Wayne Resident's Family Escapes Earthquake Injury

Mrs. Willer Hall, who had been trying to get word of the safety of her daughter and family in Anchorage, Alaska, since the earthquake Friday, was reassured Tuesday when she received a tape record of a message from them. Mr. and Mrs. Russell Johnson, Gayle, 12, and David, 9, reside in a new home in Anchorage. Johnson has been employed by Standard Oil Co. in Alaska since 1947.

Their first concern was for their children. David soon came into the house and told his parents he and a playmate had flung themselves to the ground as they were unable to stand. It was about midnight before Gayle could be located, safe but scared. The neighbors had taken her to another home following the quake.

Mrs. Johnson said every dish in the cupboard was broken. Packages fell from shelves spilling their contents on the floor. The Johnsons praised the action of the Military and Civil Defense workers. In Mrs. Johnson's words, "A disaster like this kind of takes ordinary people by surprise, but the Military is always ready."

Shortly after the tremor stopped, Johnson went to his company's storage tank area and found huge tanks of oil and gas spilling their contents on the ground. He remarked that one of the worries now is a shortage of gas and fuel oil. The docks at Anchorage were damaged and supplies won't get in for at least five days, so fuel oil, etc., is rationed.

The Johnsons consider themselves lucky indeed when they survey the damage around them. Johnson's brother, who is a brakeman for the railroad in Anchorage, was reported safe. More lives might have been lost except for the fact that school children were home because of Good Friday, and offices were closed for the day. The Johnsons mentioned a new hospital being constructed and said it was now reduced to a pile of rubble. A schoolhouse on "Government Hill" was split in half, and one half slid down the hill.

The Johnsons were awed at the damage around them, but through their account of the ordeal, they kept saying, "We were really lucky."

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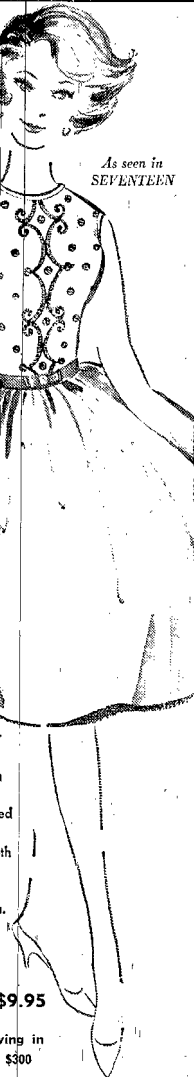

Interest in Native

Grasses on Increase

According to Arnold Marr, Soil Conservation Service, there has been considerable interest in the planting of native warm season grasses this year. The Nebraska Centennial Commission has urged all counties to encourage the seedings of native grasses. The Commission states that in the farmstead areas of the state, there is a definite need to improve the pasture program. Many of these pastures are small and severely overgrazed. A program of pasture seeding and proper use would contribute immeasurably to the farm income on the farm units. Marr stated that there has always been a market for good grass.

Marr said Wayne County farmers who are planning to plant some native warm season grasses are: Paul Everingham, William Hanson, Lloyd Morris, Leo Jordan, Warner Janke, Robert Erwin and Ed Chauwe.

Marr wishes to remind cooperators who are planning windbreaks this spring to prepare the ground as soon as possible. About 50 farmers are establishing new windbreaks or planting evergreens on the north and west of their existing trees.

The first conservation job this spring was completed on Roy Day's farm, according to Marr. Twenty-two hundred feet of tile drains were installed to provide drainage in a wet area. Terraces are being constructed on the farms of W. C. Shulthes and Robert Hansen.

Marr noted that there has been a high demand for terraces this spring. Terracing is one of the best practices we know of to conserve much needed water for crop production.

Coordinating Group Needed For Colleges - Universities

LINCOLN — Sen. Marvin E. Stromer, chairman of the Nebraska Council on Higher Education, believes Nebraska educators generally favor some type of coordinating body for various colleges and universities in the state.

Stromer and six members of his committee recently spent a day at the University of Missouri campus and also visited Omaha's Lincoln University.

The Lincoln lawmaker says the feeling for a coordinating body stems from the conviction that the state's higher education money should be used to the best advantage.

Stromer said his committee will have further contact with University of Missouri officials.

At the first meeting, Dr. Elmer Ellis, Missouri president, outlined his state's coordinated plan for higher education. Ellis is responsible for the operation of colleges at Columbia, Kansas City, Rolla and St. Louis.

Stromer said Nebraska has just begun feeling the "student explosion" which has found more and more young men and women seeking admission to the state's institutions of higher learning.

Not Seriously Behind
State Engineer John Hossack says Nebraska is not lagging seriously in its obligation of Interstate highway funds, as was alleged recently by Congressman Cunningham, Omaha.

Hossack told the State Advisory Highway Commission at its last meeting that "we are the closest to having the money spent than ever before."

Cunningham said Nebraska has obligated 33 per cent of its 1964 Interstate funds. The national average, according to Cunningham, shows all 1964 funds and two per cent of the 1965 money

have been obligated by the various states.

Hossack replied that all of Nebraska's funds for 1964 have been obligated, except for those needed for building an eight-lane Omaha-Council Bluffs Interstate bridge. The state engineer noted that Cunningham's figures for the nation were based on figures from only half of the 50 states.

Hossack's comments came after Governor Morrison appeared before the commission to find out if Cunningham's figures were correct and also to determine if Nebraska was lagging in construction of the super-highway. Hossack assured the governor that Nebraska is progressing on the giant project as rapidly as possible.

Wants Notice
State Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, recently requested the Douglas County Board of Equalization to let him know 10 days in advance of the hearing on Ak-Sar-Ben's tax-exempt status.

