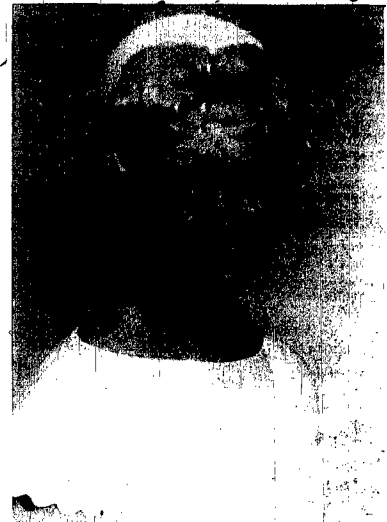

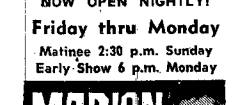

## Open House Marks New Era for Dahl Retirement Center Most Modern Facilities in Home-owned Nursing Center

Completion of an ambitious construction and remodeling program this week will mark the beginning of a new era for the Dahl Retirement Center, Wayne's ultra modern, privately owned, non-sectarian nursing home.

Open house for the new unit, with a capacity of 25 beds, has been set for Saturday and Sunday, September 7-8, from 1:30 to 5 p.m. each day.

The official opening will get underway at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday with a dedication ceremony, sponsored by the Wayne Ministerial Association, followed by the ribbon cutting, with city officials participating. Radio Station WJAG, Norfolk, will cover the event and later proceed inside the building for interviews. Special organ music will be featured both days.

Clifford M. Dahl, owner and administrator, stated that "this marks the fulfillment of a dream that started many months ago; that of bringing to the people of Wayne, and the surrounding area, a dignified place of retirement that we can call our own, and not controlled by out-of-state interests, which is so often the case with our newer homes."

Guests will be admitted to the new facility starting Monday, he added, Sept. 9.

The bedrooms, a combination of singles and doubles, are equipped with the new type high-low beds, all in Danish-Modern design.

The spacious lounge, also in Danish-Modern, has low windows which allow for an excellent view to the south and east. Here the guests may relax during the day, watch television, enjoy card games, or visit with friends and relatives.

Sponsored recreation and special entertainment is planned by the staff and by local organizations.

Upon entering the lobby from the east entrance, visitors will note that the color-keyed interior is carefully blended with the exterior, creating a soft, warm and proper atmosphere that is pleasing to everyone.

The Dahl Retirement Center was designed for safety and convenience as well as providing comfort and enjoyment for the residents. There are hand rails in all corridors as well as "grab bars" in the toilets and bathing areas.

The Nurse's Control Station is the "heart of operation" and is located near the main entrance. Here the nurse-in-charge can handle any given situation and at any time, whether it be telephone, inter-communication,

public address, guest's call system, as well as being available to residents in the lounge area and to the public. There is 24 hour nursing service.

The all stainless steel kitchen and colorful dining room are located in the west wing. Here special attention is given to such diets as may be recommended by the physician.

Directly behind the nurse's control station is the drug room where medications are carefully stored and dispensed upon order of the guest's physician. There is also adequate storage for additional medical supplies. A separate treatment room will provide the guest with complete privacy when so indicated by the doctor or nursing staff.

A fully equipped beauty room featuring a trained beautician is available for the resident. Here too the gentlemen may secure barbering services. Both the beautician and shop will be licensed in order to comply with state regulations.

Although it will not be completed until spring, a spacious patio is centered between the three wings. Plans are for it to be concrete, lighted and equipped with several types of lawn furniture and which may be used for just relaxation or outdoor parties. The area is enclosed on all sides giving good protection from the weather.

Dahl pointed out that residents have the privilege of selecting their own physician, their own clergyman and enjoying the same privileges that they would in their home, except in cases of a standard policy of the Center. "The rights and privileges of the individual are respected," he said.

Mindful of the health of its residents, all guests upon admission are expected to have a physical examination by their own physician, as are all employees, to make certain they are not carriers of any infectious or contagious disease.

Special attention has been given to the excellent communication system throughout both buildings. Besides the interior-exterior telephone lines, a public address unit will aid in locating someone almost instantaneously. It is also used for "live" church broadcasts from the local churches every Sunday, as well as other special programs. A turntable can provide soft music during their leisure hours.

