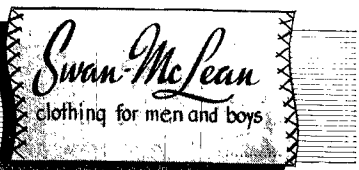





Wayne reached the St. Mary 13 in the third period, lost a touchdown early in the fourth on a clipping penalty, then reached pay dirt on a 65-yard drive aided by three Cavalier infractions costing 25 yards. Matthies exploded through the line for the final six yards, and Shimoda kicked the conversion.

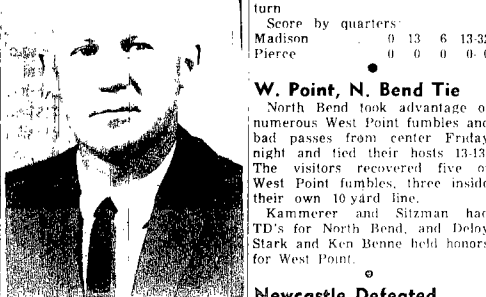


'Cats Face Defending NCC Champ Kearney Saturday

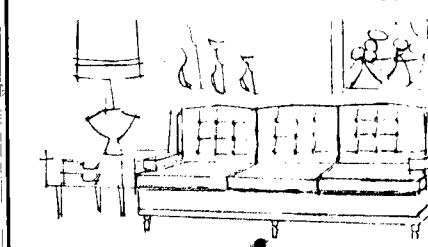

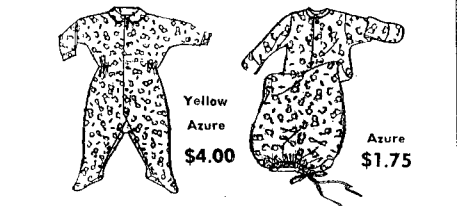

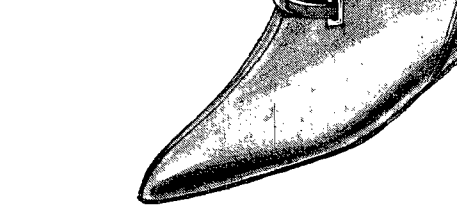

The tandem axle limit of 32,000 pounds would remain unchanged. A slight increase would be made in the 73,280-pound gross weight limit.

According to Hossack, the increases would not require major overhauling of Nebraska laws. In some cases, Nebraska statutes already exceed the proposed new maximums.

The road width increase, Hossack said, would pose problems on any pavement less than 24 feet wide under the new maximums; highways would wear out a little faster and maintenance costs would go up slightly, the state engineer said.

Recently, Patrick Horschbrugh, a University of Nebraska professor, said sculptor Pranta Belsky, London, wants to construct a statue of Churchill and ship it to this country as a memorial of Winne's U. S. citizenship.

At that time Morrison was thinking about getting into the race for chief justice of the Nebraska Supreme Court.

The governor said that "no officer of the federal government is ever going to tell me what to do politically or otherwise."

Members of the board will draft recommendations and action on them will be taken soon.

The policy statement will be sent to all public power districts in the state.

William Norton, Osceola, board vice chairman, said the board has an obligation of "making it plain that we won't allow overlapping of facilities."

He added that the policy statement should point out generally that the board will not permit intrusion by one district into another's established service area.

Clair Callan, Odell, board chairman, said he believes there is some misunderstanding among the districts on how to draw up service area agreements.

He based his prediction on new recommendations being considered by the American Association of State Highway Officials for uniform truck weight, length, width and height.

Most states are now close to the limits recommended by the association in 1946 which were later adopted by Congress for use on federal roads.

Home Economics Day For Homemakers. Plan now to attend Home Economics Day for Homemakers, Oct. 8, 1963, 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., College of Agriculture-Campus.

Quick Dill Pickles. A new way of making dill pickles has been developed by U.S. Department of Agriculture food specialists, according to Kathryn Costey, Extension food and nutrition specialist at the University of Nebraska.

This fresh pack method changes cucumbers into crisp, tangy pickles without requiring the usual 3 to 6 week fermentation period. Flavor of the dills is excellent though slightly different from fermented dills, according to the specialist.

Scientists, who have been studying home preservation methods for pickling fruits and vegetables, find that adequate processing in a boiling water bath destroys spoilage microorganisms and inactivated enzymes that cause off-flavors.

Here's how you can make 7 quarts of dill pickles (packed 7 to 10 per jar).

Fresh-Pack Dill Pickles: 17-18 pounds cucumbers, 3 to 5 inches long. About 2 gallons 5-percent brine (3 4 cup pure granulated salt per gallon of water) 6 cups vinegar 3 4 cup salt, pure granulated 1 1/2 cup sugar 9 cups water 2 tablespoons whole mixed pickling spice. Whole mustard seed, 2 teaspoons per quart jar.

Garlic, if desired, 2 cloves per quart. Dill plant (fresh or dried), 3 heads per quart jar.

Wash cucumbers thoroughly with vegetable brush. Drain. Cover with the 5-percent brine (3 4 cup salt per gallon of water). Let set overnight. Drain.

Combine vinegar, salt, sugar, water and mixed pickling spices tied in a clean, white cloth; heat to boiling. Pack cucumbers into clean, hot, quart jars. Add mustard seeds, dill heads or seed, and garlic to each jar; cover with boiling brine to within 1/2 inch of top of jar. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water for

20 minutes. (This is for altitudes less than 1,000 feet above sea level.) Count processing time as soon as hot jars are placed into the actively boiling water.

Remove jars and complete seals if necessary. Set jars upright, several inches apart, on a wire rack to cool.

Homemaking Briefs: To clean off melted synthetic — such as nylon — on an iron, heat the iron to only slightly warm. Rub the soleplate lightly with a steel wool soap pad that has been dampened with acetone. Wipe soleplate clean with damp cloth or paper towels. Repeat if necessary.

Acetone is available at most drug stores. It is also the base of ordinary nail polish remover.
