The University of Nebraska College of Agriculture will offer short courses this fall to meet the needs of young Wayne area farmers and ranchers who wish to continue their education.

The six, eight-week courses will begin Dec. 2 and Feb. 10. They will offer practical classes in field crops, marketing farm products, farm management, mechanized agriculture and livestock production.

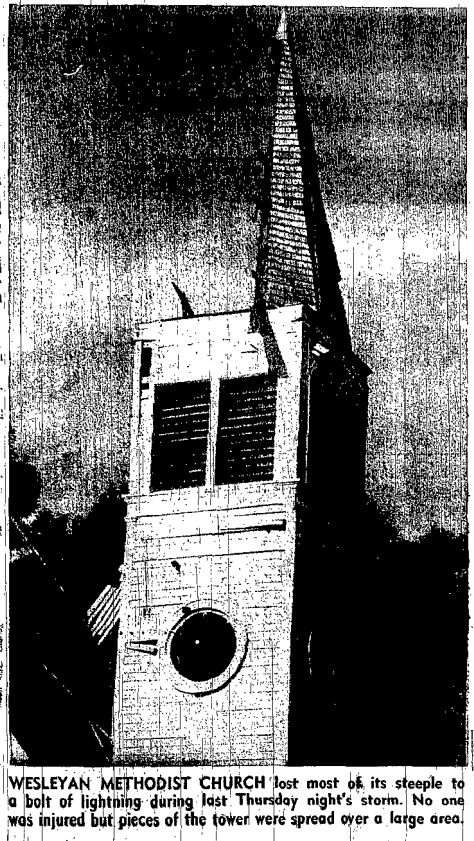
A 950 pound Hereford steer shown by Mickey Topp was picked as the Grand Champion at the 4-H baby beef show Thursday at the Wayne County Fair.

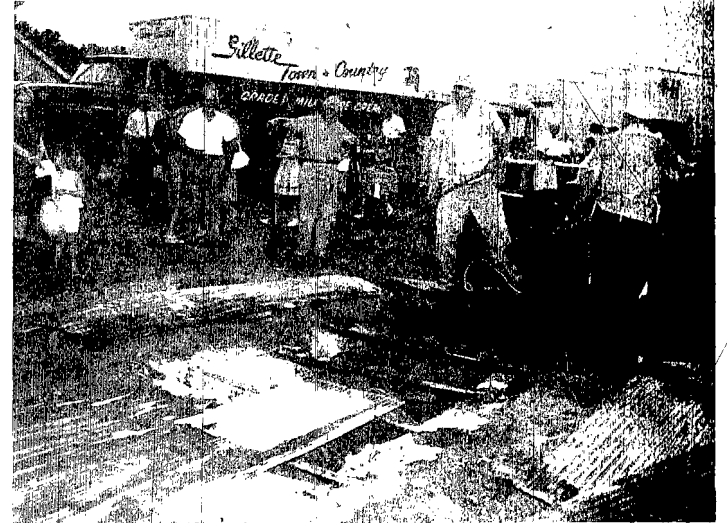

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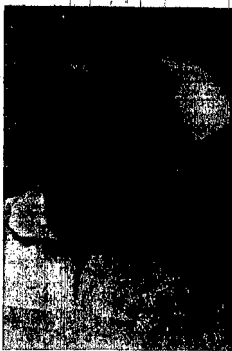


### Three Laurel Grads End Nurses Training

Their second run came in the sixth when Glen Nichols started off the inning with a walk. He moved to second on another walk, went to third on a sacrifice, and scored on a single by Jerry Meyer.

Wisner's lone run came in the sixth when Ed Clatanoff singled to center. He moved to second on another walk and went to third and home on two separate errors. Mau was the winning pitcher. Raabe the loser. Wayne had two runs on five hits and committed five errors. Wisner had one run on one hit and played error-less ball.

