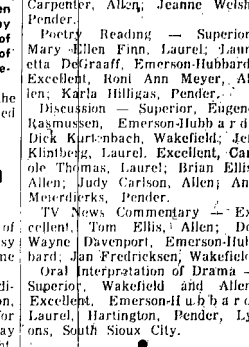
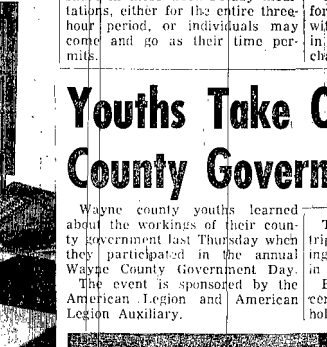

verity of London, developed a keen interest in the Dark Continent while stationed in South Africa with the British Royal Navy during World War II. Inspired with the idea of going back there to "do a job" after completing his college career, he obtained an appointment at the Kamassi College of Technology (now Kwame Ninsin University), teaching economics. He remained there five years. In 1957 his research opportunities in problems of slowly independent, underdeveloped nations, were enhanced when he accepted a teaching position at the University of Ghana, in Accra—a magnificent place, impressive in its buildings as in its concepts, planning, and ideals.

He remained there working for a time as Ford Foundation Research Fellow until his resignation in 1962, when political events disrupted the academic scene. Dr. Garlick came to Wayne State last year from an economics post at the University of New England, New South Wales, Australia.

His brother, Antony, has been on the Wayne State music faculty since 1960.
