CANADIANS IN WAYNE study SPF hogs

Canadian Swine Producers Study SPF Hog Work Here

A group of approximately 40 swine producers from the Calgary and Medicine Hat areas in Alberta, Canada, visited in Northeast Nebraska Friday. The group's interest in the area was primarily in seeing the operations and gaining information on SPF (disease-free) hog production.

The Canadians left one week earlier, stopping at points in North Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and South Dakota before coming to Nebraska and returning by way of western South Dakota and Montana.

Visits in northeast Nebraska were made at Suida, Inc., Jackson, owned by Irvin O'Neill and Frank Kneif, where they saw the latest in a farrow-to-finish operation involving an annual production of 4,000 to 5,000 hogs.

The second stop included a visit to Dick Sorenson's purebred (SPF) Hampshire herd, three miles northwest of Wayne. Sorenson's operation involves raising 500 to 600 head of purebred SPF hogs which he selects and sells as breeding stock to producers in eastern Nebraska, southeastern South Dakota and northeastern Iowa.

At the noon luncheon stop, the Canadians heard Drs. Jensen, Brown and Ditman explain the laboratory procedures in the production of SPF stock through hysterectomy and caesarean separations.

Dr. Leo Lucas, Extension swine specialist, University of Nebraska, traveled with the group explaining swine research work in Nebraska. Hugo Zimmerman, Wayne, Area Extension Agent, was coordinator for the tour in northeast Nebraska.

Donations to Christmas Seals Slow in County

Envelopes containing TB Christmas Seals went into the mail Nov. 15 in Wayne County, according to Mrs. Robert Bentback, County TB Committee Chairman. Seal Sale Chairman, Mrs. Robert Gormidy, said only 210 returns were received during the first week, out of 1,987 mailed with total contribution of \$306.25. This is nearly \$100.00 less than during the same period last year.

The goal for 1963 is \$1,000.00. This is the minimum according to Mrs. Bentback, to continue the program of TB testing in the schools in Wayne County, and to have enough left to contribute to the State Research Program and to pay the local county expenses.

Besides tuberculosis, emphysema and all other respiratory diseases are included in the program covered by proceeds from the sale of TB Christmas Seals. It is urged that each citizen of Wayne County consider this program seriously, said Mrs. Bentback, and contribute as much as they feel they can. The Seal Sale continues through December 31st, but it is hoped by the Committee that contributions will be sent in as early as possible.

Wayne Residents Observe Mourning in Church Service

Wayne Presbyterian, Baptist, St. Paul's Lutheran, Redeemer Lutheran and Methodist churches took part in memorial services, sponsored by Wayne Ministerial Association for the late President John F. Kennedy Monday morning at St. Paul's.

At the 10:30 service, the Methodist church choir sang "I Walk Today Where Jesus Walked," and the Presbyterian church choir sang "Open Our Eyes" at the 11:15 service.

Rev. John Wesley Voth read the scripture Rev. S. K. de Fresse led the congregation in reading the 23rd Psalm. Rev. Robert Shirck led in prayer.

The messages, given by Rev. William Sumner, is as follows: "As a family gathers together in time of mourning, so we are gathered. Saved from the bullet of an enemy of our country, President John Kennedy has been cut down by the bullet of the enemy of all mankind — by fanatical hatred, so enlarged and self-justified that it twists the mind."

"We are here to mourn. We are here to mourn man's inhumanity to man. We are here to mourn cruelty and self-righteousness. We are here to mourn every act that separates and divides us from one another. We are here to mourn for everyone who still believes that destruction of another person is the way to save the world."

"We are here to mourn the perverted minds of two assassins. We are here because we would choose to be, but because circumstances have forced us to this awful moment."

"But here our common faith speaks to us the glowing truth which permits us to place tragedy — stark, unbelievably stark — in a softer and healing light."

"This is not the first time Christians have lost a young, victorious leader. Indeed, our faith had its beginning in assassination. The anguish and hopelessness and helplessness of this moment is but a re-enactment of the heartaches of the disciples who attempted to hold back the tears as they stood around the cross. Grief-stricken, swept by the injustice of it, the disciples were confronted with the reality of resurrection. From death — which they believed to be the end — came life, which turned out to be the beginning. From man's cruelty and inhumanity came forgiveness, from senseless torture came sacrificing love. From the worst of Man came the best of God."

"Because of our Christian heritage, because of our Faith which lives today in the hearts of men, because of the crucified yet risen Lord, this tragedy is easier to bear."

