More Advertising Space Needed on Interstates

LINCOLN — The state advisory highway commission would like to have a relaxation of the federal bureau of roads regulation which requires interstate highway signs to be 150 square feet or less. The commission would appreciate having the maximum changed to 500 square feet to permit more information to be made available to the motoring public.

feet to perinit more information to be made available to the motoring public.

The advisory group recommended also that the department of roads inquire into the possibility of constructing informational centers at strategic points along the super-highway at which tourigt information would be distributed.

Nebraska is one of 20 states in which billboards have been outlawed on the interstate. State Engineer John Hossack recalled Nebraska enacted an anti-billboard law in 1961 to allow the state to get the benefits of a federal law which gave a "bonus" payment in return for billboard control. The federal law permits payment of a bonus of one-half of one per cent of the federal cost of the part of the highway within the state.

J. R. McBride, Minden, commission chairman, said petroleum interests suggested recentlethat the sign size restriction.

ntission chairman, said petro-cum interests suggested recent-y that the sign size restriction to changed to authorize signs up o 800 square feet. However, lossage, said this would not be

to 800 square feet. However, Hossaek's said this would not be practical.
Hossaek termed the proposal "so far out of line that it would kill the effectiveness of our purpose. Such signs would look like a sore thumb and I don't think the federal bureau of roads would go for it." At the same time, the state engineer expressed the belief that a size limitation of 400 to 500 square feet would get approval.

Dan Ramsey, a commissioner from Scottsbluff, said if Nebraska is going to capitalize on the interstate "we can't count on the bureau to help us. The state must take the initiative."

McBride said the interstate in Nebraska will probably carry more than 25 per cent of the state's traffic, making it "more necessary that we make it possible for communities to advertise what they have to offer."

He added that there is some sentiment for outright repeal of the anti-billboard law, "iff

Signs Finance Bill

Governor Morrison has signed into law LB 11, the key interest rate measure of the special ses-sion of the legislature.

The gubernatorial signature came after Morrison had been assured by the attorney general that he felt the bill would meet constitutional tests. The opinion from the attorney general did not come as a surprise since he had issued a formal opinion early in the special session stating that LB 11 was constitutional.

LB 11 leaves the general usury limit at nine per cent on conventional loans; permits installment loans at a 12 per cent interest rate; and cuts the maximum amount of a small loan from \$3,000 to \$1,500. The first \$300 of a small loan could carry a 30 per cent interest rate and the next \$200 a 24 per cent rate. The maximum interest permissible on the last \$1,000 of a \$1,500 loan would be 12 per cent. ald be 12 per cent

rates are equitable. But, he said,

Consumers Application

The state power review board has set a hearing for Dec. 18 in the Capitol on an application from Consumers Public Power District (CPPD) for authority to construct a 110,000 kilowatt steam generating unit at its Hallam,

construct a 10,000 khowatt steam generating unit at its Hallam, Nebr, site.

The new unit would cost about \$8.9 million.

The review board has invited representatives of the state's public power agencies to attend. The board said it expects CPPD to explain how it plans to finance the new unit and what its projected power needs will be for at least the next two years.

Consumers filed the application with the board recently and was the first to seek authorization from the board to construct generation facilities. CPPD presently has a nuclear fired generator operating at Hallam. The new unit would be used with the conventional boiler now in place to allow two complete generating systems.

Compensation Insurance

The attorney general has advised that it is lawful for a county board to carry workmen's compensation insurance on its em-

pensation insurance on as em-ployees. An opinion said it is lawful for a county board to continue pay-ing a regular salary to an em-ployee during a period of com-pensable disability if the em-ployee turns over to the county all compensation insurance pay-ments received.

NSEA Resolutions

The Nebraska State Education Association (NSEA) delegate assembly will consider a number of resolutions when it meets in Lincoln Dec. 6. One of them will urge a broadened tax base for the state.

The resolutions committee will ask the organization to support and cooperate with any group working to replace the Duis Amendment with another provid-Amendment with another providing that if a sales or income tax is adopted, a major portion of the revenue be allocated to the public school districts.

Need to "Winterize" Lawns,
Trees, Shrubs
This is the time of year to
protect lawns, shade trees and
shrubs against winter weather
and storms.
Lawns should be soaked and
trees watered heavily. This is
especially important now as subsoil moisture is deficient.
Trees leaves should be relawns as they will

Trees leaves should be removed from lawns as they will mat and smother the grass if not removed.

