Community Chest Drive Heads for \$84,000 Goal

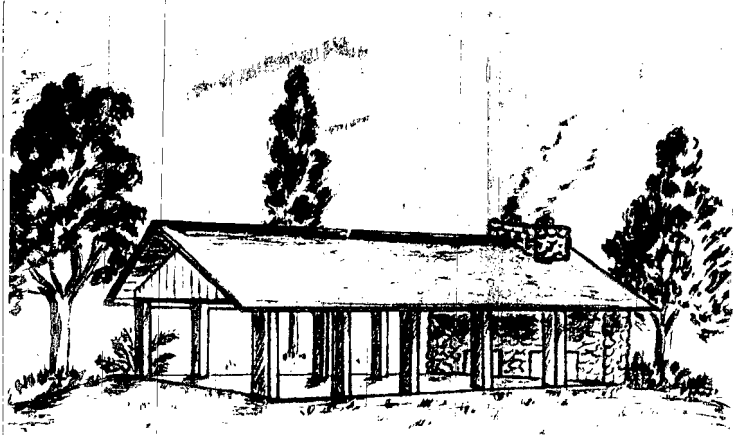

Single Point Dampens WS Homecoming Game Spirit

Nebraska Wesleyan excelled in one respect Saturday and thereby won a football game, despite Wayne superiority in all the statistics.

By the margin of one extra point kick, the visiting Plainsmen dumped Wayne, 19-18, before a homecoming crowd of about 3,500. For the second straight week Wayne fumbled a fumble first half, only to steam back in the second. However, the Wildcats pulled a head the previous week in downing Chadron, but against Wesleyan two last-quarter touchdowns went for naught when the extra point attempt failed for the third time.

Wesleyan tallied first after intercepting Wayne pass on the Wildcat 37. Quarterback Mike Slatinsky ran or passed for all but one play in the scoring drive, going the last yard himself. The conversion kick went wide, Willis Wiesbrook kicking.

Wayne's recovery of a Wesleyan fumble set up the retaliation. On the first play of the second period Quarterback Dean deBurr lobbed a long pass to Halfback Jerry Kilcom, who raced for a 43-yard TD play.

The Plainsmen drove 88 yards for the next kickoff to score on a Mike Slatinsky to Dwight Tietgen pass for 15 yards. Slatinsky's run for the point stalled out. Seven minutes later Wesleyan struck again, capping a 41-yard effort with Bill Rohrer's two-yard plunge. Dennis Quick hoisted the point, and the half ended with Wesleyan firmly in command, 19-6.

The third quarter passed without score, although Wayne defenses began to hold, limiting Wesleyan to five yards rushing and no passing.

The fourth period was nine minutes gone when sub Quarterback Bob Schneider, backing up from the scrimmage line on Wayne's 20, heaved a mighty pass to Halfback Van Steckelberg. The fast Stanton sophomore fielded it on the run and

cluded Wesleyan's only defender for a scoring dash that pumped life into the Wayne defense. The play went 80 yards—longest of the season for the Wildcats.

Wesleyan's next effort made no headway, forcing a kick. Wayne's touchdown hopes rose as Schneider hit another pass, but exploded when his next pass was intercepted by Tietgen. Then a slugging Wayne defense produced a Wesleyan fumble, which Wayne recovered on the NWU 27.

Seconds later Fullback Burt Matthews lived up to his nickname, the Horse, and ramed 11 yards to score. For the third time crippled place kicker Pat Shimoda—ordinarily a reliable point maker—limped in for the crucial effort. It failed, and that was the game. Wayne defense in the second half held Wesleyan to 36 yards rushing, no first downs and no completed passes.

The outcome left Wayne with a 3-3 season, Wesleyan with 4-2.

ed as never before by retail merchants and manufacturers, who come out with frequent changes of fashion to lure this clothes-conscious group.

With costs as they are at present, it takes about \$800 a year, on the average, to support a 13 year old child, the figures show. The amount climbs to \$865 at age 15, goes to \$920 at age 17 and to \$955 at 19, not counting college expenses.

At the midpoint, which is at age 16 1/2, it averages \$805 a year.

