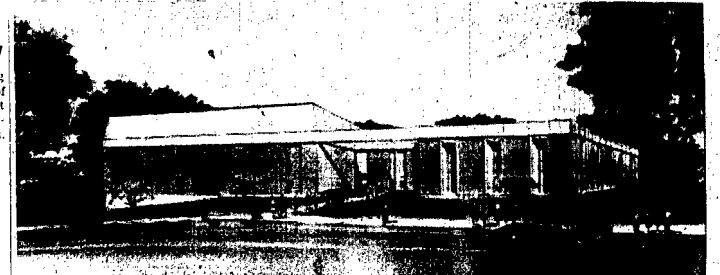

Speech Clinic Set For Month of July

Children with speech handicaps will have opportunity again this summer to receive therapy in the Wayne State Remedial Speech Clinic, July 1-31.

Selection of the children, from ages 6 to 18, is scheduled May 25, 26, 27, from 9 a.m. to noon. Parents should write the clinic director, Dr. Helen Russell, to arrange a time for testing on one of those days.

She will choose children most likely to benefit by the clinic's therapy. Most of the children will attend the clinic five days a week; some fewer.

In conjunction with the clinic, the college's summer curriculum offers a remedial speech observation clinic for upper-division students, who watch techniques used on the children.

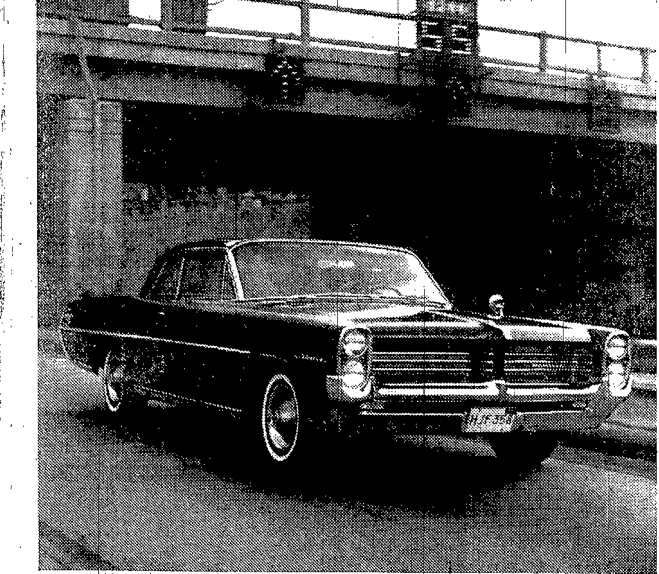

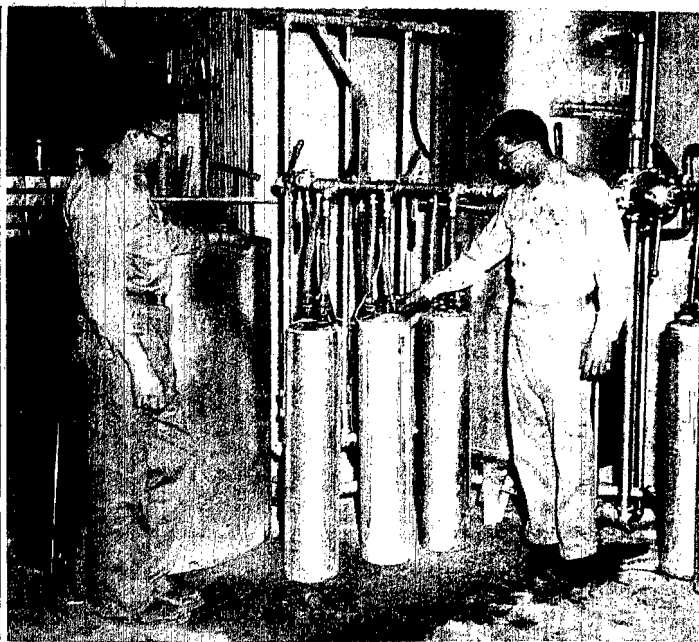

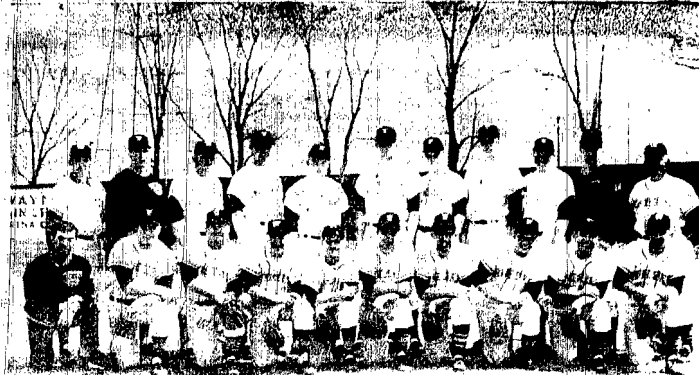

NEBRASKA COLLEGE CONFERENCE BASEBALL CHAMPS

'Cat Nine Wins Conference Title; Split in NAIA Play

Champions of Nebraska College Conference baseball—that's the distinction Wayne State's Wildcats carried Tuesday.

