Anyone not willing to follow the instructions on the label should not use insecticides.

All insecticides, including the organic phosphales, are potentially dangerous.

The key to safe use is not to breather the dust or fumes, nor to get granules or dusts on the body, and not to eat the material in any manner.

By law, all insecticide containers must be labeled. The label must list complete information, including active ingredients, how to use it safely, and what to do in ease of accidental poisoning.

After a package is empty, it must be destroyed so there is absolutely no danger to children or pets. This means that bags must be burned, not hung on a fence post. Cans and bottles must be punctured or broken, and burted where no one will dig them up again.