This median cost, applied to Wayne County, with its teen-age population of 1,398, as last reported by the Census Bureau, gives \$1,265,000 as the total amount that is spent on them per year.

For the individual teen-ager, according to the Department of Agriculture, the biggest item is food, which averages \$450 a year. Another \$275 or so goes for clothes and the remainder for housing, medical care and miscellaneous expenditures.

All in all, the teenager market has become an economic force and, in addition, the fastest growing one in the nation.

The latest figures reveal that the number of teen-agers is increasing at 3 1/2 times the rate of the rest of the population, reflecting the high birth rate that followed the last war.

The expectation is, as a result, that Wayne County's teen-age population in 1968 will be 30 percent above the 1960 total.

The figure is arrived at through studies and surveys made by the Department of Agriculture, the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Gilbert Youth Research organization and others.

They show that nearly \$1 billion is spent annually by the nation's teen-agers.

Scholarships for Seniors

Fred Rickers, principal, Wayne City Schools, has announced that all 1965 graduates of Wayne City Schools who wish to enter the 1964-65 National Merit Scholarship competition should register now at the school office.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be given in the school at 9 a.m., Tuesday, March 10 (or Saturday, March 14), 1964.

Students who will complete secondary school in 1965 and enter college in the same calendar year are eligible for scholarship consideration in the 1964-65 Merit Program.

To receive consideration, the student must take the test when it is offered in school. Participating students pay a \$1.00 fee on the day of the test. Any interested student who is unable to pay the fee should consult Mr. Rickers.

Awards in the Merit Program are granted on the basis of intellectual merit, but student financial needs determine the amount of individual stipends. The stipends are renewable each year without further testing.

Mr. Rickers said a student's performance on the qualifying test also provides him with information that is useful in career planning or in selecting courses in high school and college.

After the test, each participating student receives a Handbook for Merit Program Participants, prepared by Science Research Associates, the testing agency. The Handbook is designed to help students understand their individual test results, to make comparisons with scores of high school students across the country, and to use this information in making educational and vocational plans. Therefore, Mr. Rickers said, students can learn more about their education strengths and weaknesses, whether or not they plan to attend college. In addition to the awards made

Bigger Gain Locally In Children's Health

Marked gains in child health have been achieved in Wayne County over a 12-year period, according to the latest Government figures.

As a result, a baby born in the local area today has a much better chance of weathering his first year of life and of coping with the hazards of early childhood than did his father and mother, when they were born.

Special interest attaches to the matter of infant mortality at this time because of the recent loss of the Kennedy baby, shortly after birth.

The nationwide figures, released by the National Office of Vital Statistics, reveal that there has been a drop of 52.4 percent since 1948 in the mortality rate among Wayne County children under the age of one.

At that time, exclusive of still births and deaths of non-residents, 18.5 out of every 1,000 local children died before reaching their first birthday.

By way of comparison, the figures show that the rate had been

brought down to 8.8 per 1,000 by 1960.

Throughout the rest of the country, the infant death rate varies over a wide range. The state with the best record is Utah, with a rate of 19.6 for every 1,000 live births. Lowest on the list is Mississippi, with 41.6. Alaska is next, with 40.5. The United States average is 26.0. For the West North Central States it is 23.0.

While great progress has been made over the years in reducing the toll, there is still a long way to go, points out the report.

We now lag behind 10 other nations, notably the Netherlands, and Norway with 18.9, Australia, 19.5 and the United Kingdom, 22.1. Those with poorer records than ours include Japan, Canada and Germany.

According to Mrs. Katherine B. Oettinger, chief of the U.S. Children's Bureau, inadequate prenatal care is a major factor in our failure to reduce infant mortality more rapidly.

The 52.4 percent reduction recorded in Wayne County in a period of 12 years is relatively good. It compares favorably with the 18.7 percent drop in the United States and with the 18.1 drop in the West North Central States.

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Bethany Church Marks 75th Year of Service in Area

The Bethany Presbyterian Church, Carroll, celebrated its seventy-fifth anniversary Sunday, September 8.

