Uich wist varns tend to in-crease durability and elasticity in knits for longer life with less sag and stretch. Two threads twisted together are botter than one and this is called "ply". The technique of plying can improve the perform-ance of yarn in knits. It means that less twist is needed to give substance rather than thinness to the knit without sacrificing softness. The tightness of the knit is an important factor ins controlling a potential problem called "pill"

sourcess. The tightness of the knit is an important factor ins controlling a potential problem called "fill-ing" — when shall, loosely-twisted fibers work themselves free on the knit's surface. Khit-ting tension and length of stilch are also important in a fabric's tightness. If you see a fine guage knit that is slightly fussy, thin and loosely-knit, you will know that it is not top quality merchan-dise.



 Farmers can plan on most grain sorghum hybrids grown in Nebraska developing the maximum amount of dry matter in 40 to 45 days after heading and blooming. However, additional blooming. However, additional meeded to dry grain to the proper level for combine h arter. Moisture content will likely be 30 to 35 per contact and the second seco



likely be 30 to 35 per cent after a 40 to 45 day interval from the heading stage. Grain sorghum can be com-bined for artificial drying at 18 to 20 per cent moisture. If this to be binned directly from the combine, grain moisture con-tent should be down to 13 per cent before it is cut. **Protect Trees from Rabbits Now Rabbits**, numerous in Nebras-ka gardens, orchards and lawn areas, are stepping up their food as fall approaches. And they will be nibbiling away, at farmers' and city dwellers' trees and shrubs this winter unless certain precaulions are taken early Either mechanical or chemical repellents are avail-able to protect trees or shrubs from rabbits. If the area is small, a wire mesh fence can be built. This is expensive and takes time, but is very effective. Wire mesh can be built around trunks of trees or chicken wire fence built around lawn shrubs. A metal product is also available that will protect trees and shrubs from ganging cotontails. Made from aluminum foil much like that used in wrapping food for the refrigerator, it's light, easy to use and will not cut or scratch the skint. And, it needs no outside support. Poisons in any form or applied by any method are not recom-mended for rabbit control. How-ever, chemical repellents are poison-ous and require safe use and storage. Now is the time for persons with new windbreaks to give

storage. Now is the time for persons with new windbreaks to give some thought to protecting them. Cottontail rabbits live in a ra-dius of ¼ to ½ mile of where they are born. They are not great travelers, and are not likely to be found traveling across open fields or along ex-posed fence rows.



Preserve Hang Tags D Leather Garments Jackets, raincoats and other garments frequently combine suede, smooth grain leather and simulated leather with knit and woven fabrics.