Trees and shrubs need a good supply of subsoil moisture during the winter. Water who will be applied before the ground freezes, This is especially true for evergreen trees and shrubs.

Trees such as young sugar ma-

evergreen trees and shrubs.

Trees such as young sugar maples, Norway maples, tulip trees, linden, and other thin-barked trees should be wrapped or protect them from sunscald. Wrapping the trunk with a commercial tree wrap is recommended. Wide strips of burlap can be used. Sunscald is a splitting of the bark on the south side of the tree. It occurs in all parts of Nebraska in the winter.

NPK - Simpler Terms for Fertilizer, When you buy fertilizer, read the label, advises M.D. Weldon, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist.

In Nebraska as in all states, the law requires the fertilizer maker to guarantee the per cent of plant foods in his products.

Fertilizers usually carry one

Fertilizers usually carry one or two or all three of the plant food elements nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, Weldon points out. They may contain others such as calcium, sulfur, magnesium, boron, zinc, iron, and magnese.

Nebraska law requires that if a fertilizer is claimed to contain any of these elements, the per cent of each element — except

The reason for the two exceptions is historical, Weldon says. It is also confusing.

Triple superphosphate is guar-anteed to contain "45% phosphor-ic acid" as required by law. Act-ually says, there is no acid and no phosphorus pentoxide in it. It consists of calcium salts of

phorphus.

To put phosphorus and potassium on the same simple basis as other plant food elements, Weldon says, a move is under way to change fertilizer guarantees and show the content of phosphorus and potassium.

It is a simple matter of trithmetic, he adds. Triple superphosphate, "45% phosphorus caid" contains jjust under 20 per cent phosphorus.

cent phosphorus.
Several fertilizer companies are printing two sels of analysis figures on their bags. One set shows the per cent of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash as required by present law. The other set shows the per cent of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

This double labeling, Weldon says, should provide an easy way to become familiar with the new, simpler system.

Regardless of whether the bag carries the double set of analyses, Weldon concludes, it will pay to be sure you are getting the active plant food per hundred pounds of fertilizer for which you are paying.

Removing old wax from hard surface floor coverings, such as inlaid linoteum, vinyl or asphalt, can be a problem. Jerre Withrow, Extension housing specialist at the University of Nobraska recommends removing the wax with a diluted solution of heavy-duty laundry detergent and household ammonia (half a cup of ammonia in one gallon of warm water). This mixture and a stiff brush normally will do the job. but do not use this on wood floors.

She adds that extra-heavy build-ups, such as around base-boards, may require use of steel wool. Be sure to dip the steel wool be sure to dip the steel wool in the cleaning solution before using it, she cautions.

Cleaning Silverware
Clean silver by electrolysis, using a large enameled kettle. Place a piece of bright aluminum foll in the kettle: fill with enough water to cover the silver to each quart of boiling water add one teaspoon baking soda and one teaspoon of salt. Siir with a wooden spoon. Place the silver in the boiling solution so that each piece touches either the aluminum or another piece of silver in contact with the foil.

In 1954, my insurance man sold me a \$10,000 policy and explained the facts of life. I haven't had to be sold since and the rest of the policies, totaling \$72,600, I have bought voluntarily."

Mr. Schany wants to buy a farm of 240 acres or more; he'd even consider buying the place that he is crop-sharing now. He owns a good supply of machinery and equipment and without any hired help, but using the man-sized aid of 13-year-old Billy, farms the 400-acre unit, Income is derived mainly from some 500 head of hogs sold per year and 210 head of cattle that go through his feedyards. During the winter, Schany is busy in his farm shop, fixing and building equipment, saving high overhead dollars that can go instead into his insurance savings program.

Right now the Schanys are paying premiums totaling \$1,645 a year on their insurance. The cash value of the policies, including interest and dividends, is increasing at the rate of \$1,548 per year. Thus the cost of his \$72,600 protection is only \$97 a year now.

The cash borrowed on Schany's policies can be paid back at a rate of his own choosing.

There are other financial benefits to Schany in the insurance program, too. For one thing, he's a better prospect for a regular bank or lending agency loan with such a protection plan in the background. And on year-to-year financing, such as for cattle loans, bankers feel more like making loans to adequately insured farmers.


