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



go along with the tegistature's budget committee recommendations on pay raises. At its most recent meeting, the board decided State Education Commissioner Floyd Miller should be raised \$1,500 annually to \$14,000. Miller's top assistants were given hikes of \$1,000 a year.

After agreeing on that action, board members did some adjusting and slimmed by 1.8 per cent the 10,53 per cent raises proposed by the education department for its professional employees. Their final figures represented an upward pay adjustment of just under five per cent a year on the average for the professional staffers. This was more than the budget committee had recommended.

Deputy Commissioner Stan Hawley, among those who received a \$1,000 jump, presented some facts and figures to the board before it began discussion of the proposed raises. Hawley said that projecting salaries on the basis of the budget committee's thinking was difficult at times. He said: that in some cases it was hard to figure out just what the committee had in mind. According to Hawley, some of the salaries paid "will earn money for us." He was referring to funds coming to the stafe from the federal government because of services staff members perform in connection with federal programs. This brings in about \$50,000 a biennium.

More Power Needed

A subcommittee of the Ne-braskar Public Power Committee (NPPC) says the state will need another 938,000 kilowatts of pow-er to meet needs by 1972. It was estimated it would cost between \$180 and \$200 million to construct the facilities to generate the much additional power. Making the cost-estimate was Clair Cal-lan, Odell, chairman of the state power review board for whom the report was prepared by the subcommittee.

The report, given to a gather-ing of approximately 75 power officials, estimated new firm resources required by 1967 would total 200,090 kilowatts and by 1970 would climb to 629,000 kilo-watts. The computations grew 1970 would climb to 529,000 kilo-watts. The computations grew out of a request to the subcommittee to make a survey of Nebraska electrical peak loads, and the resources used to supply these loads for the 1859-83 period. The study group was also directed to make peak load and resources estimates for 1964 through 1972. Delivering the report was R. D. McWha, North Platte, consulting engineer for the Platte Valley Public Power and Irrigation District.

1. Selection of crops and livestock which have the hest profit possibility for his farm.

2. Doing an effective job with whatever type of farm enterprise is selected.

The cropping program is a key to the success of most Nebraska farms because the income in most casess is either from the sale of crops, or from the sale of drops, or from the sale of fivence which consume the farm-grown feed.

In cases where enough eropalant is available to provide most of the needed income, the farmier must select crops best suited to the land, local climate and the prevailing market. Alt hough farm programs and problems farm programs and problems

or the tain, local climate and life prevailing market. Alt hough farm programs and problems of surplus production limit crop choices of many Nebraska farmers, some important choices still remain

surpus production limit crop choices of many Nebraska fairners, some important choices still remain.

On many Nebraska farms, particularly in the eastern portion of the state, crops alone do not provide enough income. In this event, farmers usually turn to a livestock project that fits income needs, labor supply and available capital; then build a cropping system which supports the individual livestock program.

Most livestock programs require substantial outlays of both capital and tabor requirements of various projects.

Dairying still requires high labor outlays in spite of modern equipment and mechanization.

ern equipment and mechanization.

Most beef cattle projects require extensive amounts of both land and capital.

Hogs tend to fit in where large quantities of feed grain can readily be produced or purchased to advantage.

Farmers need to take an inventory of their resources—capital, land, labor and management skills—in seeking a cripping or livestock project with the potential to meet income needs.
