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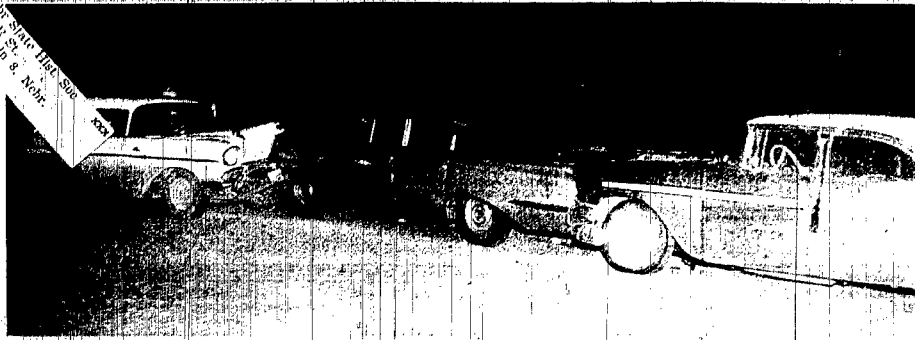

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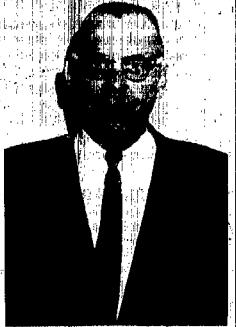

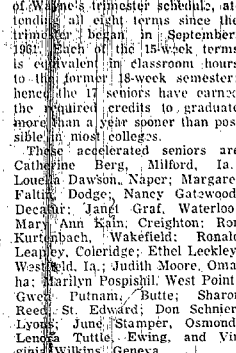

Wayne Community Betterment committee members are busy organizing groups to begin projects for the statewide Community Betterment contest. Plans are being made to coordinate the theme of red and white petunias as decoration for Main street business establishments, as well as residential areas.

Current pastor, the Reverend S. K. de Fries, has served since 1942; had high praise for the long and dedicated service of many congregational members and pointed out as an example that of Mrs. Martin Ringer who was organist for 38 years.

The church council in this 75th anniversary year has as one of its members, the grandson of one of the first communicants. In 1829 William Koster, a charter member, was elected trustee.

William Koster, grandson of Trustee Koster, is secretary of the current council. Other council members are Pastor S. K. de Fries, President Marvin Dunklan, Veronnie Nelson, Harold Galt, Earl Sawyer, Richard Carlisle, Lyda Sawinow, Howard Fleck and Oscar Dunn.

Fred Dillinger is church treasurer and Emil Valikamp is benevolence secretary.

The first meeting of Redeemer Lutheran Church was held in January, 1829, in the former August Piepenstock store in Wayne.

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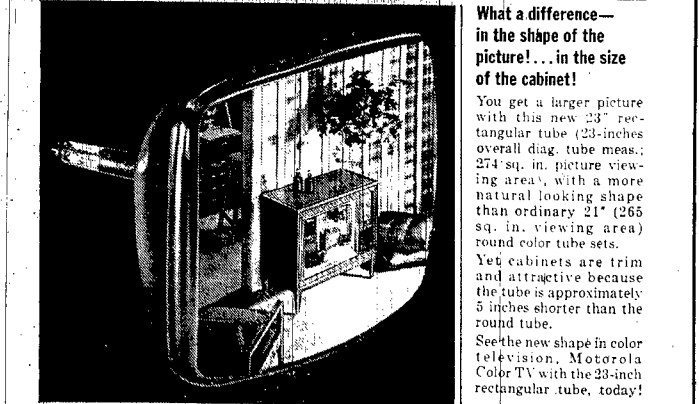
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Out-of-Towner Has Praise For Wayne's Hospitality

September 3, 1899, it was decided to build a larger church to meet the growing needs of the congregation. In 1902 a garage was erected east of the church at 47 West First street.

In January of 1921, the church suffered extensive fire damage. It was immediately restored.
In 1945, the congregation had again outgrown its facilities and a new site at Fifth and Lincoln Streets was obtained. Here the present edifice was erected.