The Legion's game with Oakland was scheduled to follow the Midgels' game with Scribner, but was rained out in the last half of the first inning with Wayne holding a 2-0 lead. Play was started once again the next night with Wayne coming across with their first Area Tournament win 3-0. Although out-hit 4-3, Wayne took advantage of four Oakland errors to come across with the runs necessary for the margin of victory. Wayne's first run came in the

first inning when Don Helgren reached first on an error. He went to second on a sacrifice and scored on a single by Jerry Granquist. The game's final two runs came in the third when Denny Schmitz tripled to right-center field. Don Helgren then walked, stole second, and scored behind Schmitz on a single by Don Meyer. Meyer was the winning pitcher, giving up no runs on four hits and backed by error-less ball. Gribble was the losing pitcher, giving up 3 runs, 3 hits, and Oakland had four errors.

The finals were Wednesday night with the Midgels being the first club to win the trophy and trip. The victim was Ralston who led off the first inning with two runs and three hits. Wayne bounced back into the game and the lead in their half of the first with six runs on six hits. Ralston added one more in the second on two hits, another in the fourth with two hits, and three in the sixth with two hits. Wayne kept their lead by scoring two in the second on 3 hits, and one in the fourth with one hit. Mau was the winning pitcher, Gary Cook the loser. Wayne had 9 runs on 11 hits and committed three errors. Ralston had 7 runs on 10 hits and had one error.

Wayne's Legion came up against the home-town club in the tourney finals and defeated Scribner 5-1 on a combined two-hitter by Ray Vrtiska and Don Meyer. Wayne's first run came in the fourth when Jerry Granquist started off the inning with a single to center. He went to second when Don Meyer's grounder was muffed by Scribner's first baseman. Granquist went to third and Meyer to second on an

infield out, and Granquist scored on a single. Meyer was trapped between third and home and scored on an error by the pitcher.

Wayne added three more runs in the sixth when Granquist and Meyer walked. Granquist scored and Meyer went to third on a single by Jim Kern. Kern stole second and both runners scored on a double by Dean Weible.

Scribner's lone run came in the second when Lamberty walked, went to second on a sacrifice and scored on a single by Schulenberg. Ray Vrtiska was the winning pitcher, giving up one run and one hit. 2 green peppers, cut into 1½-inch squares

2 cans (15½ ounces each) vacuum packed sweet potatoes  
4 large metal skewers  
½ cup melted butter or margarine

Thread ham cubes, pineapple chunks, sweet potatoes and green pepper squares on metal skewers. Use 3 ham cubes on each metal skewer, alternating pineapple chunk, ham cube, green pepper square, pineapple chunk and sweet potato. Brush vegetables with butter or margarine. Place kabobs on grill, and broil 3 to 4 inches above the coals. Cook slowly until lightly browned on all sides, about 15 minutes. Four servings.

But above all, keep your cook-outs simple and make them a family project.

