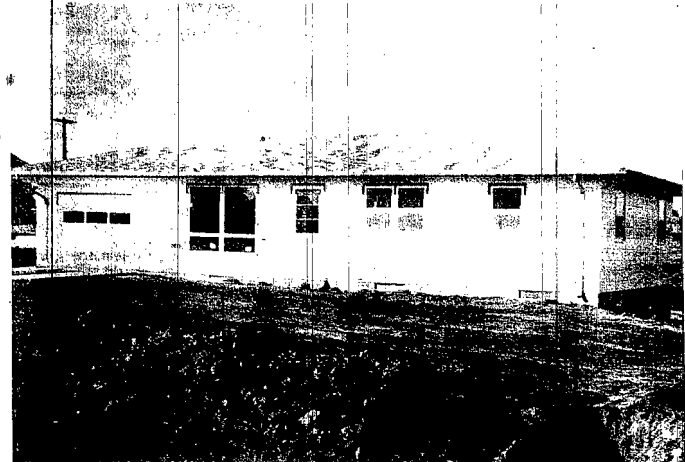

combining diversion and price support payments, (3) increase in feed grain base of any producer who planted up to 30 acres of wheat for home use under the feed grain exemption during any one of years 1959, 1960, and 1961 to extent three-year average of such wheat acreage exceeded 15 acres, (4) total price support, while unchanged from 1963, will have slightly larger proportion available as loans or purchase with corresponding decrease in price support payments; (5) payments to any producer limited to not more than 20 percent of fair market value of any acreage involved; (6) maximum payment rate on all acreage diversions from 40 to 50 percent of base.

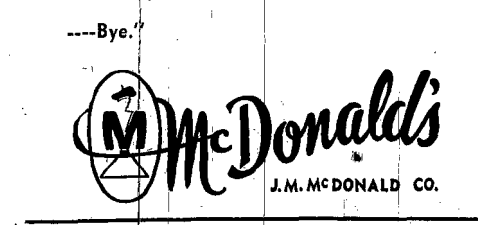

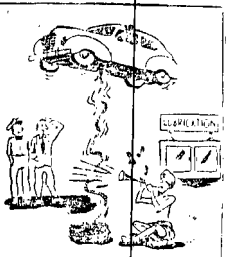

Special Session to Include Debate on Educational TV

LINCOLN — Although the subject was not included in the governor's list of subjects to be discussed by the special session of the legislature, educational television was very much in the news emanating from the Unicameral in recent days.

The topic was opened to debate when Governor Morrison submitted for senatorial confirmation the names of six persons for service on the state educational television commission.

The arguing in the legislature was over the intent of a bill passed by the regular session earlier this year. The Omaha senators and several others said that under a bill enacted, the lawmakers intended to give Omaha top priority for an educational television station.

The ETV commission helped trigger the controversy when it voted to move the University of Nebraska's ETV station, KUON-TV, from Lincoln to Mead and then to set up a second station at Lexington. The reasoning was that the Mead facility could serve both Omaha and Lincoln, thus freeing funds for construction in outstate areas.

The Omaha senators said a station at Mead would not work out satisfactorily for Omaha and that it would be better to leave KUON-TV at Lincoln, give Omaha its own station, and then construct one, or possibly two, stations in outstate areas.

The regular session appropriated \$600,000 to get started on an ETV network which eventually will cover the state. The total cost of the project has been estimated at \$2.85 million.

The legislature voted against the wishes of the Omaha senators amidst threats and predictions that the matter would be taken to court. Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, said if the matter is taken to court, it will be many months before the ETV commission can proceed with its present plans. An effort was made to table confirmation of the ETV commission members until the regular session in 1965. Sen. Sam Klaver, Omaha, who fought vigorously for Omaha's side in the argument, is chairman of an interim committee which will study ETV prior to the 1965 session.

During the extended arguing, Carpenter said it was known in the last session the state might wind up without an ETV law unless differences between Omaha and Lincoln were worked out. He added there is a possibility that "if you don't give Omaha what it has a right to expect," this might be remembered in the future when there could be a shift in the legislature's balance of power.

