



Specifically there was little opposition to the committee's plan because it didn't get that far. Most of the people were concerned about reorganization and what it would do to their own school. On that basis they don't like the thought of reorganization and they said so.

Out With Holiday Stains

Are you seeing spots before your eyes now that the Christmas holidry is over? Those spots yould very well be caused by candle wax, chocolate, fruits, fruit juices or soft drinks. The spots are usually seen on table linens and children's clothes.

Promptness in stain removal is important. Age and heat set most stains. Aftempting to remove a stein by trial and error may set a stain or damage the librie, so identify the stain before you start to remove it should be sponned immediately with cold water. Pre-test solvents and bleaches on an inconspicuous part of the garment to avoid damage to the fabric.

Candle wax — scrape away as much wax as possible with a dull knife. Place stain between blotters, press with warm iron. Remove remaining wax by sponging with a solvent. If wax leaves a colored stain, sponge with denatured alcohol or launder.

Chocolate — sponge stain with
