"Wash & Wear" falls into two broad categories, namely cottons, but also rayons and linens with special finishes and fabrics of synthetic fibers.

Resin finishes were first used on cottons. Now a new type of wrinkle resistance is built into cottons by treating them with agents that become an integral part of the fiber. This is not a surface finish, the fiber itself is changed. These are sometimes called "spin dry" because it isn't necessary to stop the washer cycle.

Some synthetic fibers are wrinkle resistant by nature. Sixty-five percent of a Polyester must be used if blended with cotton or linen, 50 percent if blended with rayon. A greater amount of Acrylic, namely 80 percent must be used with cotton, and 70 percent with rayon.

bel states otherwise. Here is one way of laundering in a washer: 1. Run about half a normal load (drowding causes wrink-

5. A cool water-rinse with a water conditioner added makes for more effective rinsing.

6. Occasional use of a fabric softener in the final rinse cuts static in synthetics and makes all fabrics softer.

Suggestions for using the dry-

Suggestions for using the dryer:

1. Moderate heat too hot sets
wrinkles and too cool won't do a
good pressing job.

2. After garment is dry,
tumule it for ten minutes with no
heat!

A small electric light is some-times left burning to dry the air in a closet. An electric fan or opening the closet door occasion-ally will help to keep the air circulating.

Commercial preparations to dry the air are also available. They can be hung in cloth bags in closets or placed in open con-tainers on closet floors. Paradi-chlor benzene. often used for moth control, also controls mil-dew. Crystals of this chemical can be scattered between folds of stored clothing or bags of crystals can be hung in closed garment bags. A caution about the use of paradichlorbenzene-it damages some plastics, so any elastic hutters.
