Laurel Voters Defeat \$35,000 Bond Issue

Laurel — Laurel voters defeated a \$35,000 bond issue Friday with only 368 votes cast.

The special municipal election was held to determine whether or not the Village of Laurel would issue \$35,000 worth of negotiable bonds for the purchase of about 51 acres of land for a nine hole golf course.

The 368 total vote showed 188 for the issue and 180 against. A 60 percent margin was needed to carry the election.

WSC Enrollment at 1,799 Largest Increase Noted

Wayne State enrollment mounted to 1,799 today, an all-time record, Dr. Kenneth Browne, acting registrar announced.

The figure represents a gain of 259 over last fall's 1,540—largest increase of any state college in Nebraska. The gain is almost 17 percent. Kearney State increased 255 to a total of 2,510 this fall.

Before registration, Wayne officials estimated enrollment might rise to about 1,700. Thus the actual number substantially exceeded expectations.

The 1,799 figure includes all college students, including those enrolled in night classes.

WSC Faculty Members Attend Hastings Meet

Three members of the Wayne State education faculty attended a conference of the Nebraska section of the Association for Student Teaching at Hastings Saturday.

Representing Wayne were Dr. B. E. Ross, George DeBow and Harvard McLean. All other Nebraska colleges and universities and several public schools also sent representatives.

The Wayne men reported excellent discussions on the philosophy and practice of directed teaching for future teachers.

Normal Board Closes Hahn School Effective in 1964

School Study Group Progresses as Entire Area Comes in Study

The central steering committee of the Citizens' School Study Committee met last Tuesday evening at 9 p. m. with Bob Bergt, chairman, presiding. Representatives of the five subcommittees reported that committee membership had grown considerably over the last month with additional citizens in the area volunteering to join the study.

Reports were given on the activities of various subcommittees. The Program and Staff committee reported making a study of various rural school curricula, ascertaining how much teaching time is allotted to various subjects for each grade. Committee members had also visited Carroll and Wayne elementary schools and the Wausa, Osmond, and Wakefield units.

The Area and Population committee has compiled figures on population clusters in order to determine where rural attendance centers could provide an adequate program at an economical rate.

The committee discussed the idea that one of the fears of parents in considering redistricting is the fear that their small children in the primary grades will have to ride school buses for lengthy periods of time.

Leon Meyer chairman, had received a letter explaining the setup of a unit district in Illinois which maintains five attendance centers within its 200 square mile district.

The Building and Equipment committee reported that they planned to make a survey of equipment and buildings both in rural areas and in District 17.

The Finance group has compiled evaluations and is studying disparities in those evaluations and in per pupil costs. As laid down in the 1963 law passed by the legislature, one of the purposes of any redistricting plan shall be the removal of inequalities in per pupil valuation, thereby assuring equal opportunities for all children in the area.

The central committee set October 15 as the completion deadline for each subcommittee to prepare its report on the study of the first question under consideration by all five committees: "What is the present condition in our particular area of study?" The next question is "See SCHOOL — Page 8"

Normal Board Closes Hahn School Effective in 1964

Hahn School will close at the end of the current school year, the people of Wayne learned Friday. The Wayne State campus school will close, the State Normal Board decided Thursday.

Elementary schools at Chadron State and Kearney State also will close. Peru State's K-12 school will continue to operate since it is the town's only school and is partially supported by the school district.

Hahn's junior and senior high grades were discontinued in 1962, a year after the closing of Chadron Prep's junior senior high.

The Normal Board in its decision, offered the use of the Hahn school, through July 1965, if the city school boards need the facilities.

Hahn school currently has about 145 pupils in kindergarten through sixth grade.

Two major factors influenced the Normal Board's decision. Board Secretary Albin Larson explained. The closing will mean a substantial cash saving. In addition, the state colleges are sending more and more of their students into nearby public schools for practice teaching.

Since Hahn High closed, college students preparing to teach have done their directed teaching in Nebraska and Iowa high schools. Now similar arrangements will be made.

Nebraska Servicers for Crippled Children are planning a clinic Saturday in Norfolk at the State Hospital in cooperation with the Elks Association.