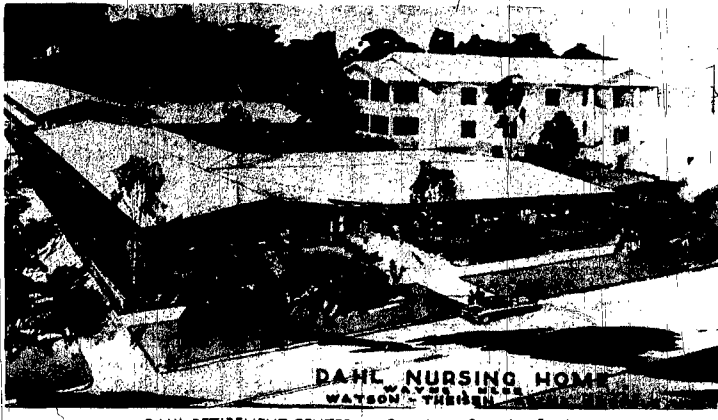
Summing up the features of the new unit, Dahl explained that "we recognize the need of provisions for the enrichment of life in the retirement years and that it must lead to vigorous action, intelligently directed, and taking into consideration every wish and desire of those we serve."

Unlike some nursing or retirement homes around the country, the Dahl Retirement Center will care for their residents when they become ill, bedridden or requiring convalescent care. This way they will not have to go to a hospital unless so ordered by the physician, individual, or family.

"If we were to require our guests to go to a hospital when they become ill or bedfast, we would then defeat the purpose of a true nursing home," Dahl pointed out.

"No longer can nursing homes be considered as isolated health units in a community giving little more than custodial care. We are gaining steadily in community respect because we are demonstrating more vigorously on the basis of improved services through self-education that we are prepared to meet increasing demands placed upon us and on a high and dignified professional level. That is why we ourselves have been major factors in transforming nursing home activities from an aura of suspicion to one of admiration and proud regard," Dahl said.

The management and staff of the Dahl Retirement Center is now delighted to offer to the Senior citizens of this area a most gracious way of living right in their own home town area and with friends who will care for them.

## Center Reflects 31 Years In Nursing Home Experience

Clifford M. Dahl, owner and administrator of the Dahl Retirement Center, came to Wayne November 1, 1918, when he purchased the Dr. S. A. Lutgen hospital and immediately converted it to a nursing home for the aged and in firm.

After many years of experience in various fields of medical and hospital work in California, Dahl saw the need for greater concentration in the proper care, treatment and housing of our fast growing aging population.

Deciding to return to the middle west, he surveyed the area and reached a decision to locate in Wayne because of its excellent location in Northeast Nebraska as well as being "a good business town."

It proved exactly that by a heavy flow of admissions to the nursing home and the establishment of a wide reputation in the care of the aged. The older unit has a bed capacity of 41 and is licensed by the Hospital Division of the State Board of Health.

Looking into the future for the expansion of facilities, two years ago Dahl began drafting plans for an ultra modern unit which would include even greater conveniences to the people of Wayne and the surrounding area.

The result is a 25 bed addition that is designed to allow for expansion in a few years when a decision may be reached to remove the older building.

Dahl pointed out that it will continue to operate as is, but that there are immediate plans for a "complete facelifting" and added features.

In 1947-48 Dahl noted that many so-called nursing homes were a disgrace to society. He immediately began setting the machinery in motion for the organization of state associations for the purpose of establishing and maintaining certain high standards of care in the nursing home field, enactment of good, sound licensing laws and their enforcement, as well as a strong, vigorous educational and public relations program.

Following his organization of many state groups, Dahl began conferring with their elected officers for the purpose of setting up plans for a national association.

tion, which now has thousands of members, and headquarters are located at Washington, D. C.

He served as their first secretary for two terms, was general chairman of the first national convention and was then elevated to the presidency where he also served for two years. He has been elected president of the Nebraska Nursing Home Association for four years and has been chairman of many committees, both state and national, as well as once being editor of their national publication.

For one year he was national consultant to the Division of Civilian Health Requirements, representing the entire nursing home profession.

Born and raised in Brookings County, South Dakota, Dahl went to San Diego, California, in 1931 where he was graduated from the U. S. Naval Hospital Corps School.

Upon expiration of enlistment he continued in the hospital and sanitarium field and gradually elevated himself to responsible supervisory positions and was superintendent of a large sanitarium before coming to Wayne.

Although he is quick to confess that at one time he wouldn't have traded a square foot of California for the entire midwest, he now equally admits that the situation has completely reversed itself.