Minimum Loading

The civil aeronautics board (CAB) has released six Nebraska cities from the CAB's minimum passenger loading requirement. The cities involved are Hastings, McOmak, Sidney, Alliance and Chadron, according to James Sandstedt, state aeronautics director.

Under the CAB's traffic standard, a minimum of five passenger gear boardings per day must be made.

Sandstedt said the state aeronautics department joined with Frontier Airlines in a motion to the CAB requesting that the six Nebraska cities be dropped from the so-called "use it or lose it" criteria.

He recalled that Beatrice, Imperial, Ainsworth and Valentine have all lost local air service since the CAB's traffic standard was adopted in Nebraska five years ago.

Air Conditioning

The statehouse building commission has awarded the architectural - engineering contract for air conditioning the statehouse to the Leo A. Daly Co., Omaha.

In so doing the commission selected the Daly firm over Henderson, Durkin & Richardson, Inc., Omaha, which had made a preliminary study for the project.

Before making a choice, the commission held interviews with representatives of both companies.

The action by the commission cleared the way for acceptance of competitive bids for actual construction. The hope is that the air-cooling project can be completed by the summer of 1965.

Leo Daly told the commission his firm would be able to begin the design phase immediately. He said the primary problem would be installation of the bulky air conditioning equipment without disturbing the capitol's esthetic beauty.

Governor Morrison said this was an important consideration. He added: "We would let the people in here sweat before we would disturb the architectural beauty of the building."

Cost of the total project is estimated at \$1.1 million. A special fund has already gathered \$707,000 of this amount and the 1963 legislature appropriated \$300,000. The commission has already entered into a joint agreement with the University of Nebraska to pipe cooled water to the statehouse, making water towers near the capitol unnecessary.

Finance Legislation

Governor Morrison has signed into law three retroactive, penalty-reducing finance bills passed by the legislature.

While so doing he observed there is a "very interesting constitutional" question involved in the measures.

The attorney general has warned that the three bills are probably unconstitutional. However, Morrison, a lawyer, said he felt he would be "remiss" in his duty as governor if he did not sign them.

He explained that the bills "are intended to correct the serious result of the 1959 installment sales act being declared unconstitutional. The legislature should be allowed the prerogative of correcting this serious result."

When the state supreme court held the 1959 act invalid, it applied the small loan law penalty—Forfeiture of interest, principal and product. The bills signed by the governor, LB 16, 17, and 18, would lighten the penalty generally to forfeiture of interest. They would be applicable to contracts written under the invalid act.

The legislature has worked long and hard on finance bills aimed at getting the credit industry out of the bind it found itself in when the supreme court held the 1959 act unconstitutional.

The lawmakers planned to wrap up their work this week—probably Friday. It appeared that LB 11, generally conceded to be the most important single piece of legislation before the session, would remain generally intact.

LB 11 provides for lowering the maximum of a small loan from \$3,000 to \$1,500, leaves the usury ceiling at nine per cent interest and also permits installment buying at a 12 per cent interest rate.

An unsuccessful effort was made last week to increase the installment selling maximum to 15 per cent, and also to make automobile, truck and trailer retailers eligible for small loan licenses. Under LB 11, the first \$300 of a small loan can carry a 30 per cent interest rate and the next \$200 a 24 per cent rate.

Crop Production

The state-federal division of agricultural statistics says the total volume of crop production in Nebraska is expected to equal the 1959 output, which was the fourth largest on record.

This year's production is expected to be five per cent below last year's but 38 per cent above the 1947-49 average.

Gains in per acre yield during October were registered for sorghum, soybeans, dry beans, and late potatoes. The No. 1 corn for grain estimate was figured at 283 million bushels, 10 per cent below last year and about five million under the five-year average. The estimate per acre yield at 53 bushels would be the second highest on record.

Sorghum production is expected to hit 96 million bushels, the second highest on record. The anticipated yield of 53 bushels an acre would be the second highest, trailing the 1962 average of 65 an acre.

Turkey As You Like It

From historical times to here and now the turkey gobble has been associated with Thanksgiving fare in America. However, today's bird is a far cry from the wild turkey the pioneers hunted long ago.