Christmas Tree: press mixture into a lightly oiled funnel. Unmold. Dust with green sugar. Use large gumdrop to make base.

GERMAN STOLLEN

- recipe Basic Sweet Dough
- cup chopped walnuts cup finely cut candied cherries
- cup finely cut candied
- l teaspoon grated lemon rind l tablespoon soft butter or margarine 2 tablespoons sugar

Make Basic Sweet Dough. Stir in walnuts, citron, cherries and lemon rind before adding last portion of flour. Then finish mixing dough and knead. Shape into smooth ball. Place in lightly greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 2% hours). Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. With palms of hands press dough into oval shape a scant % inch thick. Spread half of oval with soft margarine or butter. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over margarine or butter. Fold unspread half lengthwise over sugar and cinnamon, making edges even. Lift to lightly greased baking sheet. Curve the ends slightly. Press down the folded edge (not the open edge). This helps the loaf keep its shape as it rises and bakes. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 1% hours). Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Remove from baking sheet. When cool, frost and decorate. Makes

Frosting

- 3/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar I tablespoon top milk or
- 3 candied cherries, sliced 2 tablespoons chopped or slivered walnuts

Mix sugar and milk or cream to make a smooth thick frosting that will just pour. Pour it over top of loaf, letting frosting drip down sides. Decorate with sliced cherries and sprinkle with walnuts.

BASIC SWEET DOUGH

- I package active dry yeast,
- or

 1 cake compressed yeast
 46 cup warm water
 42 cup milk
 46 cup sugar

2 tablespoons melted shortening 23/4 to 3 cups flour

Sprinkle dry yeast into warm (not hot) water. (Crumble compressed yeast into lukewarm water.) Stir until dissolved. Scald milk. Pour into large mixing bowl or into large bowl of electric mixer. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool until just warm. Stir in 1 cup flour. Mix in dissolved yeast. Add egg and beat hard. (Egg may be beaten separately and then added to batter.) Stir in 1½ cups flour. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of the remaining & cup flour on bread board or pastry cloth. Turn dough out on flour and knead, adding more flour as needed to make a soft dough. Knead until dough is smooth and satiny (about 5 minutes). Shape into smooth ball. Wash mixing bowl and grease lightly. Press top of dough ball into bowl, then turn dough over. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 2 hours.) Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. This dough is the foundation for German Stollen and Russian Kulich.




Leckerlis are a Welsh cookie especially popular at Christmas. Because Leckerlis soften and lose none of their quality through storage, this cookie may be made ahead of the holiday rush.

- orange peel cup finely cut candied lemon peel
- cups walnuts ground cup light corn syrup
- cups sugar cup shortening
- oon grated lemon tablespoon lemon juice
- 1½ teaspoons imitation rum flavoring

LECKERLIS

Sift together flour, baking soda, salt and spices into a large bowl. Prepare fruits and nuts; set aside. Combine syrup, sugar and shortening in a heavy saucepan; heat to boiling point; stir frequently. Remove from heat; add fruits, walnuts, lemon rind, lemon juice and imitation rum flavoring; mix well. Pour on top of dry ingredients. Combine thoroughly, finally working mixture with hands until dough is well blended. Divide dough into six equal portions. Roll each portion onto lightly floured board into a rectangle 10 x 6 x K-inches. Cut into 15 cookies, each 2 x 2 x K-inches. Place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in a 350°F. (moderate) oven 10 to 12 minutes. Frost and decorate as desired. Store in tightly covered tins. Yield: 7% dozen cookies.



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Plum Pudding, long an English favorite, has taken on a new appearance in American homes. It's chilled, cut into cubes and decorated to make Festive Dessert Kabobs.

FESTIVE DESSERT KABOBS

l pound English-style plum pudding Red Currant Jelly Flaked or fine-grated coconut Preserved kumquats Maraschino cherries Pickled watermelon rind

Chill plum pudding. Cut into %-inch cubes and press each onto toothpick. Spread cubes on all sides with red currant jelly. Roll cubes in coconut. Or roll cubes in granulated sugar and alternate on wooden picks with kumquats, maraschino cherries or watermelon rind.

Stuffed Fruit Confections: Stuff pitted soft prunes or dates with crumbled English-style plum pudding. If desired, garnish with strips of preserved kumquats or candied cherries.

