structed nor supported with any tax money. The concrete decagon would consist of 10 tiers, each 100 feet high. Thus, it would have 100 sides, one for each yeag of Ne-braska's statehood. Structural plans have been prepared by Latenser. He estimated the pro-ject would cost approximately **34** million. The building would have a hayrinth of rooms on the ground level for a historical display and lowload windows at the various levels. Latenser said "it would have a spectacular view from he top of the tower. The building, for which private financing is being sought, would be the tallest in Nebraska and could be used as a transmission point for educational television.

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




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