Commercial turkeys weighing from 6 to 16 pounds, found in the markets today are meaty, nutritious and low-calorie. They are preferred by homemakers who like to serve turkey for non-holiday fare. The U. S. Department of Agriculture says that half and quarter turkeys are the most popular in some localities. Disjointed pieces—legs, breasts, wings, necks and backs—are in demand so families can have turkey in small amounts any day of the year.

Boneless turkey rolls, turkey meat loaf, turkey sausage, turkey dogs, mock turkey drumsticks, turkeyburgers, turkey steaks, frozen turkey parts and frozen turkey bolita-bag meals are other ways homemakers may fix turkey being sold at the supermarkets today.

Turkey steaks are a quick-and-easy-to-fix entree. Cross-cut steaks (slices of the bird with bone left in) bristle into tasty servings, broiled or plain. Boneless steaks, made by knitting together pieces of turkey, are very perishable and should be used quickly. If frozen, they should be cooked without thawing. Just brown in hot fat and serve.

Many Botulism Outbreaks Arise From Home Canned Goods

In spite of the fact that recent cases of botulism poisoning were caused by commercially canned or smoked fish, the greatest number of botulism outbreaks result from home canned goods.

One study shows as much as 90 per cent of the botulism outbreaks are caused by home canned foods.

To be safe, foods should be canned according to reliable procedures. The most important point is to use a pressure canner with an accurate gauge for all foods except fruits and high acid vegetables such as tomatoes. The greatest dangers arise from improperly processed low-acid foods, such as beans, peas, corn and meat. Botulism from home canned foods can be avoided if you:

1. Never use or taste food which is suspected of spoilage. Some indications of spoilage are a bulging cap or lid, leaking can or jar, rancid or putrid odor, jar or can that foams or spurts when you open it.
2. Use a pressure canner and adequate processing time for canning all non-acid vegetables and meats. The USDA and Nebraska Extension Service offer reliable home canning guides. Canning bulletins are available free from county Extension offices.
3. Take care to cover with liquid and boil for 15 minutes all non-acid foods canned by any method not using a pressure canner. Do this after opening and before tasting. Shorter boiling time will not destroy possible botulism toxin.
4. Since the organisms causing botulism are commonly

Cattle Feeding Profits

The profit from feeding cattle depends a great deal on how you figure your costs. The farmer who feeds some salvage feeds with no other market, uses buildings and equipment which would stand idle and uses surplus labor has a big advantage over the feedlot operator who must charge everything at market value. A study made of Illinois cattle feeders during a recent five-year period shows a return of about \$25 per head above direct costs (purchase, feed and interest). When costs were allowed for labor, use of equipment, etc., the majority lost money.

U. S. Economy Depends on Trio

This has been the destination Farm-City Week. Its purpose is to promote understanding and appreciation among those engaged in agriculture, industry and business.

No one segment of our economy can prosper long without the other two.

The decline in farm population has not diminished the importance of agriculture in our total economy. Here are some facts regarding that story:

1. Agriculture is the biggest business in the United States. More than one-third of all the people in the country are employed in agriculture or related business.
2. 250,000 scientists are working on projects related to agriculture.
3. Farmers invest nearly twice as much capital per worker as is invested in factory workers.
4. Farmers use more petroleum products than any other industry.
5. Farmers use four times as much mechanical horsepower as all U. S. factories put together.
6. Agriculture provides food and fiber so efficiently today, that if we were to use 1940 production methods, it would cost an additional \$19 billion.

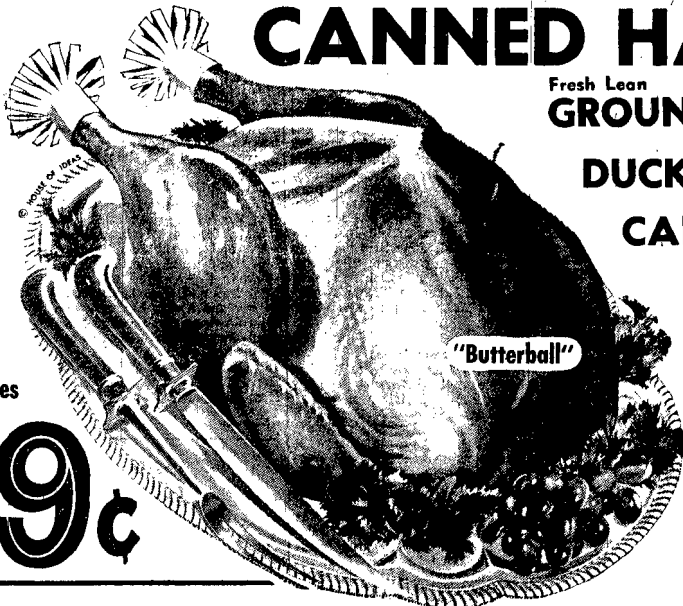

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Better Health Through Knowledge

