## Happy Homemakers Club Studies Fire Prevention

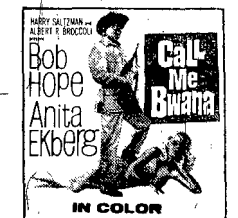

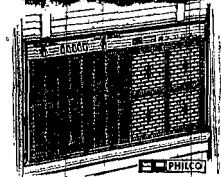

### Final Rites for Mrs. Rohrke, 93 Held in Hoskins

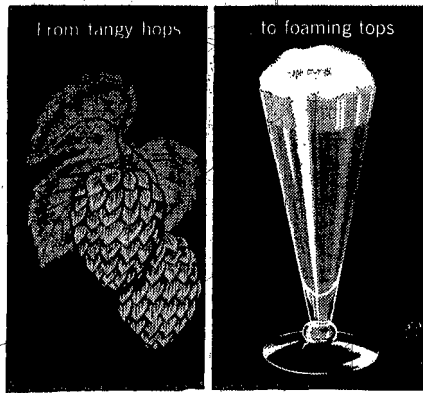

**EFFECT OF THYROID ON HEART**

Q. Is it possible that some people can not build up their thyroid intake to the correct level because of the effect on the heart?

A. In advanced cases of thyroid deficiency, heart disease not due to the deficiency may exist. In such cases the physician may prescribe thyroid extract in small doses initially, and increase the dosage very cautiously. If the heart condition is severe and not specifically due to thyroid deficiency, the doctor may find it necessary to stop thyroid administration short of the optimal, safe dose.

**POISON IVY**

Q. If you accidentally touch poison ivy, is there any way to neutralize the poison and avoid trouble?

A. If you come in contact with poison ivy, or any other plant that you have touched the plant, wash the area as soon as possible with lots of soap and water. If soap isn't handy, sponge the area with a cloth soaked in kerosene, regular (unleaded) gasoline, or alcohol.
