Second WS Trimester Starts Including 34 Night Courses

Wayne State College will begin Monday the second of its three trimester terms with a full offering of graduate and undergraduate courses.

The curriculum includes 34 courses at night, designed mainly for people unable to attend day classes. In addition, 12 courses are scheduled for opening January 30 or 31 to accommodate students transferring from colleges on the semester system.

The late courses, all basic subjects, meet for extended periods in order to finish with other second-term courses April 15. These accelerated courses are understanding art, biological science, business calculating, business mathematics, introduction to teaching, composition I and II, music in general culture, health and hygiene, physical science, and speech fundamentals.

Two of these, introduction to teaching and music in general culture, are night classes meeting Tuesday and Wednesday, respectively.

Other undergraduate courses at night:

Monday—symphony orchestra and world civilizations I; Tuesday—book selection; Wednesday—physical sciences; Thursday—world literature II and American government; Tuesday and Thursday through Feb. 29—major field materials in art, business, English, home economics, industrial arts, mathematics, physical education, science, social science and speech.

Senior and graduate courses: Monday—number theory; Tuesday—marketing management; workshop in education (National Science Foundation institute in mathematics); history of the American West, personality theory and adjustment; Thursday—genetics, social studies in the elementary school, administration and supervision of music education.

Graduate courses: Monday—problems in elementary school teaching, organization and administration of high school athletics; Tuesday—studies in the American renaissance; Wednesday—advanced educational psychology; Thursday—history of industrial arts; time arranged—applied music.

All the night classes meet once a week, with registration during the hour before the first session next week.

PO Issuance Plea For ZIP Code Use

The Postal Department is issuing a plea to all ZIP code users as quickly as they can use ZIP code to speed service.

"Unless postal patrons move quickly to use ZIP code numbers in all correspondence, there will be a delay in the transition to an improved and speedier postal service," according to Wayne postmaster Don Wightman.

The ZIP code is a five digit number placed after the state in an address. It is used by postal workers to direct the letter to its proper destination. The ZIP code for Wayne is 68797.

Wightman said the ZIP code is designed for machine use, but unless the public accelerates the use of this code, mechanization will be delayed.

The US Post Office Department handles two-thirds of the world's total mail, showing an increase of 50 percent since 1950, and in the next two decades it is expected to double.

To cope with the rapidly expanding volume of mail, it is imperative that all postal patrons move quickly to implement the use of ZIP code in every address, both the mailing and return addresses. Otherwise the Postal Department is faced with the costly proposition of constructing more buildings and hiring more and more employees, Wightman said.

Even without mechanization, the ZIP code eliminates two handlings of a piece of mail. If fully mechanized, it could eliminate from eight to 12 handlings, thus reducing the chance of human error.

Wightman said use of the ZIP code helps also to eliminate any question arising from a person's hand writing. He explained: "The first digit of the ZIP code, which designates an area, stops a guessing game. Miss. Minn., and Mass. often look alike when written in longhand. The ZIP code for each is: Minn. (5), Miss. (3), and Mass. (0). Approximately 90 percent of the possible deliveries are eliminated with the ZIP code's use. Postal workers immediately know the area a letter is destined for by looking at the first number of the ZIP code.

"We do not ask the general public to know the ZIP code of everyone on their correspondence list. However, if people, as they communicate with each other, would include the code in the return address, then this thing would snowball," Wightman said.

If a producer wishes to obtain farm storage loan, application should be made to the county office no later than Jan. 21, 1964 because of the time required to inspect, measure, sample and grade the grain.

Anyone applying for warehouse storage loans, must have the warehouse receipts in the county office no later than Jan. 31, and complete documents by that date.

Rootworm Control Meetings Planned in Area Next Week

"Heavy infestation of corn rootworm in Northeast Nebraska is a possibility for 1964," according to Bob Roselle, Extension Entomologist with the University.

To combat this potential serious problem, a series of informational meetings is scheduled in the five county Extension area.

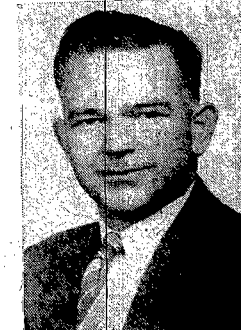
Monday, Jan. 7: 1:30 p.m., Waller 4-H Building; 7:30 p.m., Home Legion Hall.

Wednesday, Jan. 9: 2:00 p.m., Hartington Court House.

Dale Flowerday, Superintendent of the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station, will also appear on the program. Dr. Flowerday will discuss the complete cycle of corn production. In addition, he will provide information of corn rootworm control at the Station.