"This event has already cast its shadow over our nation and over the world. But the final chapter has not yet been written. The final chapter is not for some historian of a far off day to write. The final chapter is for us to write. We are here to mourn the man in our prayers and in our self-commitment, make our response to this event."

"We cannot be overcome by either grief or bitterness. Even sorrow, which now leads our hearts, can not long endure. Rightly our prayers ascend for the grieving family. Rightly the tears flow into our prayers as we think of our country and the great leadership it has lost. Rightly we shake our heads in disbelief over the swiftness of these events. But our praying must go on. We must pray for those who have spitefully used us, for those who are our enemies. We must mourn not just for friends, but also for misguided and distorted men."

"This service began to honor one man, must by the very nature of the Christian's sense of forgiving love, be suddenly enlarged to include sincere concern and prayer for the family of all who have been tragically involved in this event. We can not fail to be stricken by our loss, nor can we fail to be stricken by the ignorance of the actor in this event. And the prayer of Stephen must indeed become ours. Kneeling under the barrage of stones, hurled by the self-righteous mob, he prayed: 'Lord, lay not this sin to their charge.'"

"So, what more can be said? Simply that in the midst of personal or national or world tragedy — and this is all three combined — we are thrown to our knees before God. And here make our prayer to Him. May they be honest prayers. May they bring us from darkness to light. May they bring us from recrimination to reconciliation. And so, at this time we discover that it is a time for prayer."

Nation Grieves Over President's Death

"The President is dead!" The words fell like a smothering blanket across a nation and world that had held their breaths since the word of the attempted assassination was flashed across the world.

What can be said now by a country newspaper editor, nearly a week after the fatal bullets found their mark?

Television recorded instantly the dark, history-making events. The daily newspaper filled in the unlimited background. The world knows all of the intimate details.

Surely, we will soon awake from this terrible dream. The President assassinated? In this enlightened age? Surely not.

But we know we are awake and the life of a great man has been snuffed out for a reason that was taken to the grave by the assassin.

"Where have we gone that this could happen to us. Have we become soft with these little pockets of hate that can twist a man's mind to this action? Have we become too complacent in our knowledge that justice will triumph? Is it not time to take a closer look at the people and events that would take such an individual as President Kennedy from us? This little country editor thinks so."

True, this editor hardly agreed with all of President Kennedy's programs and ideas, but he was a man doing his job as he saw it and was dynamic in it. So, why did we let him be taken from us?

Truly, we should grieve for the President's family and over a personal loss to us, but we should also feel even a deeper grief over our own attitudes that have led to this happen.

When was the last time you told your neighbor that a firmer hand should be taken with the groups that would undermine our government? Never, probably, if you're like most citizens. When you last talked to him, you were more concerned over whether or not your area was being developed to its fullest to what the farm program was going to be next year. Communism, pinks, subversion, just words to us. Our pockets matter more.

Now, do we have enough in that pocket to bring life back to a great man? Can we pay enough to comfort his family? Can we buy enough leadership to replace what we lost? I think not.

... but ask what you can do for your country? This ended a famous quote of President Kennedy. And apparently the time to ask has long since passed. It is time to again take the country in our hands and set it back on the Christian path on which it started.

We cannot let President Kennedy die in vain. We must pick up his vital, youthful spirit and strive to make our country better. The time for the firm hand is here.

We mourn the President's death and our sorrow is great. But his death should provide a beacon with which to search our souls. Through this light we must be able to see the right road or a precious life is lost.

The President is dead.
Let him not have died in vain.

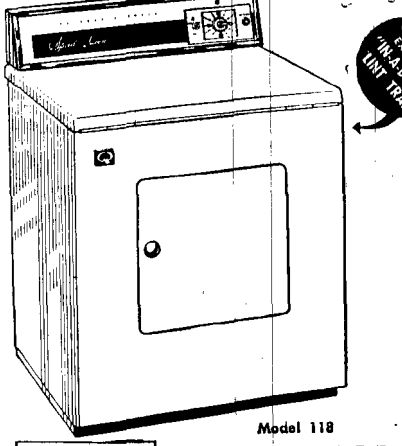

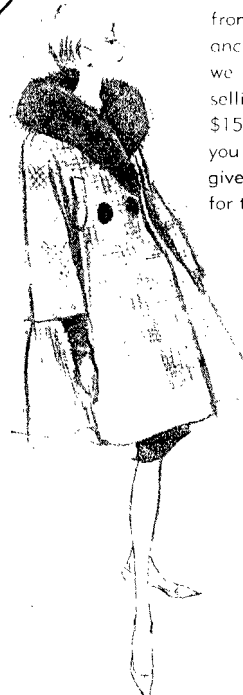

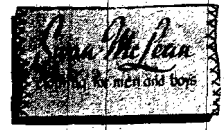

WS Basketball Opener Saturday in Missouri

Basketball begins this weekend for Wayne State's Wildcats with a game Saturday night at Northwest Missouri State, Maryville, and the home opener Tuesday night against Westminster.