Carpenter made the request in his capacity as chairman of the Legislative Council tax subcommittee which has been assigned the task of studying tax-exempt Nebraska organizations.

The Scottsbluff senator said the subcommittee wants to sit in on the hearing as observers and also to make tape recordings of the hearing proceedings. Carpenter said his subcommittee will have no further interest in the Ak-Sar-Ben matter if the board follows Douglas County Assessor Joe Stolinski's recommendation that some of the organization's property should be placed on the tax rolls for the first time. If the board follows Stolinski's lead, Ak-Sar-Ben's tax status will be up to the Supreme Court, Carpenter said.

If the board reverses Stolinski's decision, Carpenter said, "then we will be interested in the reasoning behind the decision."

Television Tower
The Federal Aviation Agency has approved the Mead tower location and height as the first station in the state's educational television (ETV) network.

A spokesman for the Nebraska

ETV Commission said the federal agency's approval was received by the University of Nebraska. The FAA approval order, according to the spokesman, permits a tower 889 feet above ground level. The FAA reportedly approved the site and location after a thorough study.

The State Aeronautics Commission has questioned the proposed location and height believing that it might interfere with commercial and private aviation flights.

Governor Morrison and the ETV Commission then asked the FAA to make a study of the proposal.

It is planned to move ETV Channel 12 from the University of Nebraska in Lincoln to the Mead area. The cost of the tower and transmitter has been estimated at \$425,000.

Eventually, the state would have a seven-station ETV network, if present plans are fully implemented.

Application Ready
George Morris, director of state institutions, has prepared an application for \$210,000 in federal money to help underwrite cost of a proposed \$1.2 million medical and research structure at the Beatrice State Home.

He plans to submit application if the federal government approve a program to aid construction of facilities for mentally retarded. Current indications are that the money would be channeled through the federal Hill-Burton hospital construction program. The program would be administered through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Now comes Cacophonous Cassius to build up another myth. Not under the name of Cassius Clay, but rather under the sobriquet of "Muhammad Ali, the Black Muslim." A name that will go down in the annals of boxing as that of a boxer, who was winder than a barber's cat and could very well be likened to the description of the Platte River "very wide at the mouth and very shallow." Not only a windy boxer, but one so dumb (or so foxy) that he couldn't pass the army's mental test, but just smart enough to stay home and make a million, while some other real guys are being sent to Viet Nam.

Population Increase
At the present rate of increase, our population will be near 250 million by 1975. This will require about 50 per cent more food than our farmers are now supplying.

Another factor which will have an important bearing on food production is the rapid rate at which farms and farmers are being eliminated.

We are losing farm land to homes, highways and industries at the rate of 2000 acres per day.

Produce a ton of food per farm worker and per acre of land must be greatly expanded if future demands for food are to be met.

Moisture Supply
There are some things a farmer can do to reduce losses from moisture shortage.

1. A reduction in planting rates.
2. Use minimum cultivation to control weeds.
3. Adjust fertilizer rates to match anticipated needs.
4. Sow grain in more drought resistant than corn.
5. Sudan grass will provide for more midsummer grazing than perennial grasses.

"Keeping Up"
An individual's action is largely governed by his experiences. Young people today are growing up in a different world than that of some 50 years ago.

It is difficult to realize that of approximately 190 million people in the US today, more than one half do not remember the depression or drought of the 1930's or even World War II. Nearly one fourth of our population were born after the Korean War (25 million in the past 10 years). Fifteen million new households have been created by marriages in the last 10 years.

Climate for Progress
We cannot do much to change the climate and the way it affects crops, livestock and people. The climate determines what kind of crops we grow and how they grow them. It also determines the kind of livestock we raise and what shelter must be provided. It even determines the kind of houses we live in and what kind of clothes we wear. These are the areas in which nature pretty largely rules.

But we can do a lot about the climate in which people rule. This is the area of progress, leadership and citizenship. By what we do or neglect to do, we contribute our influence to this climate. This is not only true in politics but in all the things that people do together.

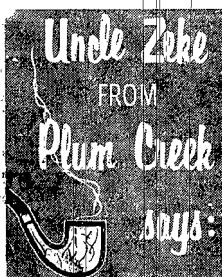

Preventive measures include eating well-balanced meals; getting plenty of rest and exercise; avoiding fatigue, getting chilled, and getting wet feet; staying away from crowds and from people who are sneezing or coughing; using only a personal towel and drinking glass; and washing the hands before handling food.

When a cold first develops, go to bed and drink plenty of liquids such as fruit juices, water, soups and milk. By remaining comfortably in bed, one may avoid drafts and sudden changes of temperature as well as spreading germs to others.

Among other old-fashioned practices still approved is gargling with hot salt water to alleviate the pain of a sore throat. Some other diseases start out with a cold. For that reason it is wise to be safe in bed with an optimum chance for quick recovery.

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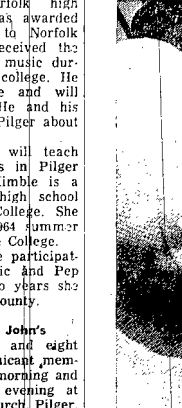

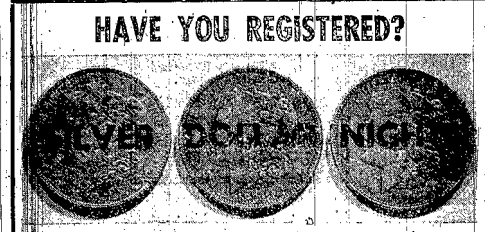

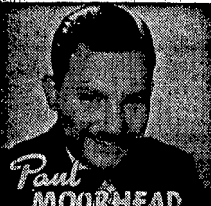
