The auto was driven by Dwoin Long, 18, Wynote. They were going east on the highway when the car missed a curve and turned over on its top.

Long was hospitalized in Yankton. Wert was killed.

Bishop to Speak Here in Lenten Chapel Hour

W. Copeland will be the speaker for the Lenten Chapel Hour in First Methodist Church here, Wednesday at 8 p.m. The Bishop's sermon will be on "The New Creatures in Christ."

Bishop Copeland was born in Arkansas, the son of a pastor in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He was instrumental in leading this segment of Methodism into the union of three major sections of the Church in 1939.

He has served outstanding pulpits throughout Texas, including Dallas and San Antonio. He was elected to his present office as resident Bishop of Nebraska at the Jurisdictional Conference of 1960.

Meyer's car turned over in the ditch. Peterson and Miss Nolting were thrown from their auto. He was lying 68 feet from the point of impact and she was 54 feet from the same point.

SCS to Take Soil Samples in County

The Wayne county Soil Conservation Service will start a block survey of soils in the entire county in a short while, and Don Kerl, SCS technician, explains some of the points of the soil surveying.

Our conservation program must begin with the soils which determine to a large extent the present and potential productivity of all traits of land, Kerl said.

We must look inside the soil to determine its characteristics, and this is the job of the county's soil conservation service, he said.

The soils are studied on each farm by using a tile spade, hand auger, and hydraulic probe mounted on a pickup. Soils are investigated to a depth of three to five feet. The slope of the land is measured by use of a hand level. The physical characteristics observed are texture, color, depth of surface soil, structure, type of parent material, slope, erosion and drainage.

This information is then listed on an aerial photo with different soil names for corresponding soil characteristics. Each soil type is shown with its location on each farm. In brief, it is a physical inventory of your land.

Parke, Tietgen Nominated In Wayne's Mayor Election

Two incumbents were nominated for office in the Wayne city and School District 17, caucuses held Tuesday night.

Councilman W. L. Ellis, first ward incumbent, and Kent High, second ward incumbent, were nominated.

Over 100 people turned out for the caucuses despite icy streets, and highwinds.

Nominated as candidates for mayor were K. N. Parke, Citizens Party, and Chris Tietgen, Popular Party.

Parke is the former Chamber of Commerce manager and Tietgen a former councilman.

The election will be held April 7.

Legion Birthday Party Planned Here March 17

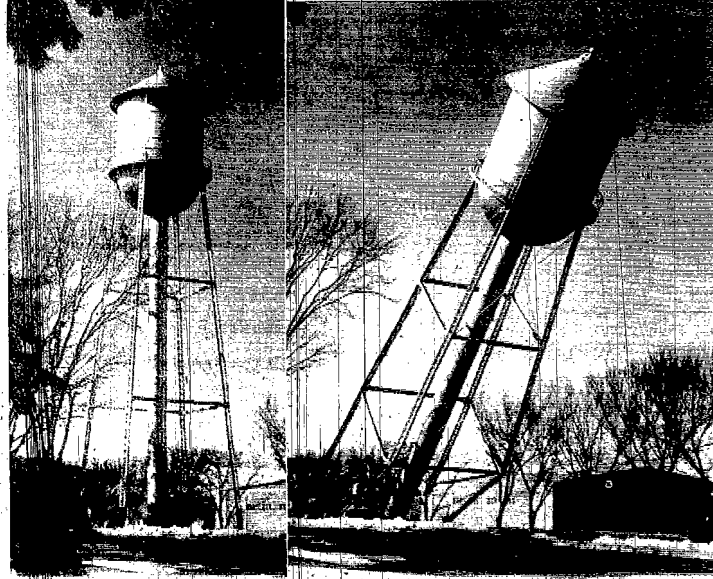

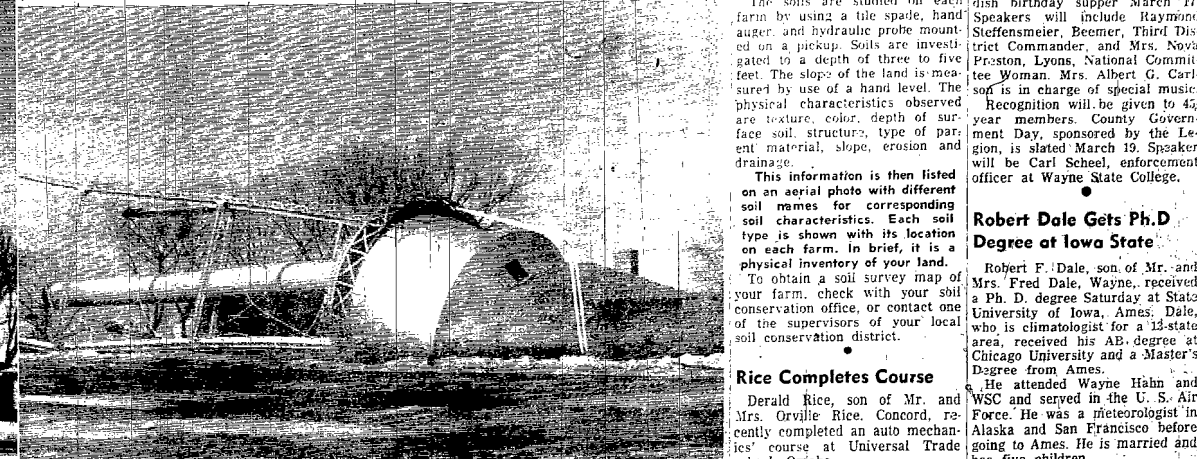
Robert Dale Gets Ph.D. Degree at Iowa State