What of the season prospects? Wayne's clouds are in mystery, much like last year when Coach Al Svenningsson began with an all-new starting lineup and no high scorers returning.

The 1963-64 campaign begins with two returning starters, center Chuck Peterson and guard Jon Garcia, but with nobody who scored in high figures last year.

Of the veterans, none averaged in double numbers for the 1962-63 season. Garcia's 9-point output was highest among the seven let terms and three squadmen returning.

Dick Collins, the No. one substitute through most of the season ranked next with an 8.1 average. Peterson third with 5.8.

Lost to graduation are all conference Ron Jones and a close contender for all-conference, Benny Johnson, who averaged 18 and 15 points. Also missing are Marlin Nielsen, who graduated, and Jon Johnson who did not return to Wayne. Jones will serve as assistant coach while working on a master's degree.

Svenningsson hopes to rely on speed as a potent offensive weapon. His squad averages about 62 or 63—a little taller than last year. Ten of the 14 players are between 6-0 and 6-3. Peterson, at 6-9, is the only taller regular.

Two newcomers show promise of adding effective height after some seasoning. They are Bernie Lampe, 6-10, and Bob Hope, 6-5.

Chief contenders for starting duty are Peterson and Garcia, Roger Ginapp and Larry Calkins at forward, Collins at center or forward,

Dennis Torgerson and Jim Murphy at guard.

Returning players are guards Ron Sadler and Dean DeBuhr, who saw some varsity action last year, and Denny Neubrand, up from the "B" squad. Dubuhr did most of his playing on the "B" squad and led the team in scoring during a 9-2 season.

Bob Duranski, Columbus, a Lamar (Colo.) Junior College graduate, is expected to give the squad some extra strength. And another Columbus product, freshman Leon Fickel, is listed on the varsity. A mile of 5-7 and 150 pounds, he earned a reputation for playmaking in high school.

Svenningsson reserves judgment on Wayne's potential in the conference campaign until the December preliminaries indicate Wildcats strength.

Wayne will play seven games before the first term ends, three at home, four away. The Christmas recess will offer the sixth annual Holiday tournament, with Wayne hosting Dakota Wesleyan, Gustavus Adolphus and Pittsburg (Kans.) State, Dec. 27-28.

'Cats Place Five On All-NCC Squad

Five Wayne State football players earned citation on the Nebraska College Conference honor squad, the coaches announced after their fall meeting Saturday in Lincoln.

The offensive unit listed 23 players, the defensive unit 13.

Representing Wayne are Burt Matthies, full back; Jerry Kilcoin, halfback; Dick Collins, tackle, and George Hoelker, center, on the offensive list and Duane Twait, line-backer, on the defensive.

Kearney State had 12 on the honor squad—Dick Butolph and Don Hather listed on both offense and defense. Hastings had nine honorees, Doane four; Chadron two, and Peru none.

In other action the NCC repre-

sentatives considered, but deferred until spring action on a Kearney motion to move the 33 limit on football traveling squads.

The coaches had voted, 41, with Doane abstaining, to recommend lifting the limit. Only Wayne voted against the change, on the ground that larger traveling squads would increase costs.

Hastings and Kearney argued that in some games, when traveling distance is short—as in the Hastings-Kearney match—costs are no problem, and the visiting college might want to take a large squad.

The conference representatives considered a code of rules to govern hardship cases—for example, players injured in the season's first game and requesting an extra season of eligibility as a result. The problem will get further airing in the spring meeting.

