summer that are easily solved by the grower. The first problem is getting seeds to germinate and start growing vigorously. It may be necessary to soak the furrows before seeding. Seed should be covered slightly deeper than for spring planting. Crusting can be avoided by ap-plying a very light mulch of grass clippings, sawdust, peat material over the newly-seeded row. It is well to water lightly of-ten to keep the soil surface moist until plants break through. If cart is not taken, a hard crust may form resulting in poor stand of plants.
