Proceeds will go for a plaque honoring Prof. Emeritus Lenore Ramsey, who organized the Wayne chapter of Alpha Psi Omega, national dramatics honorary which is sponsoring this play. The cast includes two students well-known in Wayne, Brad Hickerson and Carla Rethwisch, plus Paul McCluskey and Sharon Huston.

### WSC Students Receive \$75,930 from Loan Fund

Wayne State College students received \$75,930 of aid this past year from the National Defense Student Loan Fund. The 288 loans averaged about \$23, applicable on tuition and other expenses. The total of loans outstanding since the national aid program began here over four years ago now is \$197,802. Repayments of loans during the year totaled \$5,845, coming from students who have finished school. Year by year the repayment sum will grow as more recipients complete their college work and become obligated to begin payments. The repayments already made do not include \$5,851 of loan principal cancelled for teaching service during the year. Under terms of the federal loan act, borrowers who go into teaching in public schools may cancel half of the loan principal for up to five years.

## Warns Residents Against Direct Viewing of Eclipse

The Nebraska Ophthalmic Association today warned against viewing the impending solar eclipse July 20, with the naked eye. In Nebraska the eclipse will be partial. Dr. William A. Koeber, Wayne optometrist, warned the observers should not use telescopes, binoculars, sunglasses or any other type of glasses to see the eclipse. He said many cases of permanent eye damage and blindness have been reported after eclipses in the past. Dr. Koeber said 21 cases of complete blindness were reported in Utah as recently as 1960 resulting from watching an eclipse. Unfortunately, said Dr. Koeber, there is no immediate hint of danger. First symptoms of damage to the eye may come several hours or a day after the exposure. It causes a change in the shape of objects and the injured person sees with a reddish tinge.

If you want to view the eclipse, Dr. Koeber suggests the use of a pinhole device which avoids the harmful infra-red rays. It can be made by punching a clean hole with a pin through a piece of cardboard. The viewer should turn his back to the sun, hold the punched cardboard over one shoulder and let the sun's rays come through the hole onto another piece of white cardboard. The sun's image is thus reflected on the white cardboard with no damage to the viewer's eyes. Dr. Koeber emphasized that no attempt should be made to view the eclipse through the pinhole itself. It simply intensifies the damage.

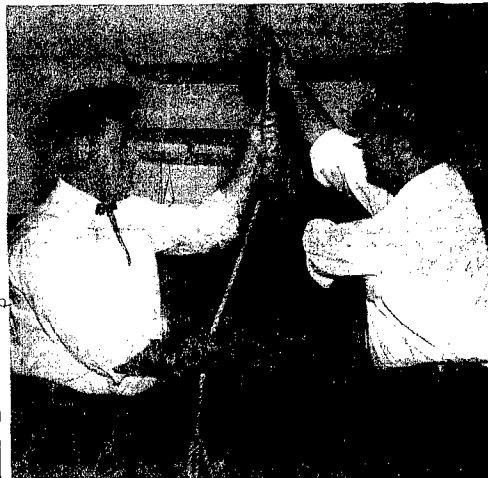

### Give Notice on Plans To Relocate Hiway 98

Notice has been given by the State Highway Commission that if a public hearing on the relocation of Highway 98 is desired, the request should be made to the Highway Commission, Room 1202, State Capitol, Lincoln, Nebraska, on or before July 19, 1963. Present plans call for the job in Highway 98, which takes it two miles south before crossing the Wayne county line, to be removed and the highway will continue four miles straight west, connecting with Highway 81 in Pierce county. In the event a request for a public hearing is made, further notice of the time and place of such hearing will be given. If a request for a hearing is not received, the Commission will complete its study of the matter and will then give its advice.

At that time, telephone customers will be able to dial their long distance, station-to-station calls across the country and even into Canada. In making the announcement, H. Eiting, manager for the telephone company here, said, "By dialing the figure '1,' a three digit area code and the seven digit telephone number of someone you want to reach in New York, San Francisco or any of thousands of cities, you can complete your call yourself and be talking to the party you called in just a few seconds more than it takes to dial a local call."

"In a few days," he said, "customers will receive their copy of the Direct Distance Dialing directory. This will be useful to long distance callers as it contains complete dialing instructions and a list of nearly 1,000 of the cities that can be dialed direct."

### Correct ZIP Code for Concord PO is 68728

An error in publishing the new Postal Department's ZIP Code number has been noted by Concord Postmaster Norman Anderson. The Herald of two weeks ago carried the wrong number for Concord. The proper ZIP Code number is 68728, according to Postmaster Anderson. Anderson said many residents were already using the number, but unfortunately it was incorrect.

### Water and Electricity Use Set New Records

The month of June set records in both water and electricity use in Wayne. Norb Brugger, utilities superintendent, said that on June 29, the generating plant hit a peak load of 3,050 kilowatts shortly after noon and that the 24-hour load for the day totaled 47,000 kilowatts. Both were records.

Water consumption has also reached levels, according to Howard Witt, water commissioner. Witt said on June 14 the pumping stations at the four city wells pumped a total of 979,000 gallons of water during the 24 hour period. On June 29, residents used a total of 811,444 gallons of water. The record use was attributed to air conditioning and lawn sprinkling during the dry month.