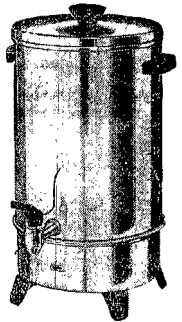

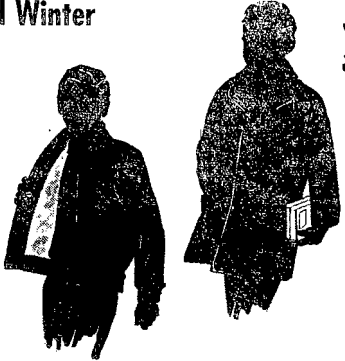

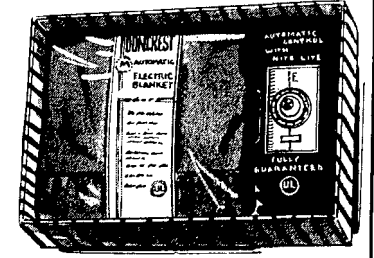

Capitol News . . . Contract Awarding Changed For Purchasing of State Cars

LINCOLN — Willard Wells, state purchasing agent, has devised a new method for awarding contracts on automobiles purchased by the state.

Under his system, the lowest bidder will not automatically get the contract. The system is based on a rating formula under which 50 per cent weight is given to the price of a car, three per cent to general appearance, eight per cent to mechanical performance, eight per cent to handling performance, three per cent to accessibility of instruments and interior dimensions, and 10 per cent to resale value.

Wells said he checked with the attorney general on the validity of the system and believes he is on firm ground. He noted that state law provides for awarding the contracts to the "lowest responsible bidder" while keeping in mind the "best interests of the state."

The purchasing agent said he has already put the new plan into effect in awarding contracts to purchase patrol cars, standard autos and intermediate vehicles.

On the basis of initial cost alone, the lowest bid on patrol cars was \$1,858, but under Wells' system the contract is expected to be awarded on a slightly higher offer of \$1,906.

Wells said the low bid on standard cars, used by state agencies other than the patrol, was \$1,719 but that the contract would probably go to a firm submitting a \$1,773 per car offer.

Retail Sales Slip

Nebraska retail sales during September slipped below the same month a year earlier and also declined from August levels of this year, according to University of Nebraska business researchers. They said September retail sales, adjusted for seasonal differences, were down 3.3 per cent from 1962 and 5.1 per cent from August of this year.

Hard goods showed the least decline. In the four largest cities — Omaha, Lincoln, Grand Island and Hastings — hard good sales were up over September of 1962. The only cities showing an appreciable over-all gain from the same month a year ago were Fairbury, Columbus and Nebraska City.

Tax Study Coming

Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, has pledged another "extensive" study of the state's property tax laws — similar to the one he carried out four years ago. He said the aim of his probe will be "reform."

He added that he will make an effort to cover as many of the state's 93 counties as possible.

The Scottsbluff law in a key comment came after he was named by Sen. Jules Burbach, Crofton, to head a subcommittee to delve into the matter of property tax assessments in the interim between the 1963 and 1965 legislative sessions.

Burbach, chairman of the legislative council's tax study committee, named Sen. Kenneth L. Bowen, Red Cloud, to direct another subcommittee, which will devote its time to gathering data on intangible property taxation. Burbach will be in charge of this

another subcommittee which study livestock taxation.

Carpenter, Bowen and Burbach were principal sponsors of resolutions during the 1963 legislative session seeking studies of these three subjects. The Unicameral, however, decided to lump all the studies and have just one committee handle them.

Program Budgeting

The accounting firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co. has informed the legislative budget committee preliminary plans have been completed for the program budgeting of state departments.

The purpose of the program is to arrive at account methods to determine how much is spent for each function of government.

Tentatively approved by the budget group were nine categories of programming activities — general government, education and research, highways, public welfare, public health, public safety, conservation of agricultural and natural resources, regulatory services and corrections.

The legislature this year approved the accounting study. It will result in implementation of a new accounting system for the state complemented by data processing techniques.

Hiring Ex-Convicts

Maurice Sigler, head of the Nebraska penal complex, says the reluctance of employers to hire ex-convicts isn't as pronounced as it formerly was. He said during the past 10 years a favorable attitude has developed, especially among Nebraska employers, in connection with the hiring of parolees or inmates who have served out their time.

Sigler said this was due to the fact that educated employers have accepted a responsibility of aiding the state in rehabilitation of men who have spent time in penal institutions.

He said more and more employers are beginning to realize that inmates are persons who have to live and to live they must have work.

"The biggest problem, the warden said, still is the employer who rejects a parolee or former inmate on the basis of his prison record alone. He said: "We never unequivocally recommend anyone for employment. The employer has to accept the responsibility. We tell the employer that an inmate is suitable for parole or has a chance of making good, having served his sentence."