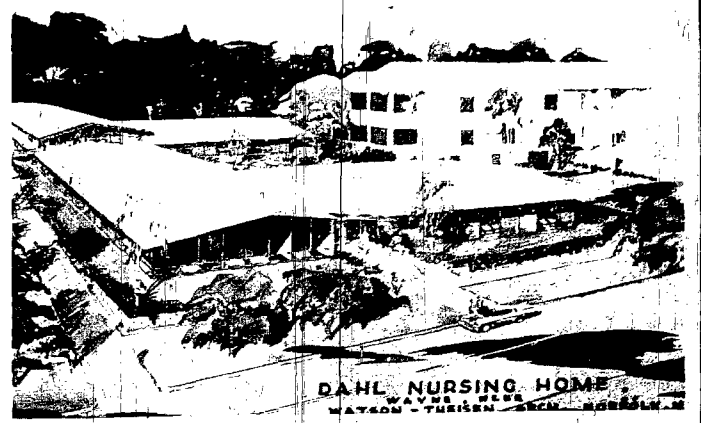

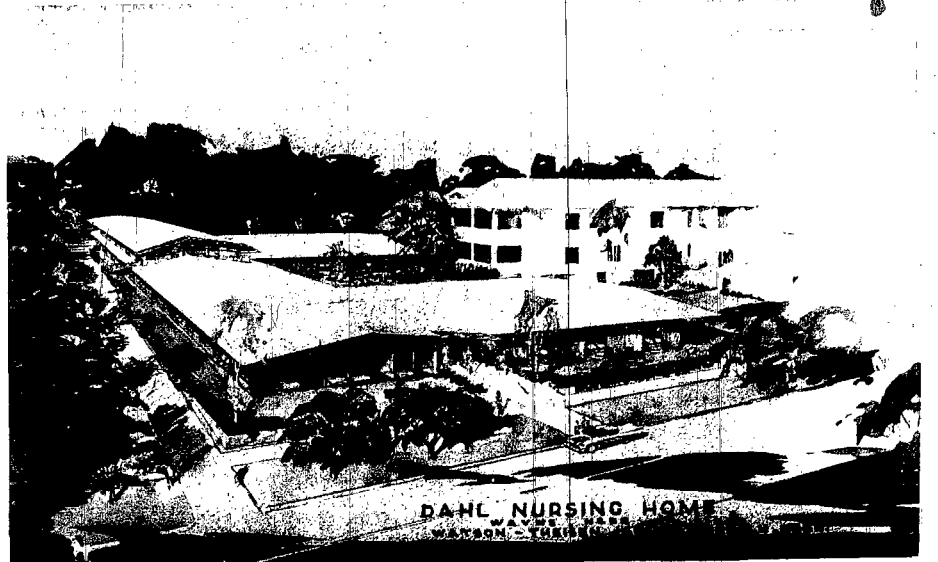

## 9,000 Additional Square Feet

Located between 9th and 10th on Main street, the new unit of the Dahl Retirement Center, a U-shaped building of superstructure steel and concrete masonry, covers an area of over 9,000 square feet and is located on the property just south of the old building. The main entrance faces the east.

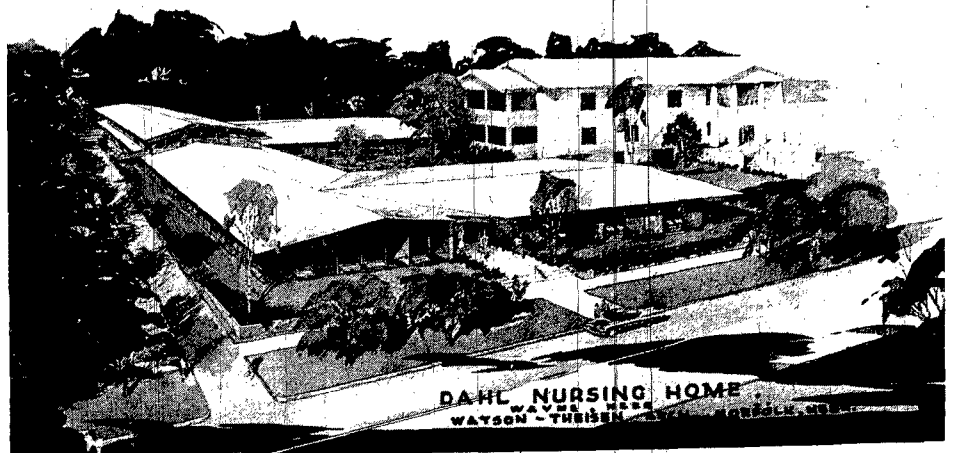
The ultra-modern structure will accommodate 25 residents in rooms consisting of 13 singles and 6 doubles. Adjoining each room are semi-private toilet facilities except for a few rooms where there is private stool and lavatory.

