## Rev. John Voth, New Minister for Wayne Presbyterian Church

A new minister will be in the pulpit of Wayne's United Presbyterian Church Sunday. He is the Rev. John W. Voth, who comes from a seven-year pastorate at Maple Plain, in his native state, Minnesota. The change of pastors is the first for Wayne Presbyterians since Dr. Oliver B. Proffitt came in March, 1943. He announced his resignation early this year to accept the position of administrator of the new Clark Jeary Home in Lincoln, a Nebraska Presbyterian home for senior citizens, expected to open next month. The Rev. Mr. Voth (his name is pronounced Vawth) was a 1956 graduate of Princeton Seminary after earning his bachelor's degree at the University of Minnesota and his high school diploma at Windom, Minn. Rev. and Mrs. Voth have a daughter, Sherree Lea, 6, and a son, Shawn, 4. Rev. Voth has had varied experience—in farming, lithography, sales, group therapy and Scouting (he was a scoutmaster). He even served two years as a justice of the peace. The Voths arrived this week and moved into the Presbyterian manse, which has been redecorated in recent weeks. The Proffitts, living temporarily on Hillcrest road, will move to the Jeary Home when their living accommodations are finished soon.

# Fewer Farmers, Fewer Towns Seen; RAD Seeking Answers

## Wayne Countians Learn of Area Development Measure

"Rural America can look forward to fewer farmers, fewer rural townspeople, smaller towns, some towns being eliminated completely, fewer banks, fewer businesses generally in the rural areas sometime in the next five to 15 years and there is absolutely nothing that can be done about it." With this prediction as setting the stage, nearly 100 Wayne County farmers, residents and businessmen met in Carroll last Wednesday to learn more about the Rural Areas Development (RAD) program. RAD is a nation-wide effort supported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture which is designed to help local groups, state agencies and private organizations develop the total resources of their area. As a result of the meeting a temporary development committee was established to examine the question, "Does Wayne County have underdeveloped resources?"

Gordon Nuernberger, Wakefield, was elected chairman of the committee with the members including Lynn Everingham, Wakefield; Lynn Roberts, Carroll; Werner Janke, Winside; Dr. N. L. Ditman, Winside; Adon Jeffrey, Wayne and C. W. Comstock, Wayne. Vince Rossiter, Hartington banker, was the evening's first speaker. His statement (as related in the first paragraph) was a direct quote made by officers and economists of the Federal Reserve Banks, advisors of the Upper Midwest Development Corporation and representatives from the University of Minnesota. Marvin Sather, Extension Agent working in central Nebraska, described experiences from his six years of work in the Rural Development field. According to him, "development means looking ahead to the most likely course of events in the future. You should

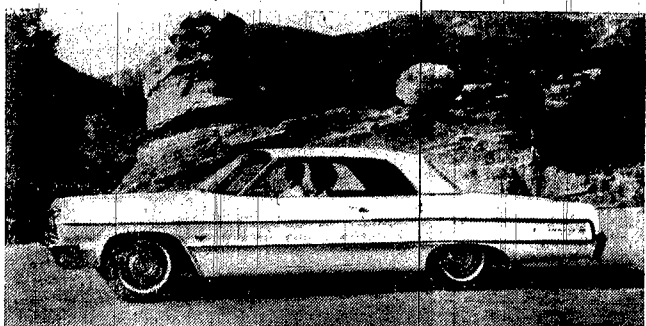

**ECTOPIC PREGNANCY**  
Q. What is an ectopic pregnancy and how often does it occur?  
A. Ectopic pregnancy refers to any pregnancy outside the uterine cavity. The majority of such pregnancies are located in the fallopian tube (tubal pregnancy). Normally, the fertilized ovum travels the tube and implants itself in the uterine wall. In tubal pregnancy the fertilized ovum attaches itself to the tube. The wall of the tube is thin and sooner or later the tube ruptures. The latest figures we have on the incidence of ectopic pregnancy come from New York City, where there were 34 ectopic pregnancies per 10,000 live births in 1957.

**WHITISH "SLEEPERS"**  
Q. What causes the white discharge which collects at the corners of the eyes?  
A. White secretions which accumulate at the corners of the eyes are mucous and eyelid secretions, together with dust and other debris, cleared away by the eyelid movements. A moderate amount of whitish material isn't cause for alarm.
