NE Nebraska High School Journalists Competing at WSC

High school journalists of North-east Nebraska will have a chance to match their skill against other students in district competition March 27-28 at the Western State College in Lincoln.

"This is something new, a district contest in journalism. It replaces the single statewide contest previously sponsored in the fall by the State High School Press Association."

The District III contest will be held at Wayne State College Saturday morning, March 7, with about 80 schools in a 20-county area eligible to send entrants. The annual district Publications Workshop, previously held in Norfolk, will meet in conjunction with the contest.

Ruth Wagner of the Norfolk High School faculty is in charge of both contest and workshop.

District contest winners in each of 10 classes of competition will be eligible to enter the state NHPA contest in Lincoln May 21. The six other districts will stage their contest at Chadron, McCook, Kearney, Peru, Lincoln and Omaha.

The 40 classes of competition are news-feature writing, sports writing, editorial writing, copyreading, editing-headline writing, newspaper layout, advertising, yearbook copyreading and editing, yearbook layout, yearbook copywriting, and radio news writing and announcing.

Each school may enter one student in each contest, and all 10 contests will run simultaneously. All entries will go to the University of Nebraska School of Journalism for judging of first, second and third place winners in each contest, and in three classes of schools (Classes A, B, C, according to enrollment).

Contest information is being mailed to journalism instructors in the 20 counties of District III: Platte, Boone, Antelope, Madison, Stanton, Cambridge, Thurston, Dakota, Dixon, Cedar-Wayne, Pierce, Knox, Holt, Rook, Brown, Keya Paha, Boyd, Nance and Colfax.

The Publications Workshop program includes three sessions for yearbook staffs, two for newspaper staffs.

Leadership Position To City Clerk Witt

Howard Witt, City Clerk of Wayne, has recently received an appointment as area membership chairman for the International Institute of Municipal Clerks, thus taking his place within a newly-created leadership corps of the professional association.

The new chairman, who has been Wayne City Clerk since May 1, 1959, joined the international organization of his professional colleagues in 1962 and has thus been recognized for leadership among nearly 2,000 clerks and like officials in as many municipalities in every state, Canadian province and a dozen other nations.

Witt explained that "this three-year goal envisions only three or four new enrollments in my area. But I am hopeful more than that number will readily join this great service organization."

See Feed Grain Program As Conservation Help

The 1964 Feed Grain Program providing an excellent opportunity for Dixon County Soil and Water Conservation District cooperators is an aid for conservation work.

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Converting cropland to grass is being planned by a number of cooperators this year. Of particular interest is the use of native grasses. These are the warm season grasses that occupied the land when the Indians lived here. They are well adapted to the "hill land" of Dixon County, requiring less moisture and fertility than do the cool season grasses.

It is important to recognize the method to use to establish these grasses. Good stands may be obtained by drilling the grass into close-drilled sorghum or sudan stubble and corn stalks. This mulch will reduce moisture evaporation, give protection to the new plant, and help to suppress weed growth.

Ellis Resigns as Loan Association Secretary

Leslie Ellis, secretary for Wayne Federal Savings and Loan Association for the past 28 years, has announced his retirement, effective March 27.

Top Spots to Debaters In Illinois Tourney

Welfare Outlay in County Compares Well with Nation

Some light has just been shed on how much is being spent for public assistance in Wayne County, as compared with such outlays in other parts of the United States.

The details are contained in the first report of the kind ever made by the Government, which pays part of the cost. It was released by the Bureau of Family Services.

For the local area and elsewhere, it gives figures on the proportion of people getting old-age assistance and other kinds of aid. It reveals, also, the size of the payment in each locality.

According to the findings, communities vary widely both in number of people aided and in amounts paid. In some areas, where there have been severe economic problems, as in certain rural parts of the country, the need for aid is greater than in others.

But frequently, it is noted, the amount given there each month is smaller than is paid to people in other areas.

The reason is that a different scale of payments prevails in each community. Each has its own financial limitations and its own ideas as to proper amounts.

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Highway 16 to Be Resurfaced Soon

The Nebraska Department of Roads is taking bids today on 143 miles of State Highway improvement totaling \$8 1/2 million.

Of special interest to residents of Wayne County is the improving of 5.8 miles of Nebraska Highway 16 from the junction with U-35 south of Wakefield, south. The route was graded in an earlier project and now will receive subgrade reconstruction, lime treated subgrade, soil-aggregate base course, shoulder construction, asphaltic concrete base course, guard rail, and gravel surfacing for detour.