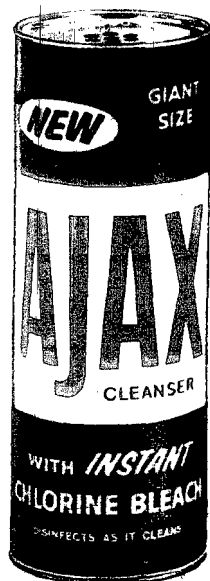

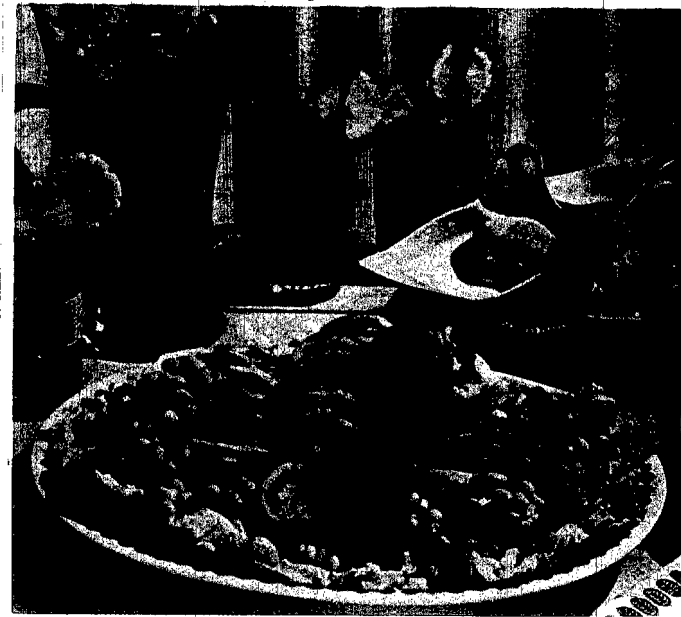

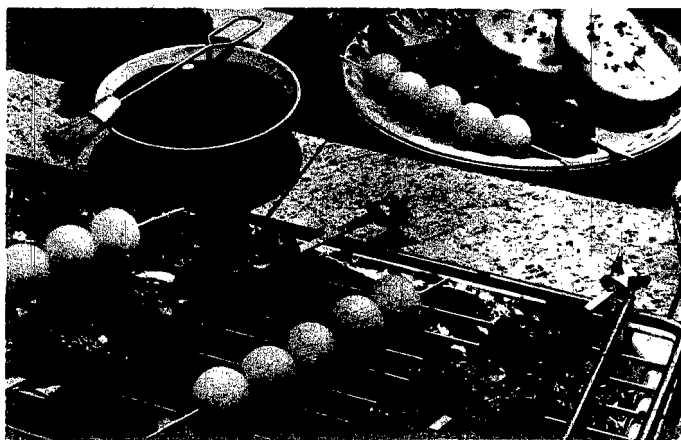

 Beef Delmonico (rib-eye) steak, cut 1 to 2 inches thick

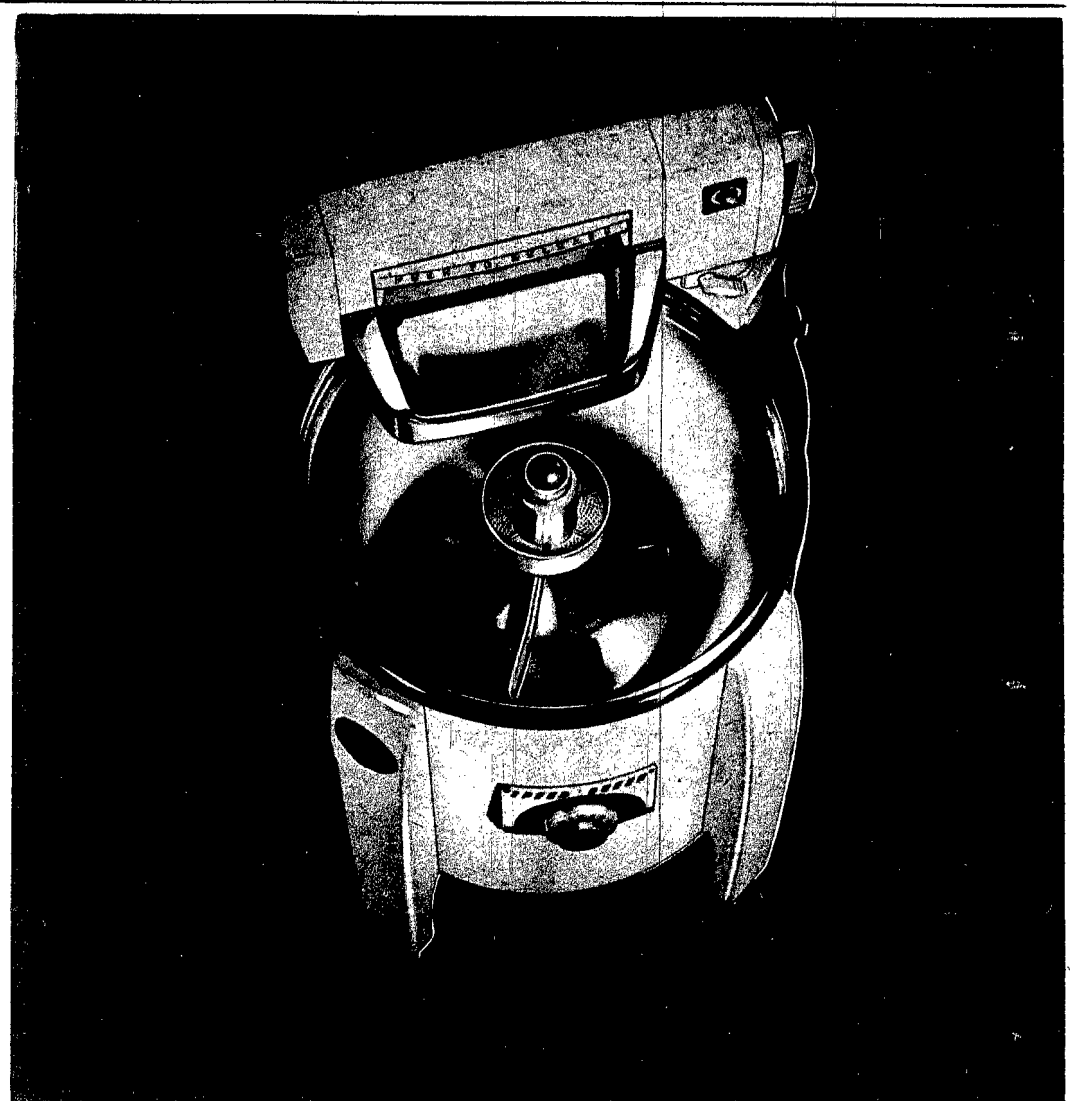
Prepare charcoal briquets for grilling. When coals are covered with a light gray ash cooking is started. Place 1-inch thick steaks 2 to 3 inches from the heat. Two-inch steaks should be 3 to 5 inches from the heat. When cooked on one side, turn the steaks with tongs or a utility fork inserted in the fat edge. Season after browning. Steaks cut 1-inch thick require 12 to 15 minutes total cooking time for rare and 15 to 20 minutes for medium. Two-inch thick steaks require 30 to 35 minutes for rare and 35 to 40 for medium.



### CALIFORNIA TERIYAKI

1 pound round steak, ¼ inch thick  
 ½ cup soy sauce  
 2 tablespoons oil  
 1 tablespoon brown sugar  
 1 tablespoon vinegar  
 ½ teaspoon powdered ginger  
 ⅛ teaspoon garlic powder  
 1 large California cantaloupe

Cut round steak in strips 1 inch wide; place in shallow glass bowl or baking dish. Combine all remaining ingredients except cantaloupe and pour over meat. Let stand several hours at room temperature or refrigerate overnight, spooning marinade over meat occasionally. Cut cantaloupe in halves; remove seeds. Cut in balls with French ball cutter or teaspoon measure. String balls on skewers. Lace strips of beef on skewers and cook over hot coals or broil 3 to 4 inches from heat about 5 minutes; turn. Brush skewers of cantaloupe balls with marinade, coating well. Broil with meat for last few minutes of cooking time, brushing occasionally with marinade. Makes 4 servings.

