## Crop Production

The state-federal division of agricultural statistics says the

total volume of crop production in Nebraska is expected to equal the 1989 output, which was the fourth largest on record.

This year's production is expected to be five per cent below last year's but 38 percent above the 1947-49 average.

Gains in per acre yield during October were negistered for sorghum, soybeans, dry heans, and late potatoes. The Nov 1 corn for gain estimate was figured at 283 million husbels, to per cent below last year and about five million under the five-year average. The estimated per acre yield at 53 bushels would be the second highest on record.

In spite of the fact that recent cases of botulism poisoning were caused by commercially canned or smoked fish, the greatest number of botulism dutbreaks result from home canned foods. One study shows as much as 30 per cent of the botulism outbreaks are caused by home canned foods.

To be safe, foods should be

90 per cent of the botulism outbreaks are caused by home canned foods.

To be safe, foods should be canned according to reliable procedures. The most important noint is to use a pressure canner with an accurate gauge for all foods except fruits and high acid vegetables such as tomatees. The greatest dangers arise from improperly processed lowacid foods such as beans, peas, corn and meat. Botulism from home canned foods can be avoided if you:

1. Never use o'r taste food which is suspected of spoilage. Some indications of spoilage are a bulging cap or lid. leaking can or jar, rancid or putrified odor, jar or cean that foams or spurts when you open it.

2. Use a pressure canner and adequate processing time for canning all non-acid wegetables, and meats. The USDA and Nebraska Extension Service offer reliable home canning guides, Canning bulletins are lavailable free from county Extension of fices.

3. Take care to cover with liquid and boil for 15 minutes all non-acid foods canned by any method not using a pressure canner Do this after opening and before tasting. Shorter boiling time will not destroy possible botulism toxin.