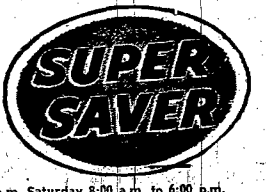

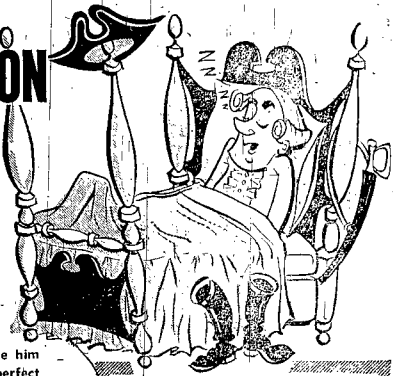
J. Wachter Rites Held Yesterday in Hadar Church

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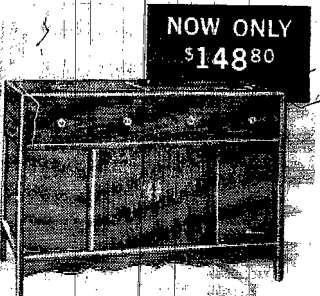
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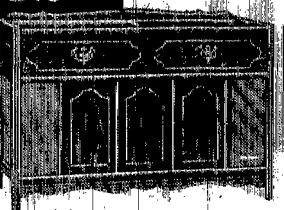
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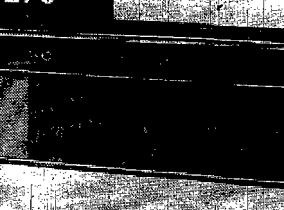
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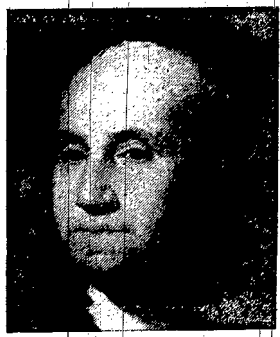
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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Disappearing Taste

A couple of hours of conversation and reminiscing while on a trip with a milk producer from this area brought to light some real interesting observations. Conversation turned to price, and being over a quart a day man myself, I commented I didn't think the retail price was too bad, but milk and milk products did turn out to be a pretty big item in our budget each month.

Then we verbally looked at milk as it is now produced and decided it is probably the most complete food available and had some other assets not found in any liquid.

I wondered how many of those glass stomachs on TV that "drip, drip, drip," acid could be quieted with a shot of milk? How about those jangly nerves at bedtime? A glass of milk to me is still the best calmer-downer I've found. This includes liquids distilled by things other than cows.

But neither of us being doctors, we left the medicinal effects of milk to look at some of the more pleasant aspects. I commented that it would be interesting to know just how many of today's kids, say between the ages of six and 15, have ever eaten real cream on cereals. Darned few, I imagine. Of course real cream prices are pretty high, I said, and the producer agreed with me. But he

said if the demand were great enough for real cream, steps could probably be taken to lower it. This is fine, but we are raising a couple of generations of people in the meantime that don't even know how good milk and milk products can be, because we haven't let them near enough to the real thing to develop a taste for it.

You can't tell me that anyone can slop up a good cup of coffee with a cream substitute and enjoy it to the extent that they could real cream. Or how about the kids? I can't imagine anyone enjoying cereal with some of this "blue" milk poured over it. But how are they going to know how good it can be with the real thing unless they are exposed to it?

We both then wondered if the dairy business was doing as much as it could, and in the right direction, to produce a desire for milk and milk products and thus bring a better price to the producer. Or at least make the market big enough to use all milk produced properly.

But then again, if we are letting ourselves and our kids lose our tastes for milk, all the drum beating in the world won't help much. If our area producers are going to remain sound in the milk producing business, maybe they better get a little action started before everyone forgets what Grade-A tastes like.

What causes dry cookie dough?

There are a number of reasons that could cause cookie dough to be dry. Study the following list, then reread your recipe and you should be able to find the cause.