### Carroll Rites Planned For Auto Mishap Victim

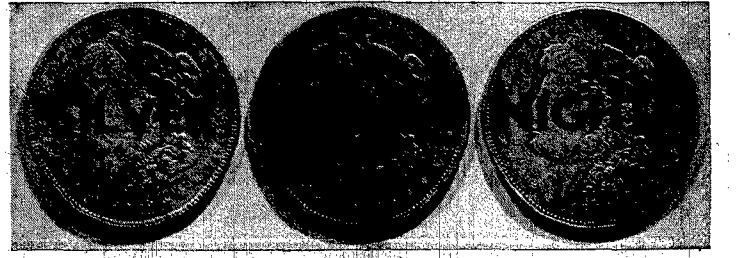

### I Can't Forget

They asked me if I saw the child. Yes, I saw him. And he's all I've been seeing since I saw him. But it was too late to stop. I was the last to see him alive and the first to see his lifeless body limply sprawled out on the pavement, a few inches from the bumper of my car.

I wish I were the victim rather than the man who killed him for he died only once and I a thousand deaths since then. I saw him running out between two cars. He looked away. But yet his childish steps led into my path. I honked the horn. I kicked into the brake. I heard the tires squeal. And then came the thud. I walked ahead and bent over his crumpled form. "Call an ambulance." I shouted. "Quick." I saw the gathering crowd. They all looked at the child, and then at me.

And then I saw the anguished features of a man—the father—and heard the desperate screams of a bereaved mother. How can I forget?

And when the scene had cleared and I had filed reports at headquarters and

the police had cleared me, I stood alone and suddenly knew what I had really done.

"Could happen to any of us," a voice behind me said. I felt the sympathetic touch of a policeman's hand. "You were not speeding or violating any law. We preferred no charges nor did any witness charge a fault by you. The child was unattended, roaming the streets alone, and you did nothing that was dangerous or wrong."

I carry insurance, sure. But who can replace a life? Should I visit the parents? See the child buried? Or coldly disregard the death, the bitter grief? Will the father and mother hate me? A sense of moral guilt hangs over me. Remorse alone cannot clear my conscience. I wasn't careless, the policeman said. I was within the law. But yet, my conscience lives with me and I with it. And thinking that, perhaps, the slightest bit of more attention on my part could have averted this will haunt my thoughts for every hour I shall live. And no one can deliver me of this.

## "See Nebraska First"

Take a Step into the Twenty-First Century!

If your children are taking a science course in any Nebraska school, and if their conversations make you feel that somehow they have advanced into another age, a trip to the Sheldon Station at Hallam, Nebraska will give you an opportunity to catch up and be as advanced as they are in the field of producing electricity from atomic energy.

Located 17 miles southwest of Lincoln, this impressive looking industrial giant stands in the midst of a serene farming community; however, the outside view gives no indication of the complex, awesome, gear at work inside the plant.

The atomic extravaganza is presented in an air conditioned exhibit building adjacent to the plant proper. This building houses a miniature cutaway of the entire plant which provides a view of the entire operation and how the different sections all tie together to ultimately transform heat from the disintegrating atom to water, to steam, to the turbines that drive the generators. It also contains a comfortable auditorium for viewing related films.

The atomic reaction takes place in an underground area that extends down eight stories below ground level. Seven-foot concrete blocks that plug the underground entry way when the reactor is operating are erie in diameter of the power of the atom.

The magnitude of the activity taking place in the reactor chamber can best be understood in comparing it with our present day fuels. The fission of one pound of uranium will produce as much energy as: 1400 tons of coal; 250,000 gallons of gasoline; and 40,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas.

This plant is the first of its kind in the United States and will doubtless someday prove to be a crude operation compared to developments that are "just around the corner" in this fast-moving age.

## Extension Notes

Magic in a Package

There's magic in a package of rice—magical ease of storing, cooking and variety in serving. As old as civilization itself, rice has been a staple food for millions of people throughout history. But today's homemakers have far and away the best selection.

Although there are more than 7000 known varieties of rice, U. S. growers produce only the 12 or so preferred by American consumers.

Most U. S. shoppers select regular white milled rice, the most easily stored and most stable. Enriched rice is regular white rice enhanced with vitamins and minerals. The purpose of the enrichment being to return as many of the valuable minerals and vitamins that had been removed in the milling (polishing) process as possible. Thiamin, niacin, and iron are required by law to be replaced and the addition of vitamin E and calcium are optional.

Two methods of enrichment which are permitted by federal specifications are: (1) addition of super-enriched kernels of rice; (2) addition of the vitamins and minerals in a powdered form. Keeping that in mind it is recommended that you do not wash or drain the rice before or after cooking as you'll be pouring hard-to-get vitamins and minerals down the drain.

Brown rice retains all the natural vitamins and minerals because only the outer, inedible hull is removed. The nut-like flavor appeals to many people.

An interesting change in the menu would be to serve rice in place of potatoes with a ham dinner.

