City Caucuses Set Tuesday; Need Full Slate

A full slate of candidates will have to be named by Wayne electors when they meet at their caucuses Tuesday.

Both the Citizens and Popular parties are urging good farmouts for this important function.

At the first caucus at 7:30, the electors will have two candidates from each party for the Wayne city board of education.

The board of education terms of Dr. Loyd Jensen and Rev. Robert Surck expire this year.

Then at 8 p.m. the electors will name a candidate for mayor from each party and the term of office expires for Mayor E. J. Brandt.

Following this caucus, the electors from each ward will assemble at their designated meeting places and each name a candidate for councilman from their ward.

In the first ward, the term of W. L. Ellis ends, and in the second ward, the term of Kent Hall is up and in the third ward, the term of Fred Geldersleeve ends.

For the first two caucuses, the Popular party will meet at the city auditorium while the Citizens party will meet in the Fire Hall.

Then the electors will move to these designated meeting places for the ward caucuses:

Citizens Party:
First Ward, Fire Hall; Second Ward, City Library; Third Ward, Basement Lobby, County Court House.

Popular Party:
First Ward, City Auditorium; Second Ward, Wilcox Chapel; Third Ward, Main Floor lobby, County Court House.

State Colleges Report Long Range Expansion

Wayne State College is looking ahead to a building program of nearly four million dollars in the six-year period up to 1971.

This figure came from a report made to the State Normal Board Friday, along with similar reports by the other three state colleges. In accordance with a new state law requiring state institutions to outline their long-term building needs, the colleges suggested what they would hope to build.

Result: a total of \$15.4 million in proposed construction. The projects, however, are not yet authorized, nor do they even have preliminary ratings.

Major items in the Wayne plan include a science building, \$1.5 million; general purpose classroom building, \$1,350,000; fine arts addition, \$350,000 to the building to be built this year; library addition, \$200,000; renovation to the industrial arts building, \$100,000; maintenance shop and garage, \$100,000.

The colleges' proposals go to the Legislature for consideration along with other construction needs.

Formal Dinner To Sponsor Lenten Services

A former Wayne resident will return this Wednesday evening as guest preacher at the Wayne First Methodist Church at 8:00 p.m. The Rev. Dr. Robert Lewis Townsend is son of the Methodist pastor who served the Wayne church from 1923-27. During this period the Rev. Mr. Townsend was a student in grade school.

He will return to Wayne as speaker for the Lenten Chapel flour in the church where his father preached. Dr. Townsend's topic will be "On Being a New Testament Christian." This is part of the series "Old Word—New Meaning" the theme for this year's worship services held each Wednesday in the local church.

Dr. Townsend is a graduate of Nebraska Wesleyan and Garrett Biblical Institute, and received the Doctor of Divinity degree from Nebraska Wesleyan in 1961. He has served pastorates in Chadron and Sidney, building new churches in both communities. In June 1962 he was appointed Superintendent of the Kearney District.

A man of many talents, Dr. Townsend finds time for a regular "Look for the Good," and for his growing hobby of sketching. He is married to the former Helen Kounovsky of Verdell. They have three children.

Special music for the service will be provided by the double sextet. Following the service dinner will be served by the Wesleyan service Guild. The public is cordially welcomed.

Ag Leaders Training Conference Here Today

How do you plan a 4-H club program? What can leaders do to strengthen their 4-H club? These and other questions will be the focus of a one day 4-H Agricultural Leaders Training Conference to be held in Wayne, today from 9:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. at the City Auditorium.

Three specialists from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln will conduct the training. Dave Williams, of the Department of Animal Science will work with the livestock leaders. Phil Cole, of the Department of Dairy Science, will work with the dairy leaders. Ken Schmidt will conduct the training for the other Agricultural leaders as well as lead discussion concerning the way youngsters grow and develop.

The training conference is one of several being held over the state. Counties included in the Wayne Conference are: Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Thurston, Wayne, Cumming, Stanton, Madison, and Pierce.

Progress Noted on Wayne Campus

Twenty-eight years ago, Wayne State Teachers College had a total enrollment of 658. The college was staffed by 56 administrative and instructive personnel. This figure doesn't seem to indicate its growth in that the enrollment dropped considerably in the 1940's.

Since 1936, the name has been changed to Wayne State College and the enrollment has risen to 1799. The faculty now numbers 97 which includes 38 persons with doctorates, compared to 8 in 1936.

Even the general physical structure of the college has changed. Seven new buildings have been constructed and work will start soon on two others.