Ground breaking for this new church building took place June 2, 1946. In 1958, the Parish Unit was added and in 1964 the Parsonage.
The present pastor, Reverend S. K. deFreese comes from a family of Lutheran ministers. His father, the late Reverend S. deFreese was pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Omaha and pastor of the Redeemer Lutheran Church of Omaha for 18 years, and a brother is currently pastor of Kountz Memorial Lutheran Church, also in Omaha, Nebraska.

Stress Cattle and Hog Research at Experiment Farm

The Board of Directors of the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station has pledged financial support by the Association of the University of Nebraska's beef cattle research at the Station.
The action, conditioned on acceptance by the University Board of Regents, came at the Station group's annual meeting at Concord Saturday. The directors also went on record as endorsing the initiation of swine research at the Northeast Station.

The status of such proposed research was discussed by Dr. A. Dale Flowerday.

Dr. Flowerday, who has served as Station superintendent since 1956, has been appointed University Extension agronomist in charge of outstate testing, officing at the Department of Agronomy in Lincoln, subject to approval by the Board of Regents Wednesday (April 15).

Northeast Station staff changes, also subject to Regents' approval, include the appointment of E. J. Alexander as area agronomist (soils), and of Donal Clegg receiving the added responsibility of being Station superintendent in addition to Area Extension supervisory duties.

Alexander reported to the directors on soil and crop research work underway and completed at the Station, and Dr. Walter Woods, University livestock researcher, discussed the value research program. Walt Tolman, Station animal husbandman, discussed the livestock research program.

The annual election of officers resulted in Honor Ochsner of Madison being named as president of the board, with Harold Clegg of Pilger, first vice president; Claus Midlberg, Pentler second vice president; John Kruger, Jr., Rosalia, treasurer; and Dr. Clegg, secretary.

Wayne State posted a third place Saturday in the 16th South Dakota Invitational track and field meet, and several Wildcats set personal records.

Host SDUJ won with 57 points, followed by Frankton, 49, and Wayne with 31 1/2. Other colleges scoring: Northern State, 20; Yankton, 19; St. Cloud, 18; Westminster, 16; Morningside, 11; Augustana, 8; Buena Vista, 5; Southern State, 4.

Ideal weather (sunny, temperature in the 70's, little wind) and tough competition inspired 11 records in the collage and high school divisions.

While Wayne performers claimed one of the meet records and no first places, they earned five seconds and seven other places.

Carl Oczwarzak ran the fastest mile and two-mile races of his career, finishing second in both. His mile time: 4:29.6, close behind the winner's 4:26.2. Carl's two-mile effort of 9:58.2 helped push Dave Peterson of USD to a meet record 9:40.7, bettering the 9:50.8 mark set by Wayne's Morley McGee five years ago.

Darrell Reifenrath clipped off a 2.9 century dash for a second place, one-tenth behind the winner. It was Reifenrath's second straight 9.9 clocking in a week. Later he ran third in the 220.

Bob Duranski sailed over 12.6 in the pole vault, earning second. This was the same height that the winner cleared, but Duranski used more attempts to make it.

Ron Buell ran a 50.8 quarter mile — his best yet — in placing third, and Bob Pustione posted his best mile, 4:32.7, as he finished in a tie for fifth.

Ed Humpal, off his usual form, placed fifth in the shot put. His discus effort of 138.7 ranked with the best by a Wayne thrower in years, still earned only fifth.

Jerry Poulson hurled the javelin 161.7, good for fifth place. Coach Carl Ellermeier termed this a fine effort for a freshman.

WSC Meets Hastings Nine Here Saturday

Wayne State entertains the Hastings baseball team here Saturday afternoon, hoping to keep the Wildcat record unblemished in conference play.

The first game is billed for 1 p.m. — on the college diamond if it is ready for play; otherwise on the city ball park.

Wayne dumped Peru twice last Saturday, 4-1 and 4-1, duplicating a double win over the Bobcats last year. Now the goal is to improve on the 1963 performance, which resulted in splits with all other NCC opponents.

The opener with Peru, played on the Wayne city diamond, was a frustrating experience for five innings. The Wildcats managed three hits but no runs while Peru scored once on three hits.

In the nightcap, Wayne took a two-run lead in the second on a pair of doubles and a single, added a run in the third on a couple of errors and a fielder's choice, then padded the lead with another run in the third on three singles.

Peru tallied its lone run in the second when a Wayne error followed two singles.

