

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

Those attending the 12th annual University of Nebraska Tractor Power and Safety Day at Mead July 25 will see a "whopper" of a tractor—one producing over 100 horsepower at the drawbar.

Leading the list of tractors tested during 1982-83 by the University in terms of horsepower is a John Deere 5010 diesel, the largest conventional two-wheel drive farm bractor tested to date. Joining the big diesel in the parade of 22 tractors are four other models in the 100-plus horsepower class, according to L. F. Larsen, engineer-in-charge of tractor testing.

Also of interest in the tractor section of the program will be a demonstration of tractor testing equipment which has been revamped during the past year to handle an increasing number of tractors with 100 horsepower or over submitted for test.

The new test car is permanently mounted on a heavy chassis arrangement ahead of a tractor, and incorporates new safety features for the protection of the tractor test crew, Larsen pointed out.

Nylon Zippers are rapidly replacing the metal chain zipper as a favorite of the homemaker.

Most of the new products are invented because manufacturers want to please the consumer. In this case women wanted zippers which were inconspicuous and lighter in weight. 


