

Reveal Plans for Unusual WSC Natatorium Building

Wayne State's new natatorium—intramural building will be an unusual specimen of architecture and facilities, plans revealed this week. College officials received details of the structure from Leo A. Daly and Company, Omaha architects.

List Changes in Feed Grain Plan

Participation in the feed grain program will be necessary again in 1964 in order to be eligible for price support on 1964-crop corn, grain sorghum, and barley, John H. Mohr, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (County) Committee, reminds farmers. Minimum acreage diversion under the program will be 20 percent of a farm's total feed grain base (for the three grains). Producer sign-up will start February 10, 1964.

The Chairman explained that the program for the three grains will be similar to the 1963 program except for these slight modifications:

1. The top limit on diversion is increased from 40 to 50 percent or 25 acres, whichever is greater;
2. In computing diversion and price-support payments, the average yield figures will be based on the 4-year (1959-62) average instead of the 2-year (1959-60) average;
3. The feed grain base of any producer who planted up to 30 acres of wheat for home use under the feed grain exemption during any one of the years 1959, 1960, and 1961 will be increased to the extent the 3-year average of such wheat acreage exceeded 15 acres;
4. While the total price supports for the three grains in 1964 are unchanged from 1963 levels, a slightly larger proportion of the supports will be available as loans or purchases, with corresponding decreases in price-support payments;
5. Payments to any producer are limited to not more than 20 percent of the fair market value of any acreage involved; and
6. The maximum payment rate will apply to all the acreage diverted where the total diversion on the farm is 40 percent or more of the base.

An attractive feature of the building will be its sliding glass walls, on the roof, opening over the pool into a terrace—an outdoor pool practically an indoor facility in the summer.

A level-floored balcony overlooking the pool will provide space for spectators or for instruction and activities. The air conditioning system—also an unusual feature—will flood the pool area with circulating warm air while introducing fresh, cooler air into the balcony.

A system of indirect lighting overhead and underwater lighting will give the pool exceptionally good visibility.

Women will use the locker rooms between pool and basketball court, while men will use existing locker rooms in the Rice building. There will be separate access from both locker rooms to the pool and court. Locker rooms between the pool and basketball court are designed for women, while the men will use existing lockers in the Rice building. Both locker rooms have separate entries to both pool and court.

Construction is anticipated as soon as weather permits next spring and should be finished by September, 1965. Bids will be received early in January. The building is to be financed solely by revenue bonds, which will be retired by the student health and recreation fee of \$10 a term.

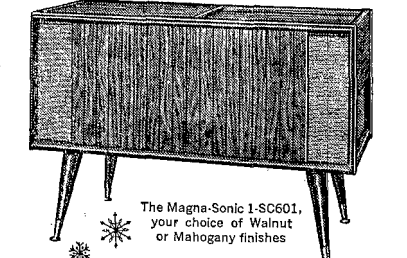
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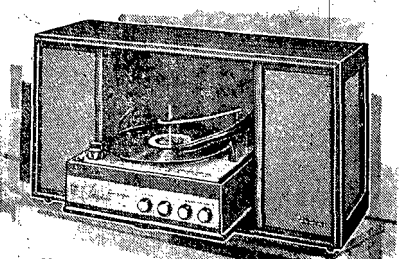

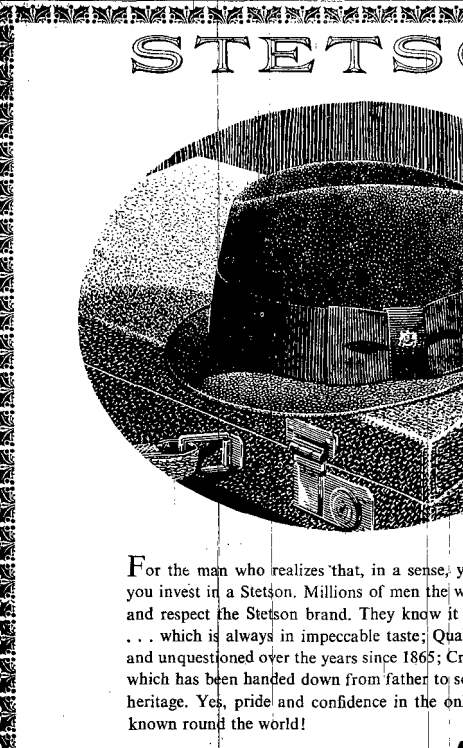

Dear Editor:
There is a controversial matter which needs to be known, and this may be the answer.

This Tuesday evening, a meeting was held at the local High School to decide if the parents and faculty could organize a PTA in the Wayne City Schools. There were approximately 40 faculty members and approximately 40 parents present. I came away from this meeting with mixed feelings, and not too enthusiastic about attending another.

A motion was made to table the discussion on whether or not a PTA should be organized until, and in hopes, that a better representation of parents would be at the next meeting in January. In discussing this, it was brought out by several individuals that those present were the parents who usually come to everything, and if the rest of the parents didn't "care" enough to come, why should the decision be delayed? They wouldn't come to the next meeting anyway. After looking

around I had to admit that I wouldn't know if these people were really the ones who come to everything or not. But if they are, and they are so few, why?

Maybe some of the fault lies right there. Frankly, I'm not sure that strangers, honestly interested parents and others, feel too welcomed by these "regulars", and surely hearing the many remarks to the effect that "we" are usually the only ones who come, and "we" are the only ones who care, etc., etc., is no encouragement for them to want to come.

I fail to see that it is a fair deduction to assume that 40 people could be so right and 1760 so wrong, assuming that approximately 900 pupils have approximately 1800 parents. Or that only 40 parents care about their children and 1760 do not.

With such remarks fresh in mind, approximately 23 voted to make a decision on whether or not to have a PTA. But ironically, the voters felt qualified to decide that they should have a PTA, and it should be State and National affiliated, but any decision on how many PTAs or if it should be a combined elementary and secondary PTA, etc., should be tabled until the January meeting.

So, parents, watch for the date of the next meeting in January; you may still have some "say-so", that is, if you come.



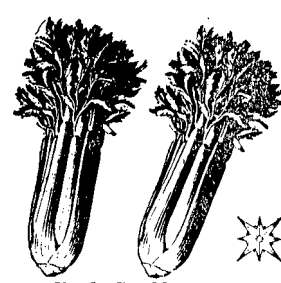

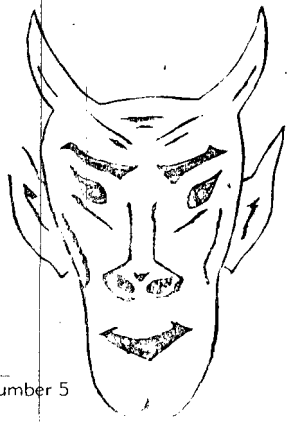

It is not known where the practice of decorating a Christmas tree originated. Some people believe that Luther put lighted candles on an evergreen to represent the stars on Christ's birth. Others think St. Boniface pointed to an evergreen tree and said that it rose in the sky in an effort to turn Germans from the pagan custom of sacrificing a human life to the oak tree.

By 1608 the Christmas tree was used extensively in Germany and soon most of the northern European countries began using it as a Christmas symbol. It was during the Revolutionary war that the Christmas tree was introduced in the United States. A Hessian soldier trimmed a Christmas tree, and that is marked as the beginning of the Christmas tree in America.
