



### Kerr-Mills Difficulties

President of the Nebraska State Medical Association says some difficulties have cropped up in connection with the state's Kerr-Mills medical care for the needy

wills medical care for the needy aged program. Dr. R. F. Sievers, Blair, said the problem is that the federal government still has not approved the program, even though it was sent to Washington early last December.

The program cannot be implemented until federal approval has been received. It had been scheduled to go into effect Jan. I and is designed to give assistance to those more than 65 years of age who are able to meet their basic needs but do not have the means for extensive medical care cogts.

basic needs but do not have the means for extensive medical care costs.

The program gets 44.9-per cent of jits financing from the state and the balance from federal funds and is administered by the Welfare Department.

Dr. Seivers said if the federal approval is received by Apr. p. eligible persons who were given care or applied for henefits in January will be covered. But if the approval is not received until May 1, January applicants will not be covered. Each idelay, the doctor explained, will mean that "some of our needy aged are not receiving the benefits to which they are entitled and which is provided by this legislation." Seventy-one applications for aid were filled in January and this number is expected to grow considerably in the months ahead.

Dr. Sievers said the Welfare Department made some revisions in the plan in an effort to comply with requests from the federal government and that he could not understand what was causing the delay. He said a Kerr-Mills program in South Dakota was held up one year because of the similar circumstances.

The Nebraska Kerr-Mills law was passed by the 1863 Legislature.



Protein Content

For most Nebraska farmers, net feeding profits are very narrow today. This means that livestock feeders must work harder than ever to reduce their cost of producing a pound of meat.

Reports from the field and University outstate testing plots show a wide variation in protein content of grain and forages grown in Nebraska.


The effect of varying protein content of grain in feed value may be as great as \$6.40 per ton or 20 cents per bushel when the protein level ranges from five to 11 per cent. These figures are based on \$80 per ton soybean meal.)) Such differences could greatly influence feed efficiency and profits.

Other ingredients, and rough-agg also vary in protein content.

This emphasizes the limportance of determining the quality of all major ingredients used in formulating farm ratibus, rather than relying on average analysis for protein.