Dean deBuhr, making his first appearance in five games after an ankle sprain the previous week, survived a blow on the head by a pitched ball in the sixth inning though knocked out briefly, he stayed in the game and fanned three batters in the last two innings — totalling 10 strikeouts. He allowed only three hits, all in the second inning.

Wayne touched two Peru hurlers for seven saves.

The twin win followed a pair of losses to Morningside Friday at Sioux City, 3-1 and 3-2.

Wayne hit four times against Morningside pitcher Roger Van Bergen, but scored only once, in the seventh, when Ron Sadler doubled and a sacrifice fly by Mike Pallesen sent him home.

Roger Gump pitched the route for Wayne, giving up six hits.

In the second game, Ron Anderson's triple and John Beck's single sent Wayne into a third-inning lead. The Chiefs tied the count in the fourth, but Ken Hutchinson put Wayne ahead in the fifth with a single, followed by Anderson's single and a Morningside error.

That ended Wayne's scoring, but the hosts marked the scoreboard twice more against Larry Faust, who had relieved Hutchinson in the fifth.



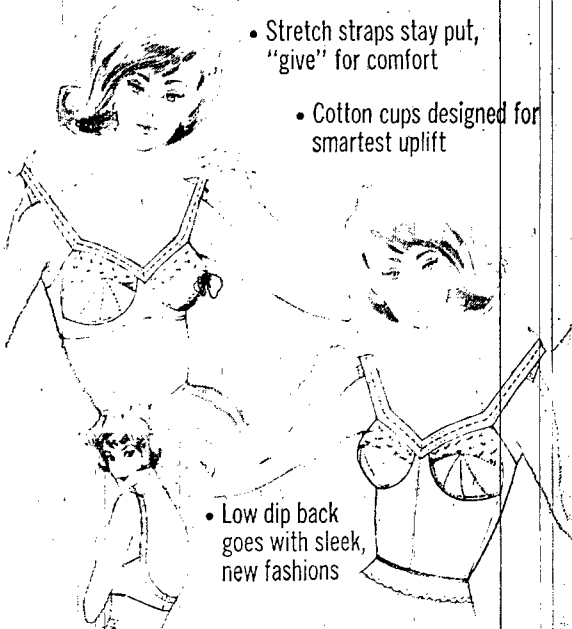

Capitol News

Merle Humphries Will Be Co. Agent's Treasurer Until November

LINCOLN — Nebraska has a new state treasurer — Merle Humphries, Lincoln, a long-time state employee.

Those elected in the November balloting apparently do not begin their new duties until the following January. Humphries, a native of Williamstown, Kan., has been a top assistant in State Auditor Roy C. Morrison since 1959.

The appointment by Morrison was the first by him to fill a vacancy in a constitutional office since he became governor three years ago. There had been considerable speculation Morrison would name Byron Dunn, retired Lincoln banker.

No Stand Taken

The State Board of Education for the third month in a row declined to take an official stand on a proposal to modify the Duals Amendment to the constitution.

A special three-member study committee which had not reached any final decisions on the question of the board on any tax-broadening proposal. The committee was formed a month earlier to "sound out" school groups on the issue.

Frank Heinisch, Omaha, a member of the board, proposed in February that the board take a stand on modifying the amendment and presented his plan at a March meeting. The amendment provides that the state must get out of the property tax field if Nebraska ever turns to a sales and/or income tax as a revenue source.

Heinisch has been attempting to work up enthusiasm to change the amendment to the extent that money received from this broadening would be used to help a part of the local school districts property tax cuts. He maintains that until provision is made for local school districts, the Legislature will remain split on any tax-broadening issue.

Power Savings

George Morris, state director of institutions, says his department will have \$50,000 this year through purchase of low-cost power from the US Bureau of Reclamation.

Previously the department bought power from the Consumers Public Power District which is wheeling the bureau power over its transmission lines for use at the institutions.

Morris said applications have also been made for bureau power at a number of other institutions.

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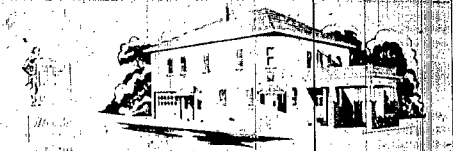