SUGARPLUM CAKE

1½ cups prunes
water
2 cups sifted flour
1½ cups sugar
2½ teaspoons baking
powder
1¼ teaspoons soda
1 teaspoons salt

teaspoon nutmeg teaspoon allspice

l teaspoon allspice
l cup buttermilk
% cup cooking oil
3 unbeaten eggs
l cup walnuts, chopped

Cook prunes with water until tender. Drain; pit and cut into small pieces. Sift flour with pit and cut into small pieces. Sift flour with sugar, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice into mixing bowl. Add buttermilk, cooking oil and the prunes. Beat 1½ minutes. (With electric mixer, blend at lowest speed, then beat at a low speed. Or beat 225 strokes with a spoon.) Add eggs. Beat 1½ minutes. Stir in walnuts. Turn into 13x9x2-inch pan, greased and floured on bottom. Bake at 325° for 40 to 45 minutes. Serve warm with whipped cream and Sauce. To reheat, cover with aluminum foil and place in 350° oven 15 with aluminum foil and place in 350° oven 15 minutes. (Note: For a more moist cake, pour Butter Sauce over hot baked cake.)

Butter Sauce: Combine 1 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cornstarch in saucepan. Add % cup buttermilk, % cup butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Bring to a boil; boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Serve warm. If too thick, thin with a few drops water.



CHICKEN OF THE SEA FILLETS

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

From Russia comes Kulich, a sweet bread baked in tall, slender loaves. As the loaves rise above the tops of the cans in which they are baked, they take on the form of domes similar to those seen in pictures of some Russian churches. Kulich was originally a holiday bread, but it is appropriate the year round. Its round slices add interest to any meal, whether they are served fresh or lightly toasted.

Popular when friends drop in for a holiday chat, is the Russian recipe for Mazourka or walnut cake. Makes an ideal dessert at dinner time.



KULICH

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind recipe Basic Sweet Dough

Make Basic Sweet Dough. Stir in raisins, walnuts and lemon rind before mixing in the last cup of flour. Then finish mixing dough and knead. Shape into ball. Place in lightly greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 2 hours). Punch down. Divide into halves. Shape into balls. Press each ball into greased 1-pint can (such as fruit or juice cans), or 1-pound coffee or shortening cans. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 1½ hours). Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Turn out of cans at once. When cool, frost tops with confectioners' sugar frosting and decorate with walnuts and sliced candied cherries, or sprinkle with small colored candies.

2 tablespoons slivered

1/2 cup sifted confectioners' sugar 2 teaspoons top milk or

2 candied cherries, sliced

Mix sugar and milk to make smooth, thin frosting. Pour over tops of loaves. Decorate with walnuts and sliced cherries. To serve, cut slices from top to bottom so each slice has a bit of frosting.

MAZOURKA (WALNUT CAKE)

Beat the yolks in a bowl; add the sugar and beat well. Beat the whites in a separate bowl until stiff but not dry and fold into the yolk mixture carefully. Add the flour, walnuts, candied fruit, and lemon juice, mixing lightly. Preheat oven to 325°F. Butter a flat pan, about 8 by 12 inches, and dust lightly with flour. Pour the mixture into it. Bake for 30 minutes at 325°F. or until a cake tester comes out clean. Dust with powdered sugar. The resulting cake will be about I inch high and should be served in long, thin slices.



Many famous Christmas foods have come to us from Sweden - one of them is Swedish Fruit Soup. A favorite for its versatility, Fruit Soup can be served as an appetizer or for dessert. This is the time of year to introduce a Swedish dish that's sure to become a favorite with your family and friends too.

SWEDISH FRUIT SOUP

½ cup pearl tapioca 6 cups water

cups apple juice

cup signe cup sigar package (12 oz. or 2 cups) mixed dried fruit, cut in small pieces cup raisins

tablespoon grated orange

2 teaspoons grated lemon rind

Soak tapioca in water to cover 2 to 3 hours. Drain. Combine in a large saucepan water, apple juice, sugar, dried fruit, raisins, cinnamon stick and the tapioca. Simmer until the tapioca is clear, the fruit tender and the mixture slightly thickened, 2 to 3 hours. Stir occasionally to prevent mixture from sticking to the bottom. Stir in orange rind, lemon rind, orange juice and lemon juice. Serve warm or cold, plain or with whipped cream. Makes 3 quarts.


