Traffic Deathes
During March the state recorded 34 traffic deaths—a record high for that month. The total was three more than during the same month in 1956, the previous high, and was up sharply from the 19 registered in March of last year.

Col. Dan Casey, chief of the Nobraska Safety Patrol, attributed the higher toll to general traffic increases and the "open winter." He said Nebraska's traffic deaths were in line with a national pattern.

Eleven of the fatalities resulted from one-car accidents, nine from two-car mishaps, seven from radicad crossing accidents, and six involved preservings, one for more of the fatalities.

Eighteen of the deaths occurred on state highways, eight on county roads, and six on city streets. Daytime accidents accounted for 18 of the fatalities.


