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# Capitol News Don H. Shriener Named to Head Centennial Group

Lincoln — Don H. Shriener, 38, Lincoln, has been named director of the Nebraska Centennial Commission. A native of Hastings, Shriener was selected over half a dozen candidates interviewed for the job. He will be paid \$10,000 plus expenses.

A commission selection committee, headed by Maurice Hevelone, Beatrice, recommended Shriener for the post. Hevelone expressed confidence Shriener will "generate enthusiasm for our centennial program."

The director has served in an executive capacity with the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce and with the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. He has also been employed in radio and newspaper advertising. After accepting the position, Shriener said, "This will be a centennial for the citizens of Nebraska and will take their cooperation to make it successful."

Office space to serve as the centennial headquarters is expected to be secured soon. Efforts to find suitable quarters in the statehouse were discontinued because of the cramped space for agencies already located there.

The special session of the legislature authorized the commission to rent space outside the capitol building. Shriener will assume his new duties Dec. 15.

### School Lunches

More than 100,000 youngsters utilize Nebraska's multi-million dollar school lunch program. Allen A. Elliott, director of school food services for the state education department, said the program, partially financed by the federal government, has been expanding at a rapid clip during the past 13 years.

### Power Proposal

Former Gov. Val Peterson has proposed using private institutions of higher education on the junior college level.

He would like to see, if constitutional, "the formation of junior college districts in cities with private schools. Tuition would be paid by the districts directly to the students to enable them to enroll at the private colleges for their first two years."

At the same time, Peterson voiced the belief that expansion of the junior college movement is "inevitable and essential to our youths, parents and taxpayers."

The former governor noted that 32,848 students are now enrolled in 23 institutions of higher education in the state and predicted the number could swell to 60,000 by 1970. He said his plan might prove less costly than setting up separate junior colleges across the state.

Peterson foresees a need for six or more outstate junior colleges, possibly one in Lincoln and one or two in Omaha during the next five to 10 years.

"Constitutionality of the plan is still in doubt," Peterson said. "However, we have precedent for it on the national level in the G. I. Bill."

He added: "I'm not proposing anything that would violate the principle of church and state separation. I'm trying to find a way to give our boys and girls an opportunity to go to school."

Peterson also called for state support of the junior colleges. Such a proposal has been turned down with regularity in the legislature in recent years.

### Car Buying Formula

Governor Morrison has urged the state's automobile industry to work with Willard Wells, state purchasing agent, in arriving at a "fair and equitable" formula for awarding contracts on state car purchases.

Morrison extended the invitation while meeting with nearly

two dozen representatives of the auto industry who are unhappy with a new rating formula announced recently by Wells.

The new formula does not always result in the lowest bidder getting the contract.

Several spokesmen for the car industry said the new formula is "worthless" because it includes too many "indefinite" factors. Wells said he abandoned the former system of awarding contracts to the low bidder because the low bidder did not always have the best all-around car.

Wells said he will continue using his new system until the governor directs him to change it.

Morrison said his only interest was a formula fair to both the state and the auto industry. The governor emphasized that he did not mean to imply he thought Wells' formula was unfair. But that no man is perfect and if the industry deems the new system unfair, it should present Mr. Wells some constructive suggestions on how to make it more fair.

State Safety Patrol Chief Dan Casey said he must consider factors other than initial cost. He explained proper cars normally are used more roughly than other state vehicles.

He added that Nebraskans are among the most resourceful and successful and industrious in the world and could be counted on to develop a sound policy. He cautioned, however, "we need to be less provincial and to recognize that some things must be done on a local level — if we are to move ahead as a state."

Reed said an effective water policy must be based on the principle of the greatest use of the total water resources with the least waste.

### Power Allocation

Three members of the Nebraska power review board met in Denver this week with Bureau of Reclamation officials to discuss Nebraska's upcoming bureau power allocation.

The bureau has indicated some additional power will be available to Nebraska. However, it is a commonly known fact the bureau can never supply adequate power to cover the state's load growth over a long range period.