At the present time, Sigler continued, no inmate in the state penal complex is being denied parole because he cannot find outside employment. Having a job waiting is a mandatory requirement before any prisoner can be paroled.

May Run for Congress

State Sen. George Gerdes, Alliance, has confirmed he is being urged by a group of businessmen and wheat growers to file for Congress on the Republican ticket. But he said he won't make a decision until February.

Gerdes, 65, is a three-term

LINCOLN — The work of the special session of the legislature has been completed. The lawmakers hammered into acceptable form a number of finance bills aimed at getting the state out of a mess created in connection with credit buying when the state supreme court ruled last summer that the 1959 installment sales act was unconstitutional.

The legislators freely acknowledged that some of the legislation they have just put on the books may again be held invalid by the court. But they hoped that the laws, which would have retroactive effect, would be upheld. One of them would validate contracts written under a new law until the court ruled it unconstitutional.

Anticipating that the court would turn thumbs down on the remedial legislation enacted, the lawmakers passed LB9. It calls for submitting to the voters a constitutional amendment which would authorize the legislature to define and classify loans and installment sales. The legislature would also be empowered to establish maximum rates of interest within classes.

The key bill of the session was LB11. It keeps the usury ceiling at nine per cent interest, cuts the maximum amount of a small loan from \$3,000 to \$1,500 and permits installment selling at a 12 per cent rate of interest. Under the bill, the first \$300 of a small loan could carry a 30 per cent interest charge, and the next \$200 a 24 per cent rate.

The general usury limit of nine per cent on conventional loans is the same maximum under which the state has operated since 1941. The penalty of revocation of the ceiling will remain unchanged at forfeiture of interest. The bill permits any lender or merchant to operate under the 12 per cent rate on installment loans. The debt must be repaid within 84 months or less, except for borrowers whose sources of income are irregular. Real estate is

Records Important in Livestock Improvement

The only breeders that can contribute very much to genetic improvement of livestock are those who will develop a sound record program and follow it carefully and consistently for many years.

One of the important tools for improvement is comparative feed lot tests involving animals from many sires, giving breeders a sound method of evaluating the growth and carcass merit of their animals. Feed lot tests make it possible to measure heritable economic traits of animals coming from different breeders.

Both the commercial producers and seedstock breeders have a stake in the outcome of these performance tests.

Development and carrying out of a constructive breeding plan depends upon several factors. These include:

- Understanding and using essential facts about animal breeding.
- A reasonable knowledge of the kind of carcasses markets may require in years ahead.
- The necessary judgment to sort out mere whims of fancy from important productive traits.

New Nebraska Labor Laws

Several new labor laws passed by the Nebraska legislature became effective on Oct. 19. Some provisions of general interest are:

Discrimination in employment because of race is prohibited. It is unlawful for an employer to require an applicant for work to pay for a medical examination as a condition of employment. Children below the age of fourteen may not be employed. Those between the ages of fourteen and sixteen may be employed not to exceed eight hours in one day or forty-eight in a week. Employment (14 to 16 year olds) between eight o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning is prohibited. A new provision requires a permit to carry a sign displaying his or her name and the name of the organization represented.

More Potatoes for Your Money

For the money spent on them, potatoes give high returns!

Potatoes, for example, are entirely useable — no need to waste a bit. Just scrub and they're ready to use, jackets and all. Furthermore, potatoes are one of the most plentiful vegetables on the market this fall, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service.

In food value, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture home economists, one medium-sized potato can supply as much as 1/5 the ascorbic acid (vitamin C) recommended daily. "Spuds" also provide worthwhile amounts of thiamine and niacin (B-vitamins) plus iron, phosphorus, and potassium (minerals).

At the same time, this medium-sized potato — whether boiled, pressure cooked, or baked — contains only about 100 calories. This is approximately the same as a large apple, an orange, or half a grapefruit.

To get the most food value from potatoes, cook them whole in their jackets. Because much of the food value is near the surface, peelings should be kept thin if pared "spuds" are preferred.

For snowy white "spuds", cook them in their skins. Or, if pre-pared potatoes are preferred, add a teaspoon of cream of tartar, lemon juice, or white vinegar to the cooking water.

Potatoes and similar white vegetables turn yellow, particularly in hard water.

Safety Tips

As the Christmas season approaches, home makers make decoration plans for Christmas. Making wax candles may be a fun experience but too often can result in tragedy if precautions are not taken. Any candle wax is as flammable as gasoline if care is not taken when it is being melted. It should always be melted in a pan over water, such as a double boiler and never leave it unattended to