Registration is from 7:30 to 10:30 a. m. Doctors will begin examinations at 8 a. m. An orthopedic team, consisting of Dwight W. Burney, M. D. orthopedist, and Otto G. Rath, pediatrician, will examine children in the following diagnostic categories: orthopedic handicaps, cerebral palsy, cleft plate and hare lip.

The Elks Lodge will furnish a noon lunch for all children and their families who are registered for the clinic examinations.

Elsie's job as a "hello girl" will always remind her of the different calls that she has completed. She likes to remember the calls that related good news but there were messages of sadness. Miss Novak can tell of many different experiences that happened during her career as a telephone girl.

She recalls the time a teen-age boy was stranded on a train during a railroad strike and how his parents were worried about his welfare. Another vivid incident was the wandering away of a 2-year-old youngster from his farm home. Then too, there were two bomber crashes which occurred near Wayne exactly a year apart during World War II. She was alone on duty those fateful Sundays and directed assistance to the unfortunate crewmen. An "Extra special" busy day in her experiences were those of VE and VJ day along with the death of President F. D. Roosevelt.

Elsie's job of "The voice with a smile" has ended, but through her mingling with folks over the line, her life has been enriched, and Elsie says that she will always cherish all the memorable and every day events of her telephone career. Miss Novak is not content with full retirement and she has accepted a position at the Soil Conservation Office in Wayne. She plans to pursue her hobbies of adding to her collection of more than 300 miniature dogs, embroidery and other handiwork. Her most pursued hobby is that of writing words of encouragement and cheer to shut-ins and the ill.

Research Council Thinks Tax Studies Are Valuable

LINCOLN — Have the many taxation studies made by legislative council interim committees in the past quarter century done much good?

The Nebraska Tax Research Council, a privately financed research organization, recently reviewed the 19 taxation studies made and concluded that anyone reading all of them "is due for a surprise in the field of sales and income taxes."

The Council said that since the subject of tax broadening triggers "a bitter fight" nearly every time the lawmakers gather in session, many studies could be expected. It noted, however, that only one "short and inconclusive" study in 1962 dealt exclusively with these taxes.

The most belabored subjects, according to the Council, have been enforcement and administration and then added that these same areas are due to be looked into again prior to the 1965 legislature.

The research organization said its study led to the conclusion that the interim taxation committees have had "little more influence on tax legislation than any other voice in Nebraska."

If studies are made at all by interim committees they should be exhaustive and should invariably contain conclusions and recommendations, the research council said. It also endorsed minority reports when controversy exists.

Also suggested was that legislative bills should be introduced at the first session after a committee makes a report, thus guaranteeing the subjects will be considered in the legislature. This would make sure that the time and cost of the study group will not have been wasted, the council said.

Still another recommendation was that the terms of the resolution leading to creation of a study committee be followed "without deviation."

Some Political Talk

There was a bit of political talk in the air in recent days when former Gov. Val Pefferson acknowledged that he had been approached about the possibility of again running for governor.

He said a number of persons from Omaha, Lincoln, and some other places have asked him to give the idea of returning to the political wars "consideration."

Peterson, 60, is a former three-term governor. He said he is giving his friends' suggestion some thought but that he would not make any definite commitment at this time.

Most political observers believe there will be little gubernatorial electioneering until after Governor Morrison makes known his plans.

It has been freely predicted that if Morrison should decide to step down as the state's chief executive there would be plenty of candidates. Morrison is described by most political observers as an astute politician who would be difficult to unseat should he shoot for a third term.

Morrison has announced he will disclose his plan in early November.

FDIC Members

Only six of Nebraska's state chartered banks have not yet become members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC).

State banking director Ralph Misiko noted that a law passed by the 1963 legislature requires all banks coming under the jurisdiction of his department to either be members of the FDIC or carry a \$1 million fidelity bond within one year of the effective date of the act, which will be Oct. 19.

The bill stemmed from the shortage of approximately \$500,000 discovered last year at the Gresham State Bank, which was not a member of the FDIC.

At the time the discovery was made, there were 25 state chartered banks without the FDIC protection which covers each account up to a sum of \$10,000.

The State Power Review Board has recessed a hearing in a rate dispute between Consumers Public Power District (CPPD) and the Nebraska Public Power System (NPPS) until Oct. 7.