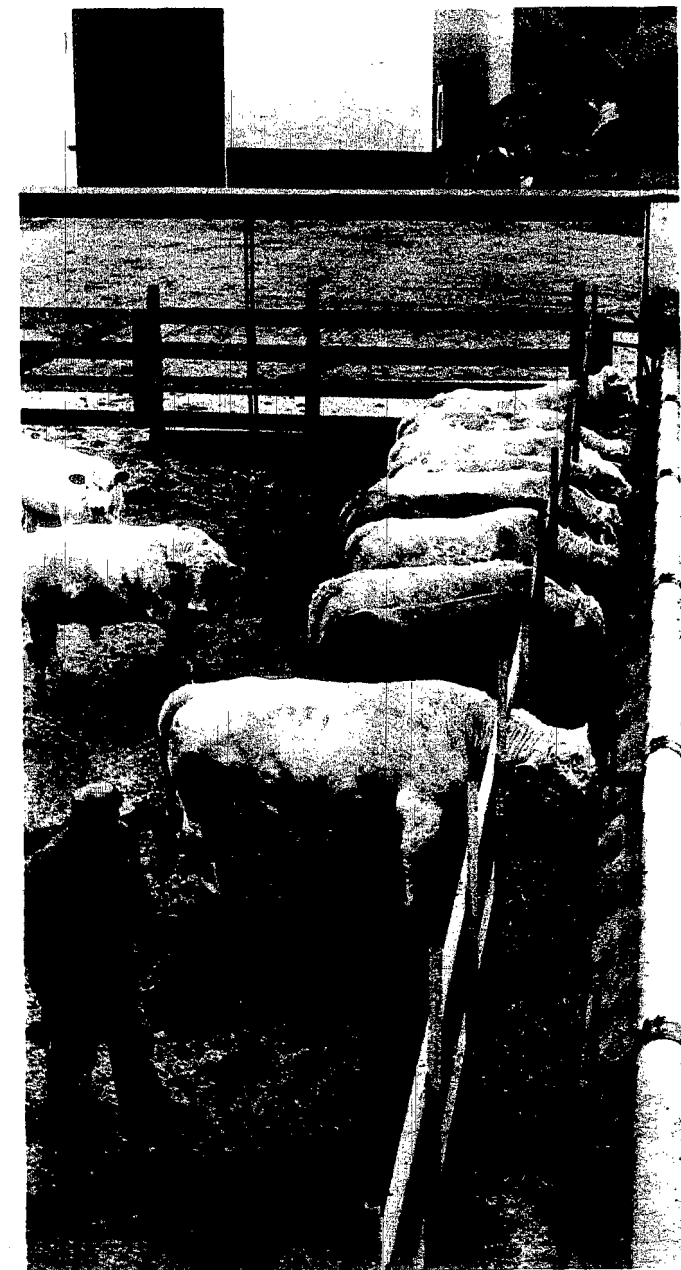
This is the course selected by Mr. Kay Wood, Kenosha, Wisconsin, when he bought a farm in southern Wisconsin.

Wood bought the Kenosha County farm in March, 1961. It consisted of 226 acres and some old buildings. He took one look and made up his mind to call in a professional to tackle the job of mechanizing the entire operation. He contacted Mr. Ollie Kirsch of Burlington . . . not a graduate agricultural engineer, but a thoroughly trained feedlot design engineer.

Wood told Kirsch to design a mechanized feedlot that would permit one or two men to produce and handle a maximum number of Charolais cattle. Right now, the farm manager, Julius Wegner, and one other man are caring for 220 head. It is strictly a breeding-feeding operation. The design will allow expansion to the east for fattening cattle some time in the future. A similar automatic feed transport system can be installed extending in the other direction.

A pushbutton panel is located on the feedlot side of the silo which permits the operator to see what's happening as the feed components are blended together and moved toward the six different holding pens. The feed from the smaller storage units, usually protein or grain, can be blended into the silage. It is then transported through the main auger-tube to any of three tubes that fill the bunks. A large pole-type shed, measuring 60 by 160 feet and open to the south, supplies shelter for cattle in any of the six feed areas.

Designer-builder Kirsch went into this line of work after he learned of many feeders who went so "wrong" building their own setup that they actually abandoned them after a period of unsatisfactory operation. He feels that systemation is the only way of achieving efficiency assuring good return.
