## 21 County Open Meeting To Start at 4:30 p.m. at WS

A steering committee representing 21 counties in Northeast Nebraska met Thursday in Wayne to plan a regional Congress November 22 to acquaint citizens in this area with their part in developing a five-year program for Nebraska in the field of mental health and mental illness.

The committee, which met at the Wayne Student Center, heard Joanna Nolle and Dr. Thaddeus Krush from Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, explain action taken thus far in developing the plan in this state for Long Range Mental Health Planning.

Development of the plan in each state is being financed by grant authorized by the United States Congress. Nebraska received \$90,000 as its share.

In July, as one of the first steps, Governor Frank Morrison called the first Congress on Mental Health and Mental Illness in Lincoln, where citizens representing all 27 states and regions of the state were informed of the purposes of Nebraska's Long Range Mental Health Planning and were asked to help form regional conferences and committees.

At this Congress it was stressed that if a new emphasis and approach is to come to meet the mental health needs of all Nebraskans, such a program will come only if the citizens of Nebraska become interested and involved.

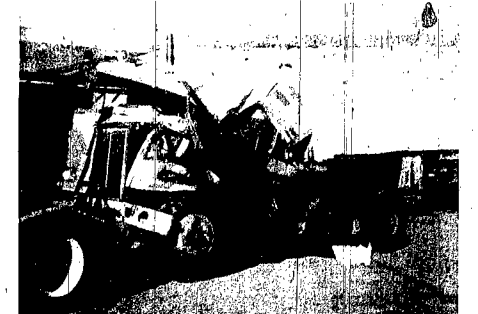
Wayne county is among 21 Northeastern counties which make up the fourth of six regions. The chair

man of Region IV is Mrs. Henry Ley and other steering committee members from Wayne include Mrs. Myrtle Sherry and William Eymon. Dr. Donald Merriman, dean of students at Wayne State, is a member of the statewide Advisory committee which will assist and advise regional groups. Bill Richardson, chair of the O'Neill Frontier and former Wayne resident, is also a member of the steering committee for Region IV.

The Regional Congress for Region IV on November 22 will be held on the Wayne State campus with registration in the library lounge at 4:30 p.m. A general session will begin at 5 p.m. with Dr. Thaddeus Krush and Patrick Okura, both from Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, as featured speakers.

Following a dinner at the Student Center at 4:30, citizens will divide into two county committees to discuss areas of study which include prevention, childhood and mental illness, alcoholism and drug addiction, school programs, juvenile delinquency, mental retardation, cultural variants, chronic diseases and aging.

## Wayne Trucker Hurt in Kansas Hiway Accident

William Jacobson, Wayne, who was injured in a one truck accident near Hoisington, Kan. last Wednesday, is listed in fair condition at a Hoisington hospital.

Jacobson was trapped in the cab of the semi-truck for more than two hours while members of the Hoisington police and fire departments and Trooper Chuck Wickham worked with crowsbars and hack saws to cut and pry away parts of the truck. Several fires were extinguished in the cab during the rescue process.

The accident occurred when the right front tire of the truck blew out. The vehicle traveled 750 feet along the highway, through a ditch and into a pasture before overturning. Damage was estimated at \$14,000.

Dennis Waller, Hoskins, a passenger in the truck, is listed in satisfactory condition. He was apparently thrown out of the cab before the truck overturned.

Six of the 160 hogs on the truck were killed and 20 were injured.

## Silver Dollar Drawing Total \$250 for Tonight

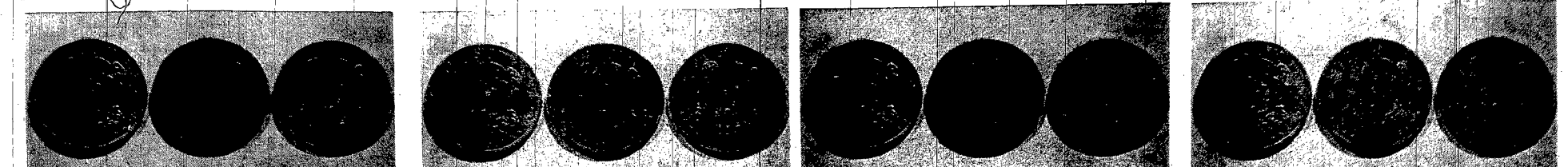

## Capitol News . . . Lawmakers Hope to Solve Credit Finance Problems

LINCOLN — Nebraska's lawmakers were scheduled this week to make some definite decisions which they hope will bring some kind of solution of the credit finance crisis.