The seriousness of corn rootworm damage was determined from a survey of twenty-four fields in Cuming County. Approximately one third of the entire crop was down. This survey gives support to the claim that the rootworm cost farmers several hundreds of thousands of dollars in Northeast Nebraska.

Wildcats Falter in Tough Christmas Tourney Rounds

Wayne basketball fans witnessed Friday and Saturday what probably ranked as the most exciting Christmas Holiday Tournament in six years.

They also saw some of the toughest playing — with the result that host Wayne State ended in fourth place for the first time.

The finale, with Dakota Wesleyan emerging the victor over Pittsburg State of Kansas, 90-88, provided fans with just about everything a cage game can offer, except overtime. And a few seconds more might have netted an overtime.

The same was true Friday night when Wesleyan needed a score — and got it with two seconds left — to break a tie and beat Wayne, 84-84.

The other two games, despite 11-point spreads in the final score, served up plenty of excitement until the last two or three minutes.

Pittsburg downed Gustavus Adolphus 84-73 in the first round opener, and Gustavus tripped Wayne, 87-76, in the consolation game Saturday.

In all four games the winners had to come from behind at some point in the contest, and in all four the losers made it through the second half.

For Wesleyan it was the second Wayne tournament championship. The Tigers won the first event in 1958 and are the only team that has taken the trophy twice. Gustavus, St. Cloud State and Washburn have been here twice and won once. Northwestern State of South Dakota finished third both times. Wayne has won once.

Wesleyan claimed both the trophy and the higher score honor as Larry Myers hit 49 points in the two games (27 and 22). Pittsburg Jerry Couch tallied 48, divided in the two titles. Both sharpshooters fouled out late in the title game.

Wayne's top point maker was Dick Collins, with 17 and 21. For Gustavus, Andy Hagemann and Ron Johnson hit identical scores both nights, 13 and 19.

Both games proved frustrations for Wayne. In the opener the Wildcats enjoyed a 60-46 advantage with 15 minutes left, but saw Wesleyan steadily trim the edge until the contest was knotted at 80 with 2:40 remaining.

The Tigers pulled ahead two points, Wayne tied at 82-81, Wesleyan hit again, then Wayne retaliated for an 84-84 score as the clock showed 26 seconds left. The Dakotans, showing remarkable control, maneuvered for the winning shot — and made it, leaving too little time for Wayne to manage even a time-out plea.

In the consolation game, Wayne and Gustavus traded the lead a dozen times in the first half before the Gusties earned a 41-38 intermission lead. The Wildcats thereafter kept the heat on, pulled within two points, 72-70 (2:50 left to play), but became too in the vicinity of desperate tactics as fouls sent Gustavus to the charity line.

Next week the Wildcats will begin conference warfare, entertaining Chadron State in a Friday-Saturday doubleheader.

Test Wildcats Twice Before NCC Warfare

Wayne State plays two basketball games this weekend, the first at home, Friday night against Concordia, the next against Northwestern college at Orange City, Ia., Saturday.

Wayne has a record of seven wins and no losses against Concordia during the four seasons, 1957-60. However, the Bulldogs figure to give Wayne plenty of competition, judging by a pre-season scrimmage.

The Wayne-Northwestern history

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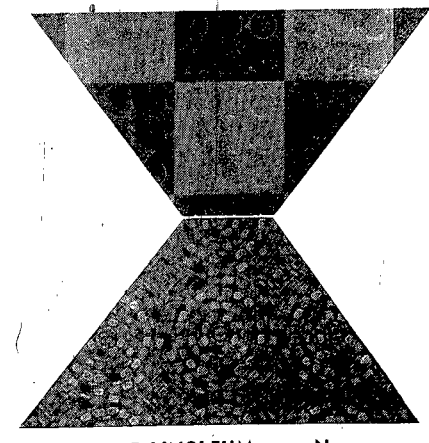

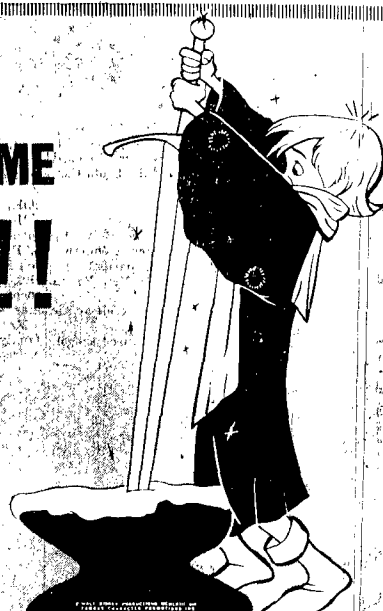

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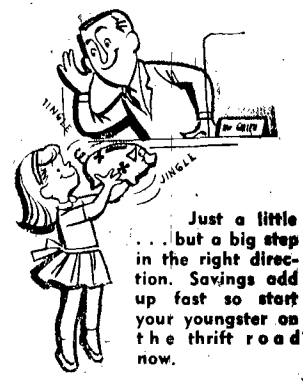