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Last 11 Seconds Fatal for Wildcats in Peru Contest

Wayne State's 1963-64 basketball season ended unimpressively last Thursday when the scoreboard clock in Rice gym showed 11 seconds left. Peru State 57 points, Wayne 55.

Wayne ended the oldest game of the season by playing all year, and with one of the more frustrating seasons in several years.

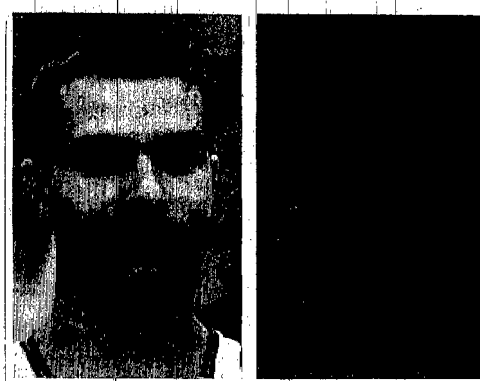
The end came abruptly when Peruvian Bill Witty pirated a Wayne pass just before the cats would have made their final breaking play. Witty dashed for the basket, Jon Garcia intercepting him all the way. In a tangle of arms and legs, Witty fired an awkward lay-up—it bounced and sailed through the nets. In the remaining 11 seconds Wayne—all time-outs gone—drove desperately for a tying score, but missed.

Result: Peru finished its conference season at 7-3, in second place behind champion Hastings, 9-1. Wayne, which could have won Peru for second with a win, finished in a third-place tie, 5-5, with Chadron State. Wayne won 13-11 for the season, compared with 14-11 last year.

The game never went according to the usual pattern of either team. Neither could score handily. For example, after four minutes the score was a paltry 4-0. Peru leading.

The half ended at 25-22, Peru ahead.

Wayne eventually caught up, and the lead changed several times un-

Wayne High made their bid for a semi-final berth in the district tournament at Bloomfield Friday night with a 53 to 38 win over Pierce. The Devils relied mainly on the rebounding of Doug Manske and the shooting of Jim Mau for the victory.

Wayne now meets Neligh who defeated Bloomfield 69-61 the same night. The contest begins at 7:00 p.m. tonight (Thursday).

The winner of this contest will play in the finals at 8:00 p.m. Friday night.

Land Burning Will Advance Weed Crop

It seems that many farmers in Wayne county burn off their roadsides and stubble fields in order to kill weeds. Recently it was discovered that this practice aids in the growth of weeds.

Years ago, it was thought weeds could be removed by burning fields, pastures, and woodlots. It was supposed the practice would cause the grasses to green-up sooner.

"This is not true," said M. O. Steen, Game Commission director. "Burning is an antiquated and impractical way to remove weeds. And, although the use of fire has been reduced somewhat in recent years, it is still a problem in certain areas.

"There are all manner of weeds. There are wren trees such as Russian olive and honey locust. There are vegetable weeds such as wild carrot, bindweed, and thistle. There are also weed grasses.

"When the soil becomes so poor through misuse it will not grow the better grasses, weed grasses such as sandspur move in."

Undesirable grasses are not killed by burning, said Director Steen. The landowner is merely eliminating some of the weed's competitors such as bromes, switchgrass, wheat grass, and the blue stems.

"The best way to eliminate weed grasses is to increase the fertility of the soil, enabling other plants to take over," said Steen.

"Look at last year's unburned areas and you will find more and healthier plants. These plants are thriving because the ground is richer. And, it is richer because its fertility was not destroyed by fire."

"Grazing animals are quick to pick out the choice grasses on fertile soil. Observe a herd of cattle and see which lands they graze; it will be unburned sections every time.

"Burning of roadsides makes the favorable grasses and destroys room for the weeds which are the first plants to come back each spring," Steen concluded.

Quality Tests Offered to Junior Students March 10

Twenty-five Wayne high school students plan to take the 1964 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, Tuesday, Mar. 10, at the city auditorium.

