





ETV Commission Approves Omaha Low Power Station

The Nebraska Education a latelevision (ETV) Commission has approved a change, in plans under which Omaha will be given a low power ETV station without having to wait for completion of one at Lexington.

The commission decided that the Omaha station could be constructed along with Lexington's if the latter fadility was also kept at low power initially.

Jack McBridd, commission secretary, advised that if the station were aclivated at six kilowatts instead of 25, approximately \$95,000 chuld be saved, which would be enough to give Omaha its low power station with a one power transmitter.

Several menths ago there was heated controversy when the commission refused to give the Omaha facility priority over the one at Lexington. The arguing was over a section of the ETV law, passed by the 1983 legislature. Omaha interests claimed the law's language gave their city priority. Others, including most members of the ETV commission, interpreted the words differently.

The altorney general's office,

The altorney general's office, in an opinion requested by the commission, sald it does not believe the commission exceeded legislative authority of intent when it hypassed Omaha in favor of Lexington. The opinion, however, did not flatly state the commission was correct in its action. It said the commission was "not necessarily" committed to giving Omaha a station out of the initial \$600,000 appropriation made by the legislature last year for ETV.

McBride said nothing will be lost by starting the Omaha and Lexington facilities at low power. He explained that the transmitters can be constructed in "component parts. You' don't lose anything bit just add on to what you have when you increase the power."

what you have when you in-crease the power." He added that all of the plan-ning is predicated on getting \$75,000 requested from the U. S. Health, Education and Welfare

Health. Education and Welfare Department.
Omaha will also be served by educational Channel 12, present-ly located in Lincoln. The transmitter for that station is slated to be moved by the Mead area and will have a signal strong enough to cover both Omaha and Lincoln.

McBride says be does not consider the problems in connection with a proposed 1,000-foot tower at Mead to be as serious as "reperted in the press." He said the Strategic Air Command, Offurt Air Base and the Lincoln Air Base have indicated they are not going to contest the tower location.

Hossack listed these considerations: More complicated designs; involvement of more people and agencies; the necessity of keeping traffic moving to businesses and residences while constructing through a built-up urban area; and the need to allow more lead time for persons and businesses, located in the path of new highways, to move to other locations.

The state engineer said that in order to assure that all urban work is completed by 1972 it may be necessary to advance urban areas extra money earlier in the program to permit right-of-way purchases.

The highway department has sought to adhere to a formula under which 23 per cent of the Interstate money is used in urban areas and the other 77 per cent in rural areas. There was some immediate opposition when Hossack suggested modifying this formula. Among those for adoption of the formula dur-ing the administration of the late Gov. Ralph G. Brooks. Hos-sack said he did not intend to elaborate and added that he "did not say anything about the 77-23 per cent Interstate spend-ing formula . . I merely point-ed out the problems we will be facing."

Shopping for Sheets And Pillow Cases

While must isheets are now harked "win bed," "double bed," etc., for easy identification, there are those which may not be so marked. These are marked in sizes before hem, ming. They should be 25 inches longer than the mattress for bottom trek under and top fold.

of all the sheets made in the U.S., more than 98° and side tack-in.

Of all the sheets made in the U.S., more than 98% are cotton-muslin or percale — and many come in pretty colors or prints. Muslin is preferred when cost is a factor. Percale is more luxurious — silkier and lighter in weight. The figher the, thread count, the finer the fabric. Muslin is usrally 128 threads per square inch; percale ranges from 180 to over 200.

Make the sizing test when shopping for either muslin or percale sheets by rubbing two sections of sheets together. If a fine, powdery substande form easily, there is too much sizing. After the first washing, the sheet will be limp. Fitted sheets should be shrink resistant; colored sheets, vat dyed. Hens should be even with small stitches. Selvadges should have tape-like sturd in ess; weave should be even.

Pillow cases are usually well labeled. Check the size. They should be 10° longer than pillow; width should be double width of pillow plus about two for ease.

Warmth depends upon how efficient the fabric is as an insulator. Air trapped in the cloth tends to keep out cold and slows the escape of body heat At one time the fiber used was believed to be the determining factor of warmth. 'All wool' is synonymous with warmth. The weight of a blanket is not a true indication of warmth. A lightweight fluffy blanket is usually warmer than a heavy, tightly where nee. The special weave of thermal blankets combines warmth with unusual lightness.

A blanket should be able to

withstand wear and cleaning. Durability depends upon the quality of fiber in the yarns, the construction and finish, the amount of inapping and lo some extent the blanket's size and the way it is cleaned.

Choose a size long crough so that the blanket can tuck in adequately at the foot of the bed, yet cover the shoulders. It should be wide enough to hang down over the sides. Size affects wear. A blanket that is too short wears from constant strain. Sevenal sizes of blankets are available including those for extra wide or extra long beds. A popular size is 72 inches by 90 inches because it will fit either a twin or double bed.

Federal law requires that the fiber content and percentage of each type of fiber be listed on the label. The market presently is dominated by rayon and acrylic fibers. Blends of two or more fibers are often used. Blending reduces cost. and may improve performance. For example, 15 percent nylon will help control wool shinkage.