It is the fourth title including one for first, Wayne has won in six years of baseball.

The championship came when the Cats edged Chadron State, 2-1, in the first of two games at Bassett. They lost the nightcap, 13-6, but it didn't matter in the championship decision.

Wayne finished at 6-2 in NCC play, Kearney second with 5-3. For the season, Wayne compiled a 10-7 mark, of which Coach John Jeremic remarked Wednesday, "The team was better than that record looks."

Two of the losses were against Morningside, the host of the North Central Conference; another pair

of losses to Omaha, possibly Nebraska's No. 1 team.

Victory in the conference came after the Wildcats had fought a four-game grind in the NAIA Area 3 playoff at Omaha's Municipal Stadium Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Although they did not win the playoff, they extended Omaha to the limit twice before bowing out.

Wayne opened with a 7-3 thump to Washburn, seeded No. 2, then fell to the Omaha Indians, who were forced to come from behind for a 7-6 decision.

The Wildcats faced Washburn again in the third game and emerged 12-5 victors. That put Wayne up against top-seeded Omaha again, and it was a repeat of the first encounter—Omaha forced to overcome a Wayne lead for another one-run win, 5-4. An inside-the-park homer by Indian Rich Vacek with one on proved the winning margin.

Ken Hutchison hurled the first

win over Washburn—his first decision this year. Keith Krummenbeck started the first game against Omaha and was ahead when Roger Ginapp took the mound in the eighth. Then came Omaha's winning thrust, and Ginapp was the loser.

He came back next day with a win over Washburn. DeBuhr started against Omaha in the Friday nightcap and had held the Indians to one hit when rain washed out the game after 3½ innings.

DeBuhr started again in the replay Saturday night. He allowed five hits in a nine-inning stint while his mates were piling 10 hits. The Indian hits, however, yielded one more run, and DeBuhr took the loss.

Jeremic understandably prejudiced, had nothing but praise for his team in the NAIA playoff. But other sources, especially the Omaha players, added accolades for the Wayne performance. The Omahans rated Wayne their toughest 1964 opposition.

New York Mets Scout Joe Merritt called the first Wayne-Omaha game "the best I have seen this year." He also termed it a classic of strategy by pitch standards.

The Wayne win over Chadron may not have looked so nifty but it counted nevertheless. The winning Wildcat run by Ron Anderson happened this way: Andy stayed alive at first and reached second on an error, stole third, then raced home thanks to an error at third. Krummenbeck pitched the full game for his fifth win without a loss—climaxing a stellar college career.

The 13-6 nightcap was a madcap session of extra-base hits. Chadron enjoyed a nine-hit, 10-run fourth inning. Wayne retaliated in the fifth with four runs on Anderson's triple and a Bob Gaeta homer.

Starter Hutchison had been relieved in the fourth by Ginapp, who stayed one-third inning. Larry Faust replaced Ginapp in the fifth. De Buhr pinch hit for Faust in the bottom of the fifth and stayed in the game at first base, while Larry Pierce got his first pitching chance. He allowed one hit.

Dash man Darrell Reiferath of Croton, on the basis of recent performances in the state, could win the 100, perhaps the 220—at least push someone else to a torrid timing. He has run consistently at 9.9 and one at 9.8 all season, generally under adverse conditions.

Ed Humpal of Atkinson, who posted a Wayne shot mark of 56 3/4 last year, has some winning two inches of that mark in spring and ranks as the No. 1 shot cox tender at Hastings. And with a good toss he could place well in the discus since his Wayne record throw of 133-9/2 is among the conference best this year.

Ron Hilger of David City has a 22-2/4 broad jump to his credit, good enough for possible placing in the conference campaign. He might also figure in the triple jump, a new event in NCC competition.

Carl Owezarzak of Wharton, N.J., seems likely to pick up points in the mile if he equals or better his best time of 4:29.6 and in the two-mile (9:58.2).

Ken Buell of Fonda, 11, has bettered the 500 and 800 in 50 and 1:50, both times good enough for some recognition, though slower than Nebraska's best.

Wayne marked up some best of season performances last Thursday in winning a meet with Chadron State and Dakota Wesleyan. The Cats scored 101 points, Chadron 58, Wesleyan 19.

Among the 15 Wayne first places were a 98 century and a 22.1 furlong by Reiterman, a 50.6 quarter and a 1:59 half-mile by Buell, and a 42.3/4 triple jump by Hilger.