### Accepts New Job

### Creases in Resin Treated Cottons

Most cotton fabrics are folded when wound on the bolt at the factory. This center fold is often difficult or almost impossible to get out of resin treated fabrics.

Sometimes the creases can be removed by carefully applying white vinegar and pressing with a warm iron. Before using this method on a garment, test a scrap of the fabric to be sure that it is colorfast to white vinegar. If the fabric is colorfast, you can use the following method to remove creases.

First, iron the crease with a moderately hot iron. Then, while the fabric is still warm, apply a small amount of white vinegar along the crease. Allow the fabric to absorb the vinegar; then press until the fabric is dry. Sponge the area with warm water to remove the vinegar. Press again until the fabric is dry.

Too much vinegar can remove all the resin finish from the fabric. Using a medicine dropper to apply the vinegar will allow you to put only a thin stream of vinegar directly on the crease or fold.

The white vinegar method should be used only if pressing or steaming doesn't remove the crease. Since a steamer used to sponge the vinegar from the fabric, this method should not be used on fabrics which water spot. It is most useful on resin treated cottons.

### Sheep to be Inspected for Scabies

Something will be done in January to cure a "king sized" "itch" affecting the health of the Nebraska sheep industry: an inspection of sheep flocks in 68 Nebraska counties which are not scabies-free.

The sheep industry throughout the United States is in the midst of an intensive drive to rid every state of one of the oldest of livestock diseases.

An infectious disease caused by infestations of tiny mites, it keeps sheep from eating properly and they lose weight. They are restless, and will rub against posts, trees, walls or anything handy.

Scabies indirectly costs every sheep producer whether his flock has the disease or not, because of restriction on movements of sheep from states which are not scabies-free and the general reputation of scab-infested sheep within the sheep industry nationwide.

Despite its long history dating back to Biblical times, eradication of scabies is relatively simple — an approved dip will do the job.

All sheep flocks in the 68 central and eastern counties will be inspected free of charge during January and infected or suspected animals dipped at the owner's expense. Teams will fan out to inspect the estimated 4,000 flocks, expecting to average 10 flocks a day.

For the eradication effort to be successful, all sheep — even a single animal kept as a pet in an urban area — should be reported to the county agent.

The inspection is a "team effort" involving state and federal agencies, sheep producers and veterinarians, with the Extension agent the coordinator of the program in each county. Inspection will begin in Wayne County Jan. 20.

### Slotted Floors Save Labor

One of the most frequently asked questions on swine housing and equipment concerns the choice of material for slotted floors. University specialists are now recommending a particular material, but do describe the characteristics of the three primary materials used. These are concrete, wood, and steel.

Wood is least expensive, but wears out in a short time. Concrete is more expensive than wood, but is very durable and can be made of local materials. Steel is most expensive.

The slotted floor in a hoghouse keeps the house clean with a minimum of labor. Manure works through the slots into a trough and flows in semi-liquid form into a lagoon or other collection place.

The interest in slotted floors is explained by the saving in labor. Illinois research showed that it took 5 1/2 minutes a day to clean a hog shed with a slotted floor as compared with 17 minutes in a building with a solid floor. The slotted floor can be used in any building that is properly insulated and ventilated. More complete information on slotted floors, their design, and use can be found in the new Swine Progress Report 374.

### "Bargains" Are Not Always Bargains

1. Beware of Christmas bargains as you shop during the next few weeks. Unscrupulous merchants are sometimes out to make a quick dollar and to take advantage of shoppers' charitable spirit of giving.

Christmas shopping can be satisfying and profitable but you must be alert and use good buying practices.

Remember these points when shopping:

1. Decide definitely what you want before you buy to avoid difficulty or delay in take-back, exchange or refund. Don't expect to bring back to the store after Christmas an article bought before Christmas and get full credit or refund for it if that article has already been marked down. The store is under no legal obligation to accept returns.
2. Buy with care — read labels, be sure of correct size, color, and other requirements.
3. Keep sales slips or receipts until you are sure the merchandise is satisfactory and will be kept.
4. If you buy by mail order, first make sure you are dealing with a reliable company; allow
