Among the 123 senior degree candidates, eight will be graduated with academic honors.

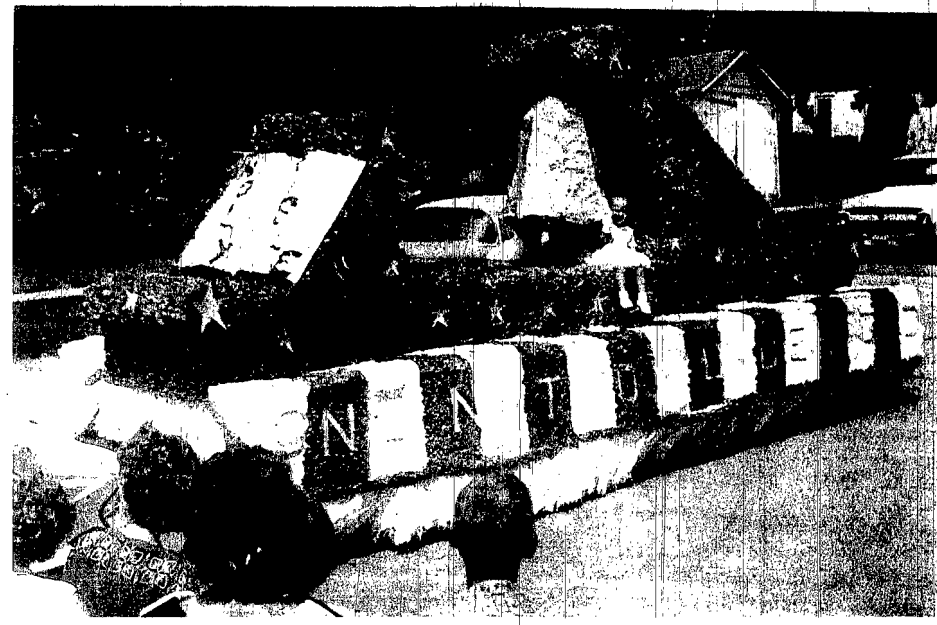

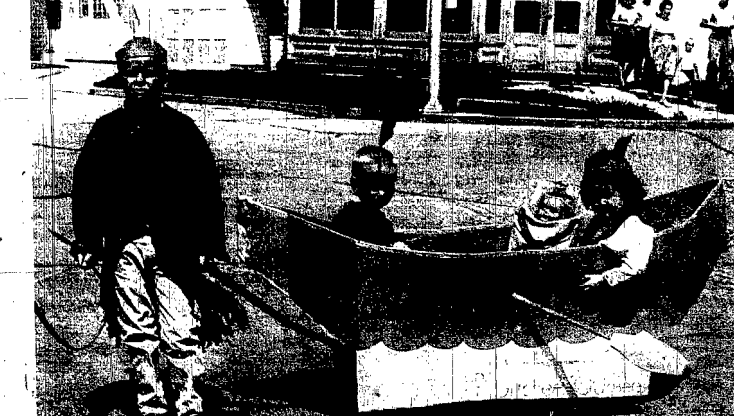

Clarify Points About Obtaining Licenses

It has been called to the Herald's attention that the article in last week's Wayne Herald, concerning student driver's licenses, was not as complete as it might have been. The learner's permit for driver's license is as follows:

A person who has attained the age of 15 years or more may obtain a Learner's Permit which shall be valid for a period of one year and he may operate a motor vehicle over the highways of this state if he is accompanied by a licensed operator who is at least 21 years of age and who is actually occupying the seat beside the driver. Each individual under the age of 21 who is making application for a Learner's Permit, must furnish proof of age, either by Birth Certificate or affidavit of age executed by a parent or guardian.

Concerning school permits: Persons between the ages of 14 and 16 years of age may be issued a limited permit to drive a motor vehicle to and from the school building where he attends school by the nearest highway or street from his place of residence, if such a person lives a distance of 1 1/2 miles or more from school. Such permit shall be used for the sole purpose of transporting such minor to school.

A school permit will not be issued until such person has appeared before a license examiner to demonstrate that he is capable of successfully operating a motor vehicle. The child must be accompanied by a parent when applying for a school permit.