All Personal Property Owners and those 21 to 60 Subject to Old Age Assistance or Head Tax Are Required to File!

Also recording as to property and intangibles that you may have in your control, such as those

of a wife, son, daughter or other members of the family.

We wish to bring to the attention of all taxpayers, who own shares of stock, that the last session of the Legislature passed a law requiring all foreign corporations to send a list of stock-holders names, addresses and number of shares owned, to the State Tax Commissioner, who in turn will have schedules checked for the listing of such stocks.

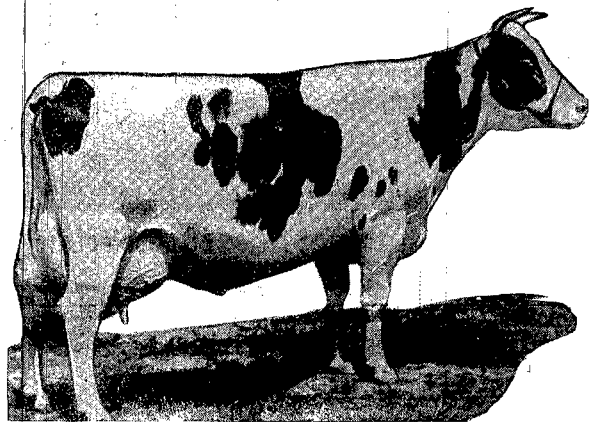

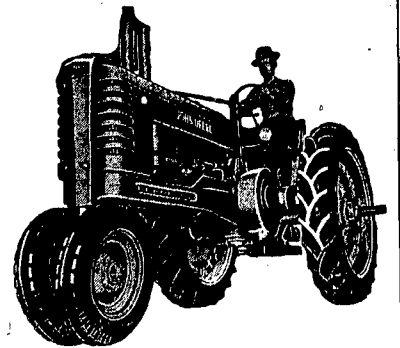

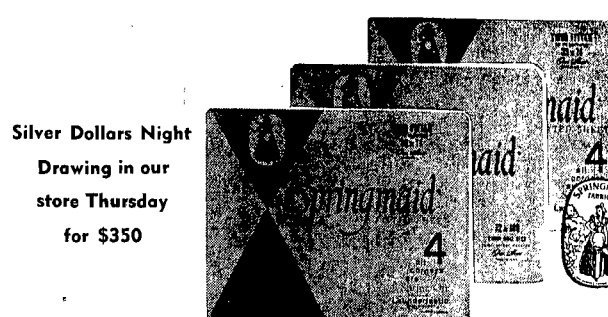

1964 MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSE INFORMATION

- 1964 motor vehicle licenses go on sale at the county treasurer's office in Wayne on Thursday, January 2.
- Office Hours:** 8:30 to 5 Monday thru Friday — open during noon hour.
- No new plates for 1964.** Put your 1964 sticker on the plate over the 1963 sticker.
- You must present both your 1963 registration certificate and the 1964 motor vehicle tax statement. The tax statements will be mailed by the County Assessor prior to January 1.

CHANGES IN REGISTRATION LAWS

- Additional Fee:** 50 cents is added to the price of all cars, trucks and trailers. All passenger cars will be \$8.50.
- Farm Trucks:** A completely new system. If you haul one ton or less the fee is \$8.50. If you haul more than one ton the fee is \$12.50.
- House Trailers:** Based on weight. Under 1000 pounds — \$1.50. From 1000 to 2000 pounds — \$2.50. Over 2000 pounds — \$10.50.
- Commercial Trucks:** A completely new gross weight system. The license will be based on the load to be hauled, plus the empty weight of the truck, or trailer and tractor. Following are the new license rates:

3 tons or less	\$15.50
4 tons	\$25.50
5 tons	\$35.50

Over 5 tons add \$25 for each additional ton.

5. For commercial trucks used exclusively for hauling livestock, unprocessed grain, sugar beets, potatoes or hay, the fee is 10% less than the above figures.
