

Community Chest Reaches Goal for the Eleventh Year

For the eleventh consecutive year the participating agencies of the Wayne Community Chest have received 100 per cent of the amount assigned to it at the time the budget was set up.

The financial report of the Chest showed a total of \$955.35 collected during the recent campaign and pledges of \$320 remain to be paid.

These figures were disclosed at the board of directors meeting held in the Hotel Morrison Jan. 9.

A total of \$4000 went to three youth organizations, the Boy Scout Scouts, Girl Scouts, and the Wayne Recreation Committee.

The board made a motion of their appreciation to Ken Parke for his service as Secretary-Treasurer during the eight year period.

Following the adjournment of the Board of Directors President Owen called the annual meeting to order.

Mrs. Don Reed, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, announced a slate consisting of Mike Karel, Charles McDermott, and Mrs. Gordon Nedergaard for the three positions on the Board of Directors.

The three named were elected and will join the six holdover members in electing officers at the next board meeting.

Countians Begin Study for Better Mental Health Here

The Wayne County task force for Nebraska's long range Mental Health program is now studying the many problems concerning mental health.

Topics to be covered by the task force will encompass the following areas: Childhood and Adult Mental Illness, Juvenile Delinquency, Aging, Mental Retardation, Alcoholism and Drug Addiction, Chronic Disease, School Programs, Cultural Variants and the Prevention of Mental Illness.

The purpose of this task force is to study and discuss needs and facilities, evaluate possible solutions, set priorities, and ascertain methods of implementation during the first year.

To facilitate these studies persons in Wayne county with knowledge of the subjects listed will be interviewed. These interviews will be conducted by members of the task force.

After the regional committees receive the reports of their many task forces, they will combine this information and formulate a plan for its region.

The ultimate goal of this organization is to establish and implement a 10-year Mental Health plan to be used by the state of Nebraska.

Congress has appropriated 4.2 million dollars for this national program and Nebraska has received \$50,000 with which to develop its Mental Health plan.

Two Bad Days Send Canadian to Jail

Intoxication, bad check writing and illegal entry into the United States wound themselves into a tale that brought a lot of difficulty to a Canadian in Wayne county.

Lawrence O'Meara, who listed his residence as Canada, was arrested by the Highway Patrol Sunday night about four miles east of Hoskins for intoxication. He was held in the Wayne city jail until Monday when he appeared in Wayne county court.

In court he was found guilty and fined \$25 and costs or 10 days in jail. O'Meara gave the court a check for the amount and then went to the Wolke Auto Co. where his auto was being held. He paid the towing charge with another check and left.

Ed Wolke called the Hastings bank on which the check was written and was told O'Meara had no account there.

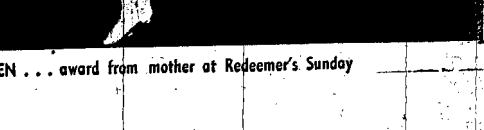
Wolke then called the county court and Judge David Hamer issued a warrant for O'Meara's arrest. The Highway Patrol and Norfolk police department were notified and he was apprehended in Norfolk about 4:30 p.m. Tuesday.

The prisoner was taken before the Wayne county judge again and ordered to spend 10 days in jail on the intoxication charge with the no account check charge pending.

After being returned to the city jail, O'Meara admitted to deputy sheriff E. L. Halley that he was wanted by the federal authorities as he was on a four-year probation for entering the United States as an alien.

Officers called the Omaha Immigration Office and the agent there stated their records showed O'Meara had been previously deported and was on probation. He said he would send an agent to get O'Meara.

Judge Hamer and county attorney Charles McDermott were contacted and agreed the prisoner's jail sentence would be suspended as soon as the Immigration agent arrived and that the no account check charge would be dropped.

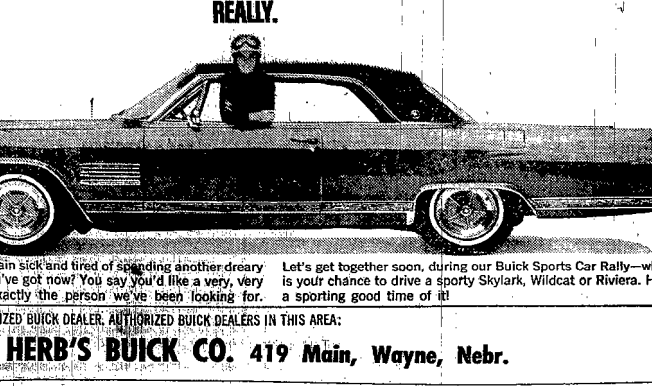
