### Governor Names Herze Lev State Director of Ban Ban

Henry Ley, president of the State National Bank, Wayne, was appointed by Governor Frank Morrison as Nebraska Director of Banking. The appointment, made Friday, is effective Febr. 1. The director's salary is \$9,000 per year. Ley has been with the State National Bank for 38 years, becoming president in 1897. He is president of the Wayne Industries Board, vice president of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce and a member of Commerce and a member of the Nebraska Hall of £ame Commission. Ley was appointed to fulfill the unexpired term of Raiph Misko who res.gned in October when a new law prohibiting the director from having an interest in any state-chartered bank took effect. Although the State is a national bank, Ley will have to cease active management of it and also divert himself of ownership in the Triangle Finance Co. since the finance company is licensed and inspected through the Nebraska Director of Banking's office.

Director of Banking duttes in colude the examination of State chartered banks, loan companies and savings and ioan tacilities, Ley said. In addition, the Office is responsible for issuance of charters and licenses to new institutions.





## 1964 MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSE INFORMATION

1. 1964 motor vehicle licenses go on sale at the county treasurer's office in Wayne on Thursday, January 2.

2. Office Hours: 8:30 to 5 Monday thru Friday — open dur-

3. No new plates for 1964. Put your 1964 sticker on the plate over the 1963 sticker.

4. You must present both your 1963 registration certificate and the 1964 motor vehicle tax statement. The tax statements will be mailed by the County Assessor prior to January 1.

### CHANGES IN REGISTRATION LAWS

1. Additional Fee: 50 cents is added to the price of all cars, trucks and trailers. All passenger cors will be \$8.50.

2. Farm Trucks: A completely new system. If you have one ton or less the fee is \$8.50. If you have more than one ton the fee is \$12.50.

3. **House Trailers:** Based on weight. Under 1000 pounds — \$1.50. From 1000 to 2000 pounds — \$2.50. Over 2000 pounds — \$10.50

4. **Commercial Trucks:** A completely new gross weight system. The license will be based on the load to be hauled, plus the empty weight of the truck, or trailer and tractor. Following are the new license, rates:

Over 5 tons add \$25 for each additional ton.

5. For commercial trucks used exclusively for hauling live-stock, unprocessed grain, sugar beets, potatoes or hay, the fee is 10% less than the above figures. Mail Applications: Prompt service given. Be sure to send in the correct fee, and both the tax statement and old registration certificate.



### **Board of Education Approves Teaching Certificate Rules**

LINCOLN—The state board of education has given unanimous approval to new rules and requilations for the issuance and renewal of eaching certificates in public and private schools. Under the new rules, collegedgree teachers after five years of probationary experience, can renew state licenses for 10 more years by successful classroom performance.

years by successful classroom performance.

The responsibility for teachers to improve themselves beyond minimum requirements is left to local boards of education and to the teaching profession itself. The new rules and regulations become operative: Jan. 1 but are subject to further approval by the governor and attorney general. Present certificates, however, will remain in force until their expiration date. In some cases this means until 1968.

Members of the board of education say they favor increasing the basic licensing requirements, perhaps up to five years for a carefer teacher. A law enacted by the 1963 legislature—LB 740—transferred to the state board greater authority to promulgate more flexible certification regulations without increasing hie minimum requirements for issuance of the first certificate. State senators who give the new law he most vigorous support said it was almed at making it casier for well qualified persons to enter and stay in the teaching professioon.

State Sen. Albert Kjar, Lexington, says the fate of public power in Nebraska will depend largely on educating a new generation of citizens on the public power concept.

An injunction sought by Auburn against the city of Peru and the State Normal Board seeking te prevent the college from executing a contract under the previsions of a new power law was also denied.



Use Those Electrical Appliances Many electrical small appliances made their appearance under the Christmas tree this year. For the homemaked to receive the most satisfaction from her gift, she might consider the kinds of jobs it can be considered to the care and storage.

First thing, of course she should do is send in the warranty card if the appliance carries a guarantee of performance for one or more years.

However, a guarantee is not a protection against misuse of the appliance, so the instruction book which comes with it should be carefully read. It should be followed.

carefully read. It should be fol-lowed and stored in a handy place for frequent reference. An

manufacturer of the appliance usually lists the kinds of jobs it dan do. Helpful hints on successful cleaning and operation are also given to insure good performance if followed.

That toaster, fry paa, coffee pot or mixer will be used to maximum only if stored conveniently and near place of most use. The mixer can very well be stored on the counter of the mixing center while toasters and coffoe pots for example, can be stored in the breakfast or dining arqa. Storage that is planned intelligently is a major factor in assuring the homemaker greatest use of her electrical equipment. The bullelin E. C. 62-1164. Those Versatile Small Electrical Appliances' has several good suggestions for storage facilities. It may be secured from county Extension offices in Northeast Nebraska upon request.

It is safer and more efficient to plug direct to the 110-120 circuit rather than using an extension cord. Where one has many small electrics, installing a power panel would be an answer for safety precautions and maximum efficiency.

General care hints:

1. Wash appliances carefully after each use.

2. To clean nickel or chrome rib gently with a soft cloth dipped in alcohol and whiting; or cream silver polish, or liquid wax for cleaning appliances. Never use gritty abrasives.

3. Remove hard water stains from aluminum interiors with a soap pad; or by heating it in a solution of two toblespoons cream of tartar to one quart of water.

4. Cluard your appliance is cool before trying to clean it.

7. Cover appliances to keep free from dust.
