A Pre-Opener meeting for all Wayne city school teachers will be held Aug. 30 at the elementary school.

At 10:15, Principal Fred Rickers will meet with all junior and senior high teachers while Loren Park, elementary principal will meet with elementary teachers.

Feeders Day Program Today At NE Experiment Station

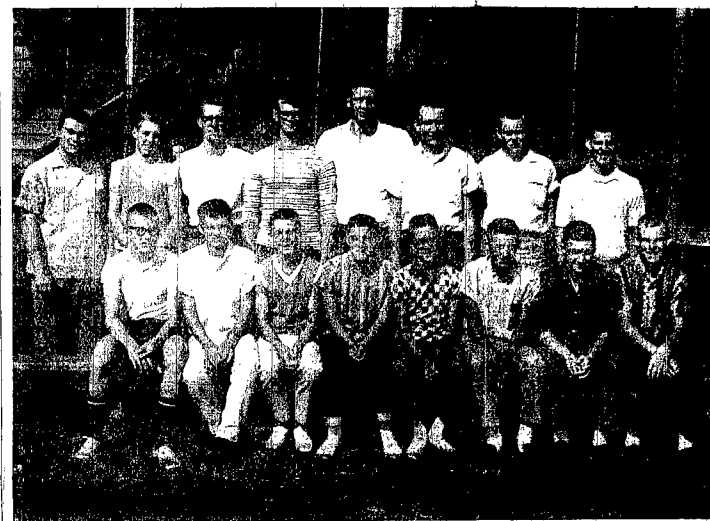

Wayne fans who traveled to Aurora last Tuesday night to see the finals of the Class B State Baseball Tournament may have witnessed tournament history. Both the Wayne Midgets and Junior Legion captured the tournament crowns by defeating Syracuse, 4 to 1, and Pierce, 5 to 2, respectively.

Wayne Midgets used a three run outburst in the fourth inning to one hit to pull their game with Syracuse out of Wayne's first run came in the second when Glen Nichols started off the inning with a single. He moved to second and third and scored on two successive sacrifice bunts.

The fourth inning spurge came when Doug Manske led off the inning with a walk. He moved to second on an error by the shortstop on Don Grein's ground ball. Judge Hamer Points Out Stiff Liquor Law

County Judge David J. Hamer called attention this week to Legislative Bill 109 passed this year relating to liquor laws.

Judge Hamer pointed out that the penalty is stiff regarding the procuring for, or possession of, alcoholic beverages for minors. He stated:

"Any person convicted of procuring alcoholic liquor for a minor shall be fined \$500 or 120 days in jail or both."

Any minor found in possession of alcoholic liquor shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$250 or imprisoned in the county jail not to exceed 60 days or both such fine and imprisonment.

County Farmer Found Dead; Still on Tractor

Donald Von Seggern, about 40, of approximately 8 miles south of five miles east of Wayne, was found dead on his tractor about noon Tuesday.

Mrs. John Greese, Jr., whose husband farms adjacent to the Von Seggern farm, was going to get the mail when she saw Von Seggern slumped over on his tractor.

Capitol News . . . Interested Solons Will Meet To Discuss Special Session

LINCOLN—A group of interested state senators is scheduled to meet within a month to discuss the possibility of calling a special session.

Stryker is chairman of the legislative council's executive board. He made the announcement about the meeting after conferring with Governor Morrison.

The purpose of the meeting will be what specific subjects should be dealt with during the special session.

According to Stryker, who is from Rising City, "the legislature owes a responsibility to the people of Nebraska to correct as soon as possible the errors which have come to light since the last session adjourned."

"Among the errors was misplacement of the driver education fund in the motor vehicle department, instead of in the education department budget; misplacement of \$20,000 for the division of state services for the visually handicapped; inclusion of a provision in the juvenile court bill which has the effect of closing police records on juveniles under 18 to the public; and exclusion of the internal revenue exemption category in the bottle club and non-profit corporation liquor licensing bill.

Stryker said the capitol murals commission fund shortage problem is another topic which should be considered. The Rising City lawmaker said he will also bring up for discussion the possibility of more public power legislation.

Meanwhile, a special legislative committee decided to wait a bit longer before asking the governor to summon a special session "as quickly as possible" to deal with the knotty problem of installment sales legislation.

The committee, headed by Sen. Michael Rusillo, Omaha, agreed to delay such a request after meeting with Atty. Gen. Clarence Meyer.

Meyer told the lawmakers that if he is directed to institute a test suit of the recently enacted installment sales act, he must bring a class action challenging all contracts written under the law.

The attorney general emphasized that if the new law, LB 811, were declared unconstitutional, it would mean that all contracts with a time-sales charge over nine per cent drawn under the law would be void and uncollectible. Meyer has repeatedly stat-

ed his "very serious reservation" regarding the law's constitutionality.

After receiving Meyer's warning, the committee decided to resume hearings on the credit finance problem this week.

LB 811 was passed during the waning days of the last session after the state supreme court had declared unconstitutional the time-sales law passed in 1959.

Deputy State Engineer G. A. Strobel has announced that creation of an urban planning section within the state department of roads is under consideration.

The section would be under the design division of the department.

According to Stroebel, the proposal has been under consideration for about a year and that the main difficulty is finding a qualified person to head the section.

The main aim of the new agency would be to give assistance in planning to Nebraska cities and towns having state highways built within their corporate limits.

At the present time, the highway department is spending approximately \$60,000 a month on urban highway construction and improvement.

