**Medical Mirror**

**ENURESIS**

Q. I have an 8-year-old grandson who wets the bed. The doctor says he is in good health. What can we do to help?

A. Having eliminated physical causes of enuresis (bed-wetting), help may come from suggestion. Try to dispel possible worry the child may have about expressing aggressive feelings. Sometimes enuresis is a sign of uncertainty in the child—that his "plumbing" is not quite right. Most cases can be helped through adult understanding and encouragement, although some cases are admittedly very difficult to correct. Enuresis which appears in a child after an operation is likely to be an especially difficult problem.

**LEG BLISTERS**

Q. I have water blisters on my legs. The blisters, which until last year occurred only during summer months, burst and make sores. What causes this?

A. There could be many possible causes (including sensitivity to sunlight or ultraviolet light), but surely you have sought medical advice by now. If you haven't—do so.

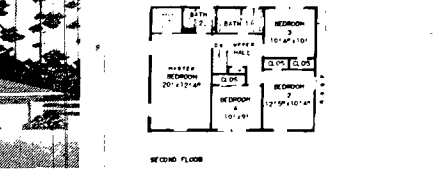
A covered passage leads from the kitchen and double garage to the vestibule. There are three big bedrooms with wardrobes; a full bath and smaller master bathroom.