The color scheme of all rooms was carefully chosen to blend with the Danish-Modern furniture. Guest rooms feature high-low beds, three and four drawer dressers and lounging chairs. There is also a spacious clothes closet.

Ceilings throughout the entire building are suspended with acoustical knock-out panels. Floors are of 100% Vinal Asbestos with a rubber base.

On the second floor and to the west is the Dahl apartment which is linked by telephone to all departments in the old and new units. There is 1,800 square feet of floor space consisting of living and dining rooms, two bedrooms, kitchen, bath, utility room and large hallway. Facing the east is a spacious patio with deck furniture and an outside stairway.

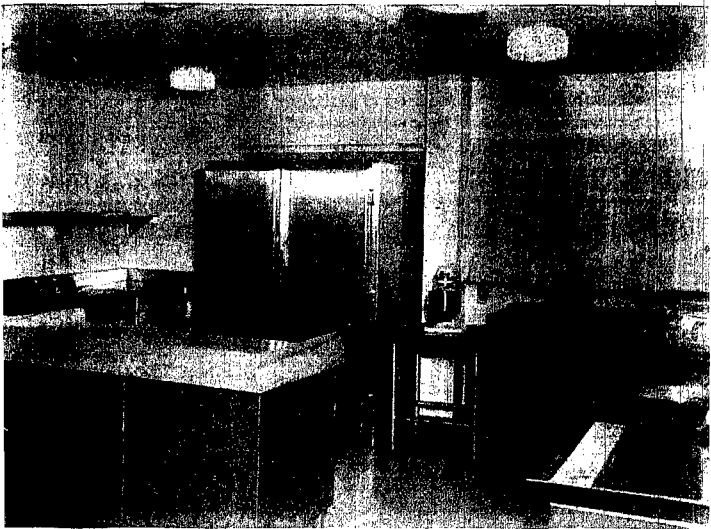

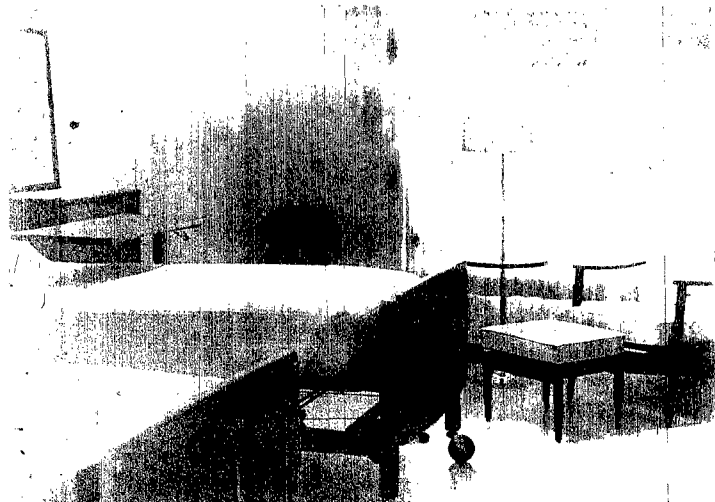

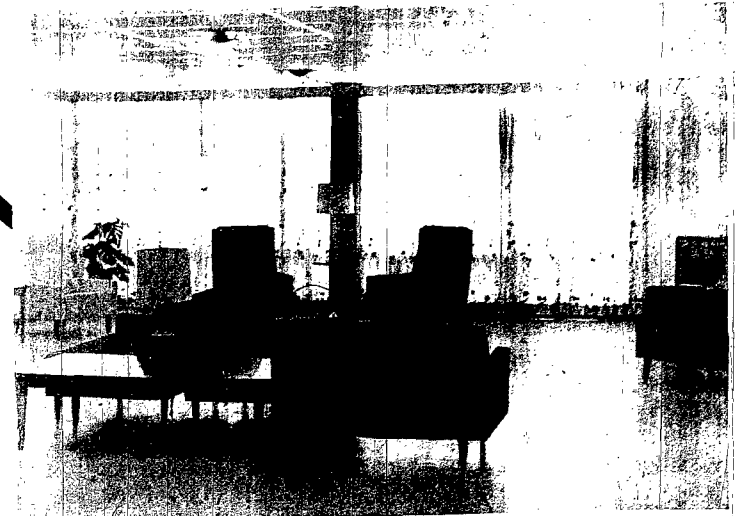