SEX-LINKED HEREDITY

Q. I recently heard my college daughter talking to a boy about sex-linked heredity. I was absolutely shocked! Can you advise me privately what this is all about? I want to have a talk with that young lady!

A. Before you do any talking, brush up on your science. The kids were no doubt discussing some new and exciting developments in genetics. Every cell in the human body contains 23 pairs of chromosomes. In the sex-linked structures which carry hereditary factors (genes). Normally, both male and female have 22 pairs of autosomes plus one pair of sex chromosomes consisting of two X chromosomes in the female... one X and one Y in the male. Sex-linked heredity usually implies that the trait is due to a gene carried by an X (sex) chromosome. Clear? If not, perhaps you should have a talk with your daughter... but you do the listening!

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY

Q. I have two brothers who are victims of muscular dystrophy. Can the disease be inherited? If so, would my children be afflicted even though I show no signs of the disease?

A. Muscular dystrophy has been defined as genetically determined primary degenerative myopathy. In other words, an inherited disorder of the muscles. There are several varieties of the disease. One, the Duchenne type, occurs almost exclusively in young boys and is inherited as a sex-linked recessive character. Efforts are now being made to identify female carriers of the inheritable factor responsible for most cases of the Duchenne type. If an accurate test can be developed it would then be possible to predict which female relatives of patients with this type of muscular dystrophy would pass on the disease to their sons.

Westergard Reveals Curriculum Study

Superintendent Stanley Westergard revealed to the public today the organization of a Curriculum Study here at Wayne High. Members of the Wayne committee are Miss Bornhoff, Mr. Jenness, Mr. Ihm and Miss Ebmeier. The fields under consideration are math, English, science and social studies respectively.

According to Mr. Westergard the committee opened the program by studying the material taught in the elementary grades. This enables them to know what material has been subjected to the students by the time they reach high school.

The committee agrees with Mr. Westergard that more advanced classes should be available for the students capable for them, and courses that will aid the slower students. A reading class should be extended into high school because more students fall behind on their reading ability.

This is not a long term plan, but Mr. Westergard feels this program should stay in action and be revised when need arises.

Mr. Westergard feels that a good way to find out what the school lacks in helping students find jobs is to talk to the students who have graduated from Wayne High. These students will know what the students now graduating will need to get better jobs.

Regents Scholarships Changed for Freshmen

Wayne (WH)—The Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska announced on October 15, 1962, that two significant changes had been made in the Regents Scholarship program for entering freshmen.

Regents Four-Year Scholarships—One hundred tuition (\$204.00) Regents Four-Year Scholarships will be awarded to the top one hundred scorers on the Regents Examination. These Scholarships will be awarded on a state-wide competitive basis and only those students ranking among the top one hundred scorers will be eligible.

Each student receiving a Regents Four-Year Scholarship will have the Scholarship renewed automatically for his sophomore, junior and senior years of college if he maintains at least a 7.0 cumulative grade point average at the close of each academic year.

Regents Freshmen Scholarships—The top scorers on the Regents Examination in each of 250 high schools will be declared winners of Regents Freshmen Scholarships unless the top scorer already has been awarded a Regents Four-Year Scholarship. These scholarships will be worth tuition (\$204.00) and

will be awarded for the freshman year only. The Regents Freshman Scholarships which are not accepted will be rewarded to alternate winners.

As in the past, winners of Regents Scholarships may compete for all other freshman scholarships offered by the University.

The amount of each Regents Scholarship was changed from \$100 to \$204.00 per year. Based on the Regents Scholarship Examination given in November of each year, two types of Regents Scholarships will be awarded to entering freshmen.