Cook-Outs

Cooking out-of-doors is, of course, the thrill supreme of a picnic. It should be remembered, however, to keep preparations simple and quick. Many intriguing desserts and breads can be made with cake and biscuit mixers right at the picnic—a grill and covered frying pan are the only major pieces of equipment needed. . . Corn on the cob and potatoes with skins may be baked in coals also or on a grill; butter both potatoes (with skins left on) and corn, and wrap securely in aluminum foil. . . For "banana splits," peel back one side of the banana and slice it lengthwise; between the two slices insert pieces of a chocolate nut candy bar and marshmallows. Wrap carefully in aluminum foil and bake for ten minutes.

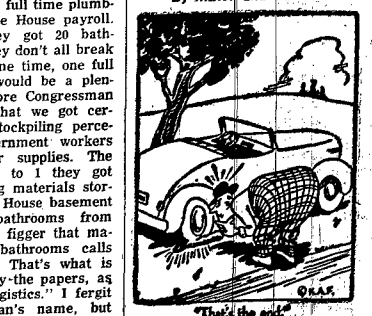

## Capitol News

### Educational Television Bill Is Approved by Governor

Governor Morrison has signed into law what he regards as "by far, the most important single piece of legislation enacted since I became governor."

He gave that evaluation after affixing his signature to the measure establishing educational television in the state.

"The governor said the potential for good from this bill is unlimited."

One thing the bill will do, Morrison said, is help equalize educational opportunities throughout the state, making gifted teachers and techniques available to the sparsely settled school district as well as to the ones in more heavily populated areas.

The legislature, after considerable arguing, recently gave its approval to bills calling for establishment of the educational television network and for creation of a nine-member educational television commission.

The budget bill includes an appropriation for \$600,000 from the general fund to help get the network established. Morrison said the \$600,000 is "not enough but should enable us to get the ball rolling."

After signing the bill, the governor said the greatest challenges of the present time are the "war against ignorance and prejudice."

Educational television, he said, has almost unlimited potential as a tool against these two things.

Morrison signed the bill at the gubernatorial mansion where he was recuperating from recent minor surgery. He said he expected to be back at his state-house desk this week.

While reviewing some of the work of the legislature, which is just about ready to wind up its business, Morrison said he was quite disappointed with some of the things the lawmakers did—and was quite pleased with others.

He said the educational television measure was most important and that creation of a penal complex was also among activities he listed on the plus side.

But the governor again expressed disappointment in the legislators' turndown of his bill proposing creation of a separate department of economic development and of the measure calling for a program of driver education in the public school system.

He predicted that in the near future the legislature will see the merit of his ideas on establishment of a department of economic development.

The governor said he was disappointed also because the legislature did not see fit to pass any kind of civil rights legislation.

At the same time, the governor said the problems involved in civil rights should not be accompanied by "upheavals of emotion" but should be attacked from a "rational" basis.

### Tips on Preventing Bloat

Bloat in cattle is not a new problem, but the danger is always present, especially when pasturing legumes.

There are several management practices which are helpful in reducing the incidence of bloat.

—Pasture Management. If pastures can be maintained with no more than 50 percent legumes, the chance of bloat is greatly reduced.

—Feeding hay. If animals receive hay daily before going on pasture or have a good supply of hay available, while on pasture, bloat is often eliminated.

—Alternating Pasturing of Sudan. There is some experimental evidence that overnight pasturing of sudan has prevented bloat on alfalfa pastured the following day.

Dutch Elm Disease

The development of an epidemic of Dutch Elm disease in extreme southeastern Nebraska means that homeowners in other parts of the state should be on the lookout for diseased trees.

Preparation to fight the destructive fungus disease should begin with removal and burning of all dead elm wood. Healthy trees should be carefully watered and fertilized. Spraying is not recommended until the fungus has been positively identified in an area. Then spraying should be done in the spring before elm leaves appear. The spray is applied to control elm bark beetles which transmit the disease, according to University of Nebraska Extension specialists.

Summer Garden Planting

There is still plenty of time to grow fresh vegetables this summer. Late gardens often produce higher yields of quality vegetables than those planted in the spring.

There are a few problems that are peculiar to planting in mid-summer that are easily solved by the grower. The first problem is getting seeds to germinate and start growing vigorously. It may be necessary to soak the furrows before seeding. Seed should be planted deep enough to be in moist soil. The seed should be covered slightly deeper than for spring planting.

Crusting can be avoided by applying a very light mulch of grass clippings, sawdust, peat moss, straw or other mulching material over the newly-seeded row. It is well to water lightly often to keep the soil surface moist until plants break through. If care is not taken, a hard crust may form resulting in poor stand of plants.

The second major problem with mid-summer gardens is keeping the plants growing rapidly. High quality vegetable crops depend on rapid growth of plants.

Moisture is an important factor in securing rapid growth of plants. A more consistent supply of moisture can be assured by making an application of mulch between the rows. Mulch reduces evaporation of moisture from the soil and helps keep the soil from getting too hot for the plants to make a maximum growth. Periodic waterings will be of great benefit to the fall garden, and will be reflected in

VITAMIN K - VEINS
