The Consumers Public Power Power District has stated it must make plans this year to construct a 110,000-kilowatt steam unit at its Hallam site if the bureau cannot guarantee an additional 75,000 kilowatts for delivery by the summer of 1944. Rural members of the Nebraska Generation and Transmission (Co-operative a re also looking into the possibility of more bureau power, which could require construction of new transmission facilities.

Frank Landis, Lincoln, a member of the state board of education, has cautioned school groups to feel out public sentiment before getting involved in a petition campaign to repeal the Duis amendment. Landis said he would oppose the idea of such a petition dampaign "unless the attitude on the part of the voters was to go along..."

Food Surpluses?

There is something drastically wrong in human society when, on the one hand, we find it necessary to organize a Freedom From Hunger campaign while, on the other hand, American farmers are being criticized because they have, with the help of many off-the-farm business and research organizations, become prolific c producers of a great variety and abundance of healthful food.

We presume that, from the point of view of pure economics, it is correct to state that a product of the control of the contr

wiewpoint, however, is it justifiable to speak of food surpluses when millions upon millions of people throughout the world are diseased and degraded because they simply do not have enough to eat? In many cases these people do not have enough energy resources to be able to try to help themselves. The man with morals must ask himself if he is or is not his furother's keeper.

he is orvis not his brother's keeper.

Farmers Pose a Question
Under the pressure of ever-inreasing cost of production and a
diminishing margin of profit,
farmers have been compelled to
turn to greater volume in order
to make ends meet. Such expansion would be impossible without mechanization, which in
turn, demands ever greater quantities of petroleum products. This
raises a question: Can they besure of a continuing supply of
energy fuels and petrochemicals
at the reasonable prices they
have come to expect?

The answer from oilmen has
been a resounding 'yes'. Spokesmen for the petroleum industry
tell us that their companies are
ready, willing and able to meet
the needs of American farmers.

They point to the \$5.1 billion the petroleum industry plows back into company expansion yearly. They offer as evidence the 700,000 wells that are producing oil and gas today and the additional 27,000 that are brought in every year. Despite rising demand, proved petroleum reserves remain almost constant. As further proof, oil spokesmen point to the \$350 million spent annually by oil companies to develop new products and improve oilt ones. Bargaining is one of the ideas currently being promoted in some agricultural circles as the ideal way to boost, sagging farm income. Unfortunately, there is more glitter than gold in this marketing approach.

This point was emphasized repeatedly at a recent agricultural marketing conference at Ohio State University by industry and college economists.

These men readily acknowledge the merit of farmer bargaining, but they warn against being over-optimistic about the gains that can be made.

A look at the experiences of the 50-oid farm marketing of farm marketing of the proponents of bargaining paint glowing pictures of the gains it can make, the truth is that even the best bargaining groups have been able to increase prices from 2 to 10 percent. It is well to note that these were the top groups, and to realize that at times farmers have actually been placed in a worse position by a bargaining association.

# Extension by Myrtle Notes

If you have not tried the new hot-seal method of canning jams and jellies, make \$\tilde{A}\$ a practice this year. The straight-sided jars which allow you to remove jelly from them without spoiling its shape are what you will want to use.

Pour the boiling jelly into the jars and set the lid on top, if you use the hot-seal method. When you have finished pouring all the jelly into the jars, screw on the bands and let them set until they are cold. The lid will be concave and the screw bands can be removed. In case a rare jar might not seal, leave the hand on and do not reprocess. Jelly will keep because of the high sugar content. Sometimes preserved fruit will come to the top of the jar and the bottom will be all juice. To remedy this situation, let the jar stand for 20-30 minutes: a leave that the stand for 20-30 minutes. Shake the jar thoroughty to mix its contents. If it has reached the right stage of cooling, the fruit will never float again but will remain in mixture with the juice. You may need to practice to learn the exact stage at which to shake the jar.

5 Jelly weeps: acid and pectin in fruit not properly balanced; too warm or damp stor-

anced; too warm of damp son-age.

6 Jellly ferments: not proper-ly canned (use hot seal); mold caused by same thing.

7 Rubber-like jelly: under-ripe fruit; jelly cooked too long.

measure. For example, sheer curtains are lighter in weight than sheets, and it would take a much larger stack of them to equal the weight of a stack of sheets. Therefore, if a load of sheets is the right size for a washer, a load of curtains of equal weight would have to be crammed into the machine.

Cramming of clothes in the washer prevents the cloth movement that is necessary for the circulation of detergents through the fabrics that is needed for good washing results. Keep in mind the amount of space that the clothing occupies rather than the number of pounds.

A good guide for load size is to add clothes loosely to the top row of holes in the perforated tub. And, better washing action usually can be obtained by combining smaller items with a larger item, such as a sheet.

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

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