Employment Peak
The state labor department has reported that farm and non-farm employing — reflected a season influence — reached its annual peak during July.

The state recorded a slight increase over total placements of the corresponding month last year.

The largest gains in placements were in the government group, and in finance, transportation, manufacturing, and food.

The department said 399 handicapped placements were made during the month, up more than 31 per cent from the same month a year earlier.

Columbus Air Service
James Sandstedt, director of the state aeronautics department, said the civil aeronautics board (CAB) will hear oral arguments Sept. 18 in Washington on air service for Columbus. He will attend the hearing, along with officials from Columbus and Frontier Airlines.

Sandstedt expressed hope that the airlines will come up with a sound proposal for serving the city "so that we can have unity at the hearing." He added he has asked Frontier President Lewis Dymond to consider adding Columbus to any new central route flights it initiates.

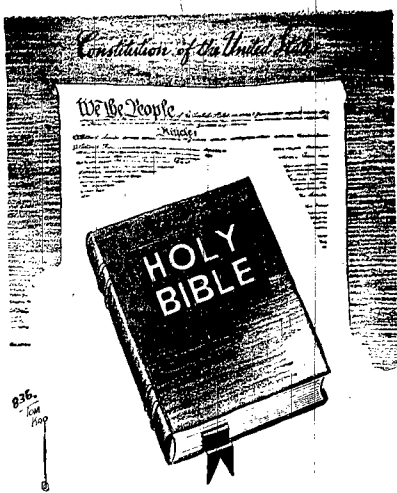
CAB several years ago placed Columbus on a northern Nebraska route but the segment was dropped by Frontier in 1961 before the Columbus airport was ready to receive service. The route was discontinued because other cities on it failed to meet CAB's standards. At that time, however, CAB said Columbus should be provided some alternate service.

Cities on Frontier's central route have opposed including Columbus because they fear the inclusion would weaken the route.

Commission Dilemma
The capitol murals commission was slated to meet with Governor Morrison this week to discuss the commission's dollar dilemma.

Phosphate Should Be Applied
Phosphate should be applied before seeding alfalfa on soils testing low in available phosphorus.

When superphosphate or other readily available phosphate is disked in before seeding at the rate of 80 to 120 pounds of phosphoric acid per acre as indicated by soil test, the phosphate is effective for 3 or 4 years and produces better results than small annual top-dressings.

Where both lime and phosphate are needed, the application of both gets far bigger results than either one alone. These results include a thicker, more uniform stand, greater hay yield, better palatability to livestock, higher protein and phosphorus content and more feed value.

Weeds are a Health Factor
Weed eradication isn't an agricultural problem alone. The 9 to 10 million Americans who suffer annually from hay fever constitute a major economic segment which is being affected.

As with noxious weed eradication, the solution requires the cooperation of people living in towns and cities and on farms. Vacant town and city lots in which weeds are permitted to grow are a source of hay fever infection.

The major cause of hay fever in Nebraska and other midwest states is ragweed. It is the most common offender, not only in the weed group but also among all the pollens. Of people with hay fever, the majority are sensitive to ragweed.

Trees, grasses and weeds have wind-borne pollen which affects individuals at various times. Those sensitive to tree pollens suffer in the spring. Early summer is the time for grasses which is the time for hay fever sufferers are sensitive. The weeds, such as ragweed, flourish from mid-summer to late fall.

Prevent Wood Decay
Builders can do a lot to prevent decay of wood that is in direct contact with the ground and gets wet frequently.

Some lumber—like the heartwood from redwood and cedar—is naturally decay resistant. Pines and firs, on the other hand, are not naturally resistant to decay—but these woods can be improved by treatment with water repellent wood preservatives. Five per cent pentachlorophenol solution is commonly used.

utes. If this isn't possible, soak the ends in the penta solution and brush the other surfaces with the wood preservative.

Also flood the bolt holes and joints with penta solution. Moisture often collects in these spots and causes early rotting.

With water added, nonfat dry milk makes reconstituted fluid milk for drinking or cooking. It can be used dry in cooking, too. Economy and keeping quality add to the popularity of this milk product.

Using nonfat dry milk in preparing instant pudding mixes or canned soups can add nutritive value and variety to the lunch by the side of the road.

Buying Guides for Bed Pillows
Magdalene Pfister, Extension home furnishings specialist at the University of Nebraska makes the following recommendations:

"Pillows need replacement just as does other bedding. Ten years is considered the maximum life of a pillow.

Softness or firmness of the pillow, cost, resiliency and size are all considerations in making the final purchase choice.

Filling materials often lose their buoyancy under wear—sometimes before the cover wears out. Popular types of fillings include down and feathers, foam and fiber fillings. Most states have laws requiring a label identifying the filling material in a pillow.

Feather pillows vary, according to the type of fowl which furnished the feathers. Light-weight pillows generally are best. A goose-feather pillow weighs approximately two and one-half pounds and a chicken-feather pillow about three and one-half pounds. A down-filled pillow will weigh around one and one-half pounds.

Both natural and synthetic rubber and foam can vary greatly in quality.

Feather and down pillows require closely woven covers to keep the quills from working out. An unsized eight-ounce cotton twill is satisfactory.

Covers for other fillings may be of any fabric that will keep dust from entering. If nylon or acetate is used, the material should be heavyweight, since lighter weights tend to fray and pull out at the seams. Weltered seams are found on better pillows."

Every government official or board that handles public moneys, should publish regular intervals an accounting of it showing where and how each dollar is spent. We hold this to be a fundamental principle of democratic government.
