Use Spray Starch Properly

a starch and attain the best results, shake the can before and during use.

Tilt the can only slightly while spraying. If an aerosol can is titled more than 45 degrees from the straight-up position, the pure propellent will escape. Reduced pressure means that starch will be left in the can with no way of getting out.

The nozzle should be held six to 12 inches from the fabric and the button pressed firmly. A fine spray assures even starching.
After each use, remove the spray button and wash under warm water. Replace the button so that the arrow matches the red dot.

This starch cannot always replace regular starch. However, if only a little starching—such as medded, a spray may be more convenient than regular starching.

While ironing, homemakers also find it easy to use the spray method to "touch-up" articles that have been starched unevenly.

What Price for 4-H Feeder Calves

No one exceeds the optin of 4-H beef calf feeders. I cently attended a 4-H feeder

years should be belifful in planning 1964 projects.

About half the calves started on feed cach year will make it to the fall shows. Standards for ribbon platings vary widely. In general the policy has been to be far more liberal at county and local shows. Our ratio of success over the years as measured by ribbon awards at State and major shows has been about this based on per cent of calves started on feed: Purple ribbon awards 2 to 3% and blue ribbon awards 2 to 3% and blue ribbon awards 2 to 3% and blue ribbon awards 8 to 12%. In other words, we have come to expect that 10 to 15% of the calves started on feed will end up in blue and purple ribbon groups at big shows.

We have observed little relationship between prices paid for feeder calves and final placings at the shows. Practically all calves started on feed are carefully selected as feeding prospects. An extremely small percent of calves started on feed become top show prospects.

The chance of selecting major show winner at starting time

The chance of selecting a major show winner at starting time is to remote to warrant paying premiums for so many calves. I feel that far too much importance is attached to ribbon placing.

Of far more practical import-ance are first cost, feed costs, rate of gain and final weight. Ex-perience indicates 4-H members should expect to increase the weight of calves about 600 pounds in a 300-day feeding period. Recent data shows the average feed cent data shows the average feed cost per pound gain has been about 17 cents. These costs vary widely among our 4-H feeders, generally tending higher. There are, of course, other costs in-volved, such as interest on investment, veterinary expense, trans-portation, use of equipment, risk of death loss and time and labor