Taking this test will be Kathy Baker, Stuart Bernthal, Carol Blecke, Janine Brown, Mike Carter, Jean Christensen, Diane Diarm, Jayne Echtenkamp, Karen Echtenkamp, Sally Fisher, Marsha Gaunt, Paula Hanson, David Hassbrook, Bruce Jorgensen, Larry Larson, Mark Lassell, Eric Mantley, Harold Mellick, Sandra Olds, Diane Rauss, Linda Seymour, Steve Simmer, Russell Wax, Virginia Witt and Nancy Wolters.

The qualifying test, a three-hour examination of educational development, is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships, provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and sponsoring corporations, foundations, college, associations, unions, trusts and individuals.

Test scores of students examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship, take the test to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in areas measured by the test.

The highest scorers in each state will be named early next fall. Names of Semifinalists are published in a booklet distributed to colleges and to other sources of financial aid for undergraduates. Names and test scores are sent to first and second choice colleges.

Each Semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance will become Finalists in the Merit program. Winners of Merit Scholarships will be selected from the Finalist group on the basis of school records, recommendations, test scores, extracurricular activities, leadership ability, and accomplishments outside the classroom. Each Finalist is awarded a Certificate of Merit.

The scholarship stipends are based on financial need. The minimum award is \$100 and the maximum is \$1500. Each scholarship constitutes a form of educational insurance, since the stipend may be increased at any time if the student's financial situation changes during the four-year term of the scholarship.

Capitol News

Carpenter Wants Legislature To Determine Road System

LINCOLN State Sen. Terry Carpenter believes there has been a "lack of passing" when it comes to assumption of responsibility for construction of Nebraska roads.

He recently proposed that the legislature take on the job of determining what the state highway system should be. He added he does not believe the State Advisory Highway Commission or the state engineer should tell the legislature how, where and if roads should be constructed.

The commission was established by the 1953 Unicameral to serve in an advisory capacity to the state engineer in establishing broad policies for the State Department of Roads.

There have been bills in recent legislative sessions advocating repeal of the commission law, but the idea has not generated enough support.

Carpenter also said if there is a need for it and the people want it, the tax rate should be increased so that sufficient money would be available to fulfill the people's road-building wishes.

The Scottsbluff lawmaker made his views known at a meeting of the legislative committee on road classifications.

Several Federal Bureau of Roads officials suggested to the committee that a comprehensive systems classification study be made.

Meanwhile, State Sen. Cecil Craft, North Platte, said that the committee, which he heads, is ready to buckle down to work on recommendations to take to the 1965 legislature. The North Platte lawmaker said he doesn't expect the study to recommend that any roads be deleted or added to the system. But he said he expects suggestions to revolve around "more specific and realistic directions" for the highway commission and the state engineer.

He added that he doubted that the final recommendations will suggest "wholesale" additions to the system and that he feels that the state could not afford such a line of action.

In other highway news in recent days, the commission gave unanimous consent to a revision of the formula for dividing interstate highway construction money, 90 per cent of which comes

from the federal government.

For the past several years 77 per cent of such money went for rural work and the remaining 23 per cent for urban construction. Under the revised schedule this will be changed to a 75.3-24.7 per cent division.

State Engineer John Hossack, who proposed the change said it will make an additional \$290,000 available for urban work annually until 1972 — the target date for completion of the superhighway across the state. Actual expenditures to date on the interstate total \$121,323,000.

Air Conditioning

The Capitol Building Commission has a problem. It wants to air condition the statehouse, but doesn't have enough money.

Last week the Lincoln firm of Naitkin and Company submitted a low bid of \$1,149,850 for the job. However, this was \$350,000 more than the commission has for the work.

State Engineer John Hossack, secretary of the building commission, said the firm has indicated it would air condition the statehouse for approximately \$850,000, if several offices were left out. These would include all of those in the northeast part of the second floor, the Supreme Court library, the tower, and the Senate chamber and lounge.

Sen. George Gerdes, Alliance, who attended the meeting as a member of the legislature's budget committee, urged negotiation of a contract that would permit addition of the bypassed offices when the money became available. Said Gerdes: "We have fiddled around with this so long now that I would like to see it done."

Boxcar Problems

The five members of Nebraska's congressional delegation have received an idea from Joseph Brown, State Railway Commission chairman, aimed at easing the recurrent railroad boxcar shortages.

Brown believes the time has come for something to be done and that "the only way it can be solved or even eased is through congressional action."

One thing Brown would do is raise per diem costs charged railroads for using cars belonging to other lines. This, Brown said,

might go a long way toward forcing railroads to build their own cars and help alleviate a national shortage.

He said per diem costs are now about \$5 a day, meaning that it is cheaper for railroads generally to borrow cars "rather than build their own."

Brown said the boxcar shortage is entirely the fault of railroads. Other factors are poor shipping facilities and movement of government stored grain at harvest time, he said.