The continuation was made necessary because of scheduling conflicts of those participating in the hearing.

Consumers had rested its case in its challenge of NPPS wholesale rates, and R. D. McWha of North Platte, NPPS chief witness, had finished his preliminary testimony when the recess was granted. McWha is a consulting engineer.

Hastings Depot

Money may be available from the Federal government for development of part of the Hastings naval Ammunition Depot as a child diagnostic center.

State director of institutions George Morris says he has been advised that buildings at the depot will be kept intact and can be taken over by the state in about a year unless some federal agency puts in a bid first.

Morris and Dr. Harold Abel of the University of Nebraska have been named chairman and co-chairman of a subcommittee of the governor's interagency committee on mental retardation of the proposed youth diagnostic and treatment center.

Morris said it is his understanding that the U. S. Depart-



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ment of Health, Education, and Welfare would like to see a regional youth center established at the depot, which would also serve surrounding states.

Also set up was a subcommittee named to explore the possibility of providing services and counseling to families of children on the waiting list to enter state institutions.

Specialist to Discuss Fall Fabrics on TV

Knits in Fashion This Fall

Knits are a big item in fashion again this fall. They will be found in sweaters, coats, suits and dresses and in a variety of fibers in cottons, wools, acrylics and others.

Size of fiber plays a big part in determining how a knit looks and feels. Finer yarn usually assures softness while a heavier yarn gives fabrics a crispness.

High twist yarns tend to increase durability and elasticity in knits for longer life with less sag and stretch. However, high twist yarns often reduces softness in the knit and a careful balance is necessary to achieve maximum quality.

Two threads twisted together are better than one and this is called "ply." The technique of plying can improve the performance of knits. It means that less twist is needed to give substance rather than thinness to the knit without sacrificing softness.

The tightness of the knit is an important factor in controlling a potential problem called "pilling" — when small, loosely-twisted fibers work themselves free on the knit's surface. Knitting tension and length of stitch are also important in a fabric's tightness.

If you see a fine gauge knit that is slightly fuzzy, thin and loosely-knit, you will know that it is not top quality merchandise.

Preserve Hang Tags

On Leather Garments. Jackets, raincoats and other garments frequently combine suede, smooth grain leather and simulated leather with knit and woven fabrics.

When garments need cleaning, there may be trouble from color fading or bleeding, particularly in light colored garments. The National Institute of Drycleaning suggests that a hang tag on such garments be preserved and taken with a soiled garment to the dry cleaner.

Leather items should not be allowed to become badly soiled before they are sent to the cleaner. All pieces — jacket, skirt, blouse — should be sent for cleaning at one time to avoid variation in shade. This is particularly true with garments that are piped or trimmed with genuine leather.

Before making a purchase it is wise to take into account the fact that leather trimmed garments may not dry clean well.

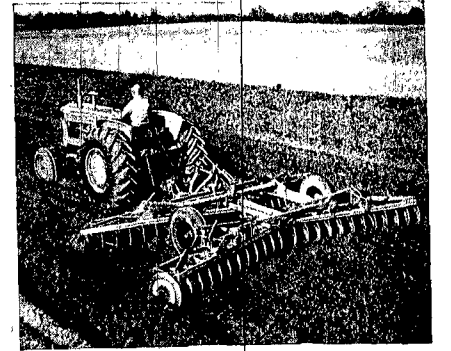

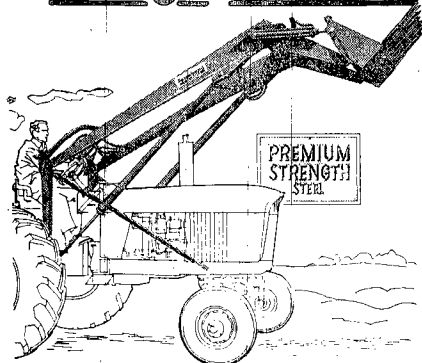

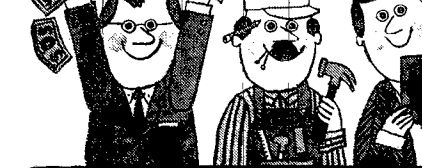