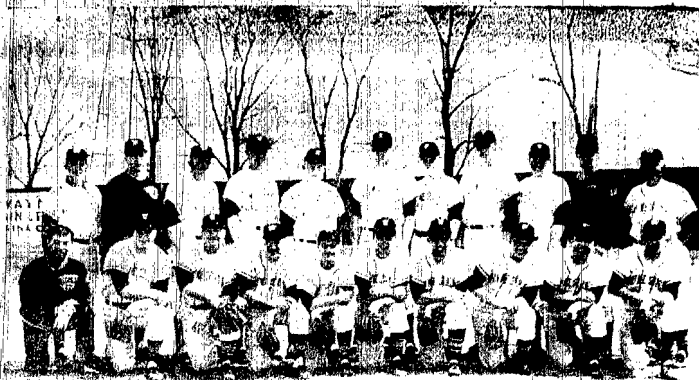

'Cat Nine Wins Conference Title; Split in NAIA Play

Wayne State's Wildcats earned Tuesday. It was the fourth title including one in 1951. Wayne has won in six years of baseball.

The championship came when the Cats edged Chadron State, 2-1, in the first of two games at Bassett. They lost the nightcap, 13-6, but it didn't matter in the championship decision.

Wayne finished at 6-2 in NCC play. Kearney second with 5-3. For the season, Wayne compiled a 10-7 mark—of which Coach John Jermer remarked Wednesday, "The team was better than that record looks."

Among the 15 Wayne first places were a 9.8 century and a 22.1 fur long by Keilenrath, a 50.6 quarter and a 1:59 half-mile by Buell, and a 42:3, triple jump by Higer.

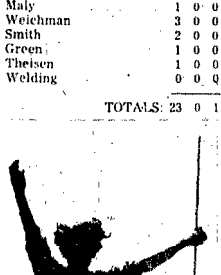

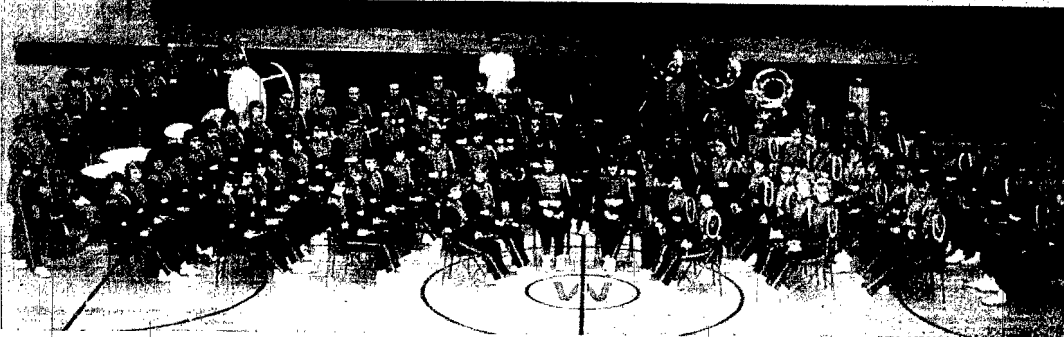

He is not empowered to reverse county board decisions which place tax-free property on the tax rolls. His rulings, however, are appealable to the district courts.

Opinion Requested

The State Justice Department has been requested to give an opinion on the validity of the tax enforcement subcommittee headed by Senator Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff.

The request came from Senator Dale Payne, Papillion, who also wants to know if Carpenter is authorized to subpoena witnesses. Payne said he made the requests of the attorney general's office after checking the resolution in the Unicameral which led to creation of the General Legislative Council Tax Study Committee.

According to Payne, the resolution states that the Legislative Council should appoint a five-member committee to conduct a study of the administration and enforcement of Nebraska's property tax. The Papillion lawmaker said the resolution says nothing about a "three-member committee."

Payne, along with Senator Eric Rasmussen, Fairmont, are members of the subcommittee which was established last year by the tax study committee to handle the enforcement problem. Payne and Rasmussen were outspoken in their criticism recently when Carpenter had a subpoena issued to a Lincoln doctor requesting that he appear before the group June 16. The subpoena calls on the doctor—Dr. P. E. Getzler—to produce his business financial records for the subcommittee. Payne has insisted repeatedly that Carpenter's action was a "shock" to him and came without the Scottsbluff senator consulting with him or Rasmussen.

He said also that under the resolution creating the committee only the subcommittee is authorized to issue subpoenas. The full committee, with Senator Jules Burbach, Crofton, chairman, has nine senators.

Burbach has stated he thought Carpenter was within his rights in having the subpoena issued because he would not find any subcommittee record banning Carpenter from taking the action. To this Payne replied: "There may not be a record in the subcommittee files, but the legislative resolution is in black and white and it must also be considered as a record." He added that Rasmussen views the whole matter as he does. "I don't see where we have a subcommittee any more. We are the majority."
