Semi-finals will be played Thursday, Jan. 30 and the finals and consolation finals will be held Friday, Jan. 31.

Mark Grein paced the winners with 10 counters and Glen Nichols added 7. The losers were led by D. Vahle with 15 tallies.

Hastings Broncos Smother Wildcats

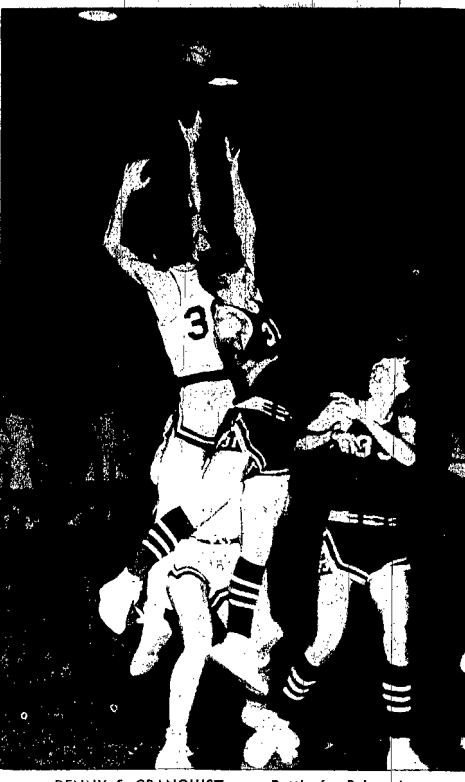

Wayne Outlasts Kearney 84-79

Team balance paid off again for Wayne State cagers Saturday when they outlasted Kearney, 84-79.

All nine Wayne players contributed to the score while only five of Kearney's seven tallies. These five averaged higher than Wayne's top five, but reserve strength won out for Wayne.

Luckily, too, Kearney started and finished with a vengeance in an effort to end Wayne's string of wins in the previous five games.

The Antelopes enjoyed a 20-13 advantage after eight minutes of see-saw play, and they hung in tight the rest of the first half, leading twice again before the Wildcats moved ahead to stay 34-33, with four minutes left. Wayne led at the half 46-43.

Roger Ginapp hit all his 13 points in the first half, and Pallesen scored half of his 18. Then Wayne's multiple threat proved its worth after intermission. With Ginapp under heavy pressure, Dick Collins broke the Kearney defense with 11 of his 15 points. Pallesen continued his pace, and the other Cats kept the Antelopes loose.

Wayne extended its halftime margin to fairly comfortable leads, up to 10 points, until an Antelope surge gave the Wildcats a scare at 80-78, with 2:20 left to play. From that point on Wayne adopted a cautious control strategy. Result: no more field goals by either team. But Kearney's efforts to gain control produced two fouls which substitutes Bob Hope and Jim Murphy converted into two pairs of free throws.

Hope, in his first extended duty with the varsity, collected 16 rebounds and scored nine points.

Cats Host Doane In NCC Tilt Here

Wayne State will finish the first half of its 1963-64 conference basketball campaign Friday, entertaining Doane at 7:30 on the Rice mapes.

It will be the Wildcats' only game this week and their last home appearance for three weeks. The next outing will be a crucial tilt at Peru Feb. 1.

Wayne will match a 3-1 conference record against Doane's 1-2 in an effort to stay in contention for the NCC title. Both Hastings and Peru are 2-0, but one of them will topple when they clash Saturday at Peru.

Anyone who saw Hastings whip Wayne here last week will predict the Broncos can handle not only Peru but every other team in the league.

Doane was the unhappy 100-97 victim of Peru last week after a win over Kearney and a lop-sided loss to Hastings.

Roger Ginapp continues to pace Wayne scoring with 188 points in 15 games, but Mike Pallesen has rocketed to 96 points in only four games. He leads the conference in total output, but Hastings' Eddie Lor-

enzen has a lusty average of 33.5 in two games.



THE NATIONAL JAYCEE STORY

The world's largest young men's civic organization began because young Henry Giessenbier, in St. Louis, Missouri, felt that young men should not have to wait around until middle age to participate in civic affairs. Giessenbier was struck by the thought young men should be organized for the purpose of performing civic service and developing leadership in themselves. He called a meeting of interested young men and 32 responded.

By 1916 the work of the new organization had attracted attention of many others. The Jaycees had promoted projects aimed at securing greater participation in government, a better relationship among agriculture, industry and labor, less juvenile delinquency and a host of other activities. Word about their activities spread and inquiries began to pour in from all parts of the United States. In 1919 Giessenbier sent a call to all known groups asking them to St. Louis to form a national organization.

By 1941 the organization boasted 1,066 clubs. Then came World War, II and 85% of the Jaycees went into service. The end of the war found veterans returning with a new appreciation of America and a desire to take a more active part in their communities. In 1946, 25,000 members were added as were many new programs. By September of 1953, the membership of the U. S. Jaycees was upwards of 150,000 and nearly 2,200 local organizations were spread over the 48 states, Hawaii and Alaska. Jaycee organizations had also spread to over 50 foreign countries. Following the Korean war, the Jaycee story continued to grow with 2,500 clubs in the U. S. and upwards of 200,000 members. Your local Jaycees have grown with the National and State organizations extending their fields of activity to better serve our community.

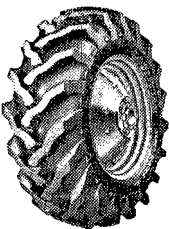