Much of the second week of their special session was spent listening to arguments for and against remedial bills which had been tossed into the legislative hopper for their consideration.

The intent of a number of the measures is to lighten the blow which could hit the credit industry because of recent supreme court decisions holding the former installment sales act unconstitutional. These bills have retroactive provisions, meaning they would apply to time-sales transactions entered into prior to the supreme court ruling.

Governor Morrison has indicated that he would not veto such legislation because he does not feel merchants should be harshly punished for business deals written in full compliance with existing law, even though the law was later held invalid. At the same time Morrison reiterated he will veto bills applying to future contracts if the attorney general advises that the proposals are probably unconstitutional.

When the supreme court held invalid the 1959 installment sales act, it assessed penalties under the small loan law. These penalties include forfeiture of principal, interest and product. The credit finance people would like to have penalties under invalid

time-sales paper cut to forfeiture of interest, or at the most, double the amount of interest. Just about all the senators agreed that the time-sales area of legislation was about as complicated an issue to understand as any which has ever come before the Unicameral.

Morrison told the lawmakers he believes that the longstanding time-sales doctrine can be re-established in part by amending the state's uniform sales law to allow merchants to recover for the cost of handling credit transactions.

The governor added that revision of the uniform sales law should be a long-range objective of the state. Meanwhile, he said, "we have no other choice but to submit the merchants to the usury statutes."

The state's general usury statute permits nine per cent interest. Among decisions the legislature was to make this week was whether the usury ceiling should be applied to 12 per cent. Morrison said he would like to have it remain at its present level.

**Advisory Opinion Bill**  
Among bills killed by the legislature was one seeking a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to ask the supreme court for advisory opinions on the constitutionality of bills.

The bill, similar to one axed during the regular 1963 legislative session, was knocked out by a 5-1 vote of the judiciary committee.

A number of states have laws similar to the one proposed in the bill for Nebraska. Opponents argued such a law would disturb the "fundamental separation of powers" in the state system of government. They also said that many times "a collision of facts and arguments" is needed by the courts to make a determination of the constitutionality of a law.

Bert Overcash, Lincoln, chairman of the legislative committee of the state bar association, said, "Instead of eliminating confusion, a system such as proposed in the bill could create confusion." He added that the attorney general has done a good job of advising the legislature on the constitutionality of bills and is in a better position to make a determination than the supreme court.

Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, who introduced the bill, said if the 1959 legislature had been able to seek out the high court's advice on the installment sales act, "it would have saved a lot of heartaches and a lot of money."

Other possibilities for the Republicans include Seaton, former Gov. Val Peterson, and Sen. Richard Marvel, chairman of the legislature's budget committee.

**Livestock Pricing Puzzle**  
The market price of all grades of slaughter livestock are now showing but little spread. This seems inconsistent with the great emphasis on developing meat type animals in recent years.

Many tests have shown conclusively that there is a wide variation in the "cut-out value" of animals, even within a single grade.

The difference in assigned carcass value of 70 steers in special slaughter class at the Nebraska State Fair was more than ten dollars per hundred weight.

Test after test has shown similar differences in hog cut-out values. Some serious attention should be given our present system of selling meats. What incentive is there for producing superior animals if their value is returned at the market place?

**Gun Advice**  
More persons are accidentally shot at home than while hunting, says R. E. Schneider, University of Nebraska Extension safety specialist.

Never keep a loaded gun in the house, he advises. And always keep guns hidden or locked up where children can not get at them. Another good safety practice is to store guns and ammunition in different places so that if a child finds one he cannot find the other.

If your child wants to learn how to handle guns, the safest one for a beginner is a 22 rim-fire single-shot rifle. Schneider said. "The important factor, however, is that the child be trained in gun safety."

The best instruction comes through the organized gun clubs of the National Rifle Association. Teenagers have more accidents in hunting than any other age group, but those who have taken NRA gun courses have far fewer accidents.