1. Undermeasurement of liquid or use of small eggs. In recipes where there is little liquid or moisture, it is often necessary to press dough together. When using the new instantized flour, the dough may look and feel different. Continue on as you normally do, working with your fingertips until the dough holds together.
2. Overmeasurement of flour or dryness of flour. The properties which make flour a "structure builder" in baking also make it absorb and release moisture from the air very readily. Any kind of flour stored in a warm, dry kitchen absorbs more moisture (water, milk or egg) than flour stored in a humid kitchen; thus, it makes a dryer dough.
3. Undermeasurement of shortening or use of chilled shortening. If shortening (butter, margarine or soft shortening) is firm, your dough will be less pliable than if it is at room temperatures. To assure success in baking, measure cups and spoons and following mixing directions exactly.

Game Director Disapproves New Accounting Suggestion

LINCOLN — A proposal to lump 94 state cash funds into one general fund has been in the news spotlight in recent days at the statehouse. The idea, suggested by an accounting firm hired to revise and modernize Nebraska's bookkeeping system, is currently under study by the executive board of the Legislative Council.

There has been some fear expressed by representatives of some of the major state spending agencies that while the plan would simplify accounting procedures it might also cause earmarked funds to lose their identity. If that happened, they said, it could result in smaller departmental budgets. Mel Steen, outspoken director of the State Game Commission, labeled the plan as "no good" and predicted that "considerable harm would come of it."

Under the proposal, game, voting and park funds would revert to the general fund, instead of being kept in separate accounts. "Historically and legally," Steen argued, "these funds are marked for wildlife management. They cannot be used for anything else." He also cautioned that sportsmen would not stand still for the game funds being used "for an unintended purpose."

Steen said he advocates a tax system under which "the man who gets the benefits pays the tax." This, he added, is the concept under which the game fund is administered. Spokesmen for the State Highway Department suggested that the legislature give a permission to lump all its cash funds into one general cash fund within the department. At the present time the department has four cash funds. Each is financed by road-user taxes.

Deputy State Engineer Gerald Strobel said that even this might cause some problems. He noted money left over after a biennium might not be reappropriated.

Rigging Charged

S. H. Brauer, Jr., an official of the Nebraska School Improvement Association (NSIA), has charged that the governor's regional conferences on education were stacked in favor of the Nebraska State Educational Association (NSEA). The NSIA and NSEA have frequently been at odds over educational matters.

Governor Morrison told a news conference that Brauer had no reasons supporting his rigging charge. The governor said neither he nor any of his staff had ever interfered with the free operation of the conferences. Last December, Brauer said, the governor assured NSIA leaders the regional meetings would be open to everyone.

But Brauer now claims some conferences required advance registrations with some registration fees running as high as \$3. "Such maneuvering to control attendance and thereby the conclusions on the part of the regional conference chairman is proof positive the meetings have not been public and open to everyone," Brauer said.

He added it is also impossible

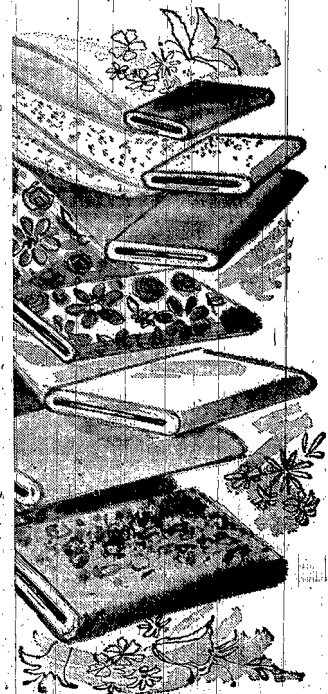

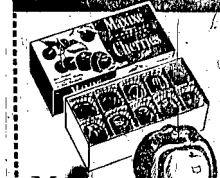

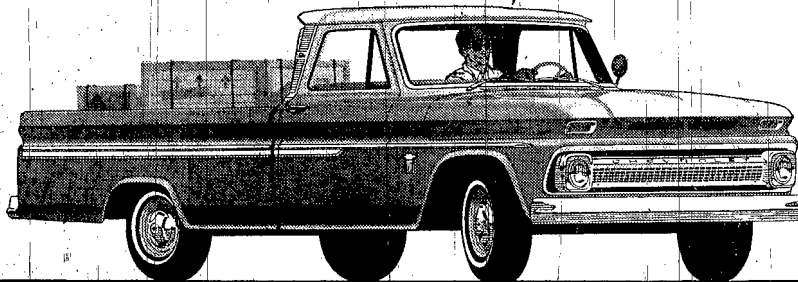