He suggested that the federal government could make a contribution to easing the shortage by leasing grain in place until the middle of winter, thus releasing many cars at harvest time.

"Joe College"

Nebraska's governor, along with Iowa's will share the role of "Joe College" at Grinnell College, this Thursday and Friday.

Their wives will be "bookies" on campus.

During their two-day stint as collegians, the governors will attend classes, live in student residence halls and participate in extracurricular activities. Both governors were slated to don sweat-shirts and work out with the varsity basketball team.

The governors will be "politicians in residence." They won't be called upon for any formal speeches, but instead will attend classes and join student discussion groups.

Fully Mechanized

The 67th Infantry Brigade of the Nebraska National Guard, was scheduled to become fully mechanized Mar. 1.

Maj. Gen. Lyle Welch said the mechanization was part of the Guard's overall re-organization plan announced last spring. He said mechanization of the 67th Brigade will not affect other organizations and units of the Guard.

N.E. Extension Notes

Sewing Machine "Clean-Up"

Now is the time to give your sewing machine a good clean-up so it will be ready for spring sewing. Your sewing machine will work best if all moving parts are kept free of dust and lint.

To give your machine a clean-up first remove the spool of thread and the bobbin. Then remove the presser foot, the needle and throat plate. On some machines the face plate can be taken off; on other machines it swings open. Many moving parts of the machine are now exposed. Use a small paint brush to thoroughly remove all collected lint and dust from moving parts of the machine. Carefully remove lint which might be collected in the jagged surface of the feed dog.

Before reassembling the machine oil the moving parts. Only a drop of oil at each point is necessary. Use oil manufactured especially for sewing machines, as heavier weight oils have a tendency to "gum-up" and impair working mechanisms. Your instruction book will show other points where oil should be applied. Run the machine for a short time. Then wipe off any excessive oil. Reassemble the machine making certain all parts are attached correctly and securely. Thread the machine and stitch on scraps of fabric to test stitch and to absorb excess oil which might be on the needle or feed dog.

It is much better to oil your sewing machine frequently with small amounts of oil than to oil it occasionally with excessive amounts of oil. A machine should be oiled after each six to eight hours of sewing. Lint and dust should be removed often depending on the type of fabrics being sewn. Lint

collected last when stitching fabrics such as flannel and wool-cloth.

A sewing machine in good operating condition will add pleasure to your sewing activities.

Unusual Cottons for Spring Sewing Home sewers often complain that it's difficult to find unusual cottons with interesting textures and designs. The most unusual fabrics are sometimes found in the most unusual places such as home furnishings departments and interior decorating shops. When selecting fabrics you must keep in mind the purpose for which they will be used. Decorative cottons are sometimes less pliable and require more skill in handling than regular piece goods.

Many 4-H Projects Available

Contrary to what may have been true in the past, 4-H club work is not confined to rural areas today. In fact, youth in towns and cities are becoming increasingly interested in this activity.

Youth in rural and urban areas of the state, can select from 98 different projects. The most popular projects are in foods, clothing and livestock.

Another group of projects comes under the heading of home living which has to do with house furnishings and home management. Members enrolled in these projects not only fix up their own rooms, but improve other areas of their homes including storage and business centers. Many counties hold tours before and after members make home improvements.

Other projects which are especially fine for boys and girls who live in town are photography, automotive care, baby-sitting and dollars and sense which is a money management project. Every 4-H member should enroll in "Dollars and Sense" to learn to handle money wisely. Garden, canning and freezing also are popular. There also is a project in dog management.

A project which is not new, but has more than doubled in enrollment during the past seven years is the riding horse project. Other projects include crops, electrification, poultry, bird, rabbit, tractor, rope and entomology.

Four-H members are urged to go beyond the specific goals in each project to learn not only the how and why but also the scientific principles involved. Four-H projects then become a means for obtaining a basic education in many fields, which will help members select a career.

Nebraska Tractor Fatalities Increasing If the annual number of tractor-caused deaths continue to rise in Nebraska, they will soon be on a scale comparable to traffic deaths, according to Rollin Schneider, University of Nebraska Extension farm safety specialist.

Through October, 1963, he says, 45 Nebraskans died in tractor accidents and another 16 were killed when their tractors were involved in crashes on public roads. Through November, 1963, he added, there were 160 collisions between tractors and cars on the public roads.

The main cause of farm tractor accidents, Schneider said, are probably carelessness and using a tractor in a way for which it was not designed, in that order of importance.

He estimated that only in about 10 per cent of farm accidents the tractor was doing the job for which it was designed.

Improper uses of tractors, he said, included drag racing, getting caught, and simply driving around. Contrary to popular belief, Schneider said, the young age group does not account for the most tractor deaths. Most of them are in the age range from 45 up.