The most recently constructed building is the Student Center which was finished in 1962. Berry Hall, a co-ed dormitory, is the largest building on campus and was opened in 1961, boasting dormitory capacity to 1200. Rice recreation and physical education building, finished in 1958, will have an addition attached this spring as soon as the weather permits.

Corn Library was completed in 1956. Morey Hall, a men's dormitory, was constructed in 1952. Originally, however, Morey didn't have the wings that now flank its north and south ends. These wings were built in 1957.

Morey Hall was the first building constructed on the campus since Terrace Hall in 1938. This lag in construction corresponds with the aforementioned lag in enrollment.

Construction on the Rice building addition and the new Fine Arts building will begin as soon as the contractors feel the weather permits.

Land Mark Council Will Erect Marker Near City Airport

At a meeting in Lincoln, Feb. 5, the Nebraska Historical Land Mark Council approved a marker for Wayne. The marker will be placed in an area in the southwest corner of the Airport grounds with the sanction of the City Council. This tract will be developed as a roadside park.

The Wayne County Historical Society is the local sponsor for this marker but needs contributions to help pay half the cost, \$175. The Land Mark Council bears the other half and the Highway Department erects the marker. County and City organizations and individuals wishing to assist in this project please send your contributions to J. Robert Boeckenhauer, Secretary-Treasurer of the Wayne County Historical Society, Route 1, Wayne. Proper credit will be given to the donors.

Should there be an excess of funds contributed, these will be used to further the work of the Society. The Board of Directors hope to get the organization "off the ground" and they need the help of every Wayne County citizen who is interested in the preservation of local history.

The marker will carry a legend of 180-200 words pointing up early history of Wayne County, the old Normal College, etc. J. R. Johnson, Chairman of Nebraska Historical Land Mark Council, expressed the hope that it would be ready for dedication, with proper ceremonies, early this summer.

Work on Sherman street begins at the Wayne high school building and continues north to Seventh street. It is hoped that these streets may be graveled at a later date.

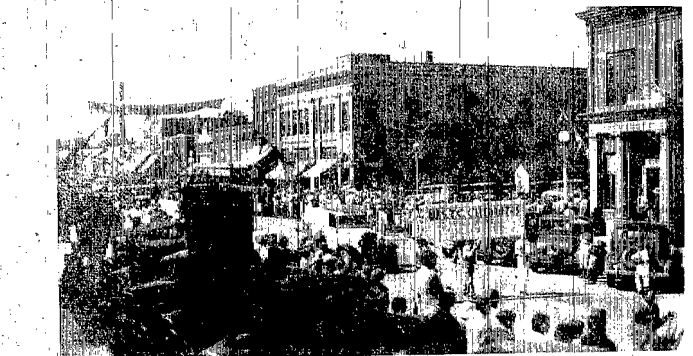
Betty Crocker Award To Area Senior Girls

Neither club controlled the game at any point, but Oakland led throughout most of the contest.

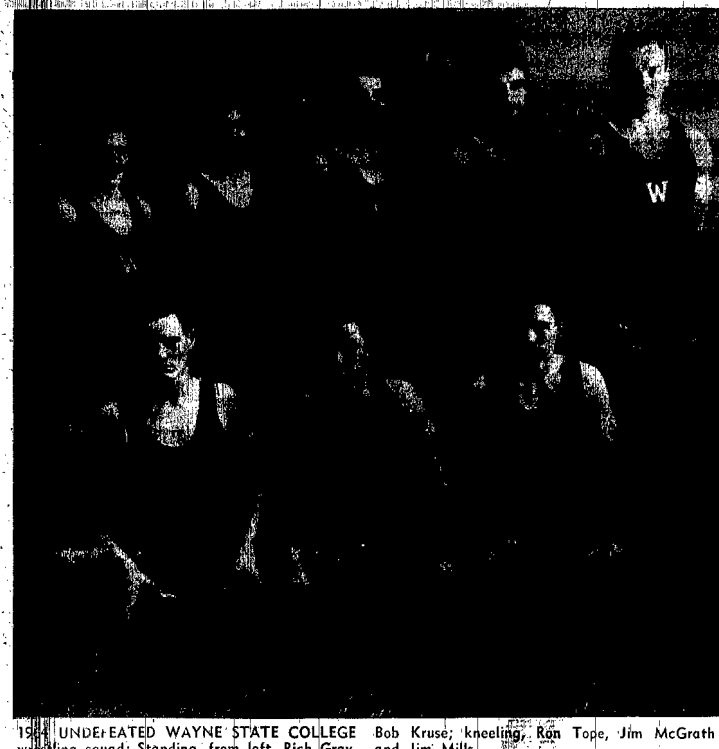