Bethany Presbyterian Church had its origin in a Welsh Sunday School which was organized in 1884 by early Welsh pioneers who settled in this area of Wayne County. The first to arrive were the Thomas James, Henry Evans and John R. Morris families. Following them came the William M. James, W. L. James and Rowland James families. These pioneers were joined by others who made up the nucleus of the first church which was known as the Welsh Calvinistic Methodist Church, one of the smaller branches of the Reformed Church.

At that time, District 36 was located one and a half miles south of the present church site, directly north of the present home of Elmer Jones. In that school house both Sunday School and services were held. The early settlers traveled across country by team and

wagon to attend the meetings.

There are two records telling of the reorganization of the Church: the first states that the Church was founded by Rev. Richard Hughes in 1887; the other says that the Church was organized in 1888 by Rev. H. R. Williams and Elder Elias Hughes. We infer that organization was probably instituted in 1887, but formal organization was completed the following year. There were 28 charter members.

Members living in the south part of the settlement wanted the Church to be built near the school, but others favored a location three miles north. A compromise was made and the present site chosen. Land was given by an eastern land company known as the Goddard Estate on which a frame building was erected at a cost of \$1,719.24 in the year of 1891. The present building was built in 1918 at a cost of \$20,000.

The Church remained under the Calvinistic Methodist Synod until 1919 when the entire denomination voted to become a part of the Presbyterian Church U. S. A. The Church then became known as Bethany Presbyterian.

The first minister, Rev. Rowland Williams, came from Platte County once a month to hold services. The first settled pastor was Rev. David L. Hughes; he came in 1889. Other ministers to serve the Church were Rev. H. O. Morris, Rev. W. D. Evans, Rev. D. T. Davis, Rev. W. O. Jones, and Rev. R. L. Williams. Three pastors, Rev. Samuel H. Horton, Rev. John Caldwell and Rev. Oliver Proett served Bethany in connection with another field. The two Churches of this area, Bethany Presbyterian and Zion Congregational, were served by the Rev. James Griffes from 1922 to 1926. Rev. Gail Axen is presently serving the same two Churches. Fourteen years was the longest pastorate. It was held by Rev. D. T. Davis who served from 1905 to 1919.

The first elders were Thomas James, John James York, William Roberts, David H. Jones and John R. Morris. The first baby to be baptized in the first Church was Anna Mae Thomas, now Mrs. E. A. Morris. The first baby to be baptized in the new Church was her son, Wendell.

Good music has always been a tradition with the Welsh people. For many years E. J. Davis was choirmaster. When he died in 1938, his brother, E. O. Davis, became the music leader and served until a few years ago. The first organist was Mrs. E. O. Davis who held that position for more than fifty years.

For some years all services were conducted in the Welsh language. Later it became bilingual with the Welsh gradually disappearing and English becoming the language of the Church.

Many cherished memories still linger—the prayer meetings, the song services, the "Gymnastics"—but the mission of the Church remains the same in every age and tongue, for "Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever."

The 11:00 a.m. worship service was conducted by Rev. Gail Axen, the present pastor. Dr. George Bancroft, Omaha, Presbyterian Synod executive, delivered the sermon. Recognition and gratitude for the many flowers was expressed to those who presented them for the 75th anniversary. An anniversary anthem and choral responses were sung by the church choir, accompanied by the church pianist, Miss Doreen Pritchard. Candlelighters were Trixie Jones, and Cinda Owens. Hosts and host-

esses were Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Morris and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Waller.

A basket carry-in dinner was served by the United Presbyterian Women at noon. The speakers table was centered by an anniversary cake, which was later used at the afternoon reception.

The 3:00 p.m. 75th anniversary service began with a welcome by Rev. Gail Axen. The history of the Bethany Presbyterian church was read by Mr. Clifford Lindsay, the present clerk-of-session. Introduction of visitors and greetings and letters were read by Rev. Gail Axen. A Welsh choir, directed by Mrs. John Owens, sang four Welsh songs. A history of the United Presbyterian Women was read by Mrs. L. E. Jenkins. The first of two anniversary sermons, was given by Dr. Oliver B. Proett, Wayne. An anthem was sung by the church choir.

The second anniversary sermon was given by the Rev. James Griffith, Red Oak, Iowa. The benediction was given by Rev. Gail Axen.
