More persons are accidentally shot at home (nan while hunting, says R. E. Schnieder, University of Nebraska Extension safety specialist.

Never keep a loaded gun in the house, he advises. And always keep guns hidden or locked up where children can not get at them. Another good safety practice is to store guns and ammunition in different places so that if a child finds one he cannot find the other.

"If your child wants to learn how to handle guns, the safest one for a bectinner is a 22 rimfree single-shot rifle," Schnieder said. "The jimportant factor, however, is that the child be trained in gun safety.

The best instruction comes through the organized gun clubs of the National Rifle Association. Teenagers have more accidents in hunting than any other age group, but those who have taken NRA gun courses have far fewer accidents."





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




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
