

Plan Summer Workshops For Wayne Students

The new Nebraska English Curriculum, unique in the nation, will be a major topic of the workshop on improvement of instruction in Secondary English at Wayne State, June 3-10.

This workshop is being taught again this year by Mrs. Mildred Jones, who spent a summer at the University of Nebraska working with the new curriculum under the direction of Dr. Paul Olson and Frank Rice.

Rice is scheduled as a special lecturer for the workshop, as is Mrs. Ruth Anderson of the Norfolk High School faculty.

The Nebraska Curriculum is receiving national acclaim because it is the only curriculum planned sequentially from grades 1 to 12. Literature-centered, it gives students an excellent background in good literature. This is designed for teachers who are directing or will direct college students in practice teaching.

Two other education workshops are scheduled this summer—on the evening in the classroom, K-12, from June 22 to July 10, and aerospace from July 13 to 31.

Summer session registration is set for next Wednesday, June 3.

Orvid J. Owens to Get Dr. Degree at Colorado

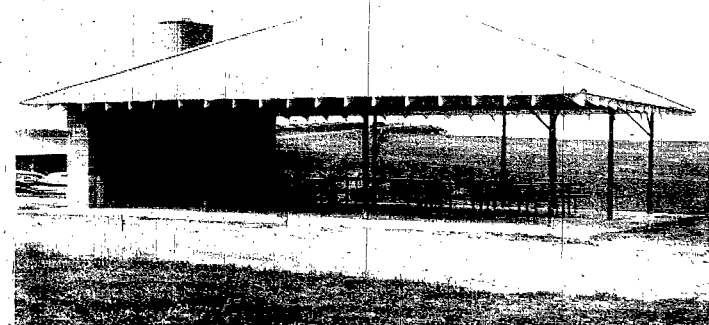
Orvid Jay Owens, associate professor at Wayne State College, will receive his doctorate in business education May 31 at Colorado State College, Greeley, Colo.

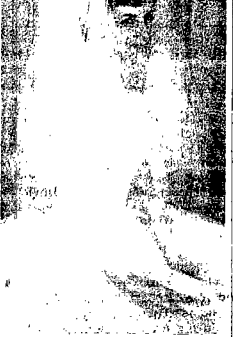

Capitol News

Traffic Safety Officials Ask for More Legislation

LINCOLN — State traffic safety officials will ask the 1965 Legislature to plug a legal loophole which permits persons to drive legally without their eye glasses.

The loophole was disclosed recently by the attorney general's office. It said there is no state law requiring a person to wear eye glasses while driving even though the person had to wear the glasses in order to pass the eye examination given to license applicants.

R. H. G. Eiting, director of the State Department of Motor Vehicles, said his office is working on remedial legislation to offer to the next Legislature. He added that "we do not think this is a major problem, because so few persons drive without their glasses."

State Safety Coordinator Tom Ryan said the law should be strengthened. He said he is not authorized to enforce the wearing of glasses has been discussed often. But he noted the question was never "really determined."

The attorney general's opinion settles the issue, Ryan said.

Eiting emphasized that the state is empowered to withhold a driver's license from a person because of poor eyesight.

The opinion was requested by Roy Butte County, Atty., John O. Anderson, Alliance. He said he asked for it after a state patrolman ticketed a motorist for driving without eye glasses. The county attorney's office was asked to prosecute the case but Anderson searched his law books and could not find where any law had been violated.

A spokesman for the Nebraska Safety Patrol said troopers had a law requiring the wearing of glasses by drivers with poor sight. "The attorney general advised, however, that to qualify for a license an applicant must pass an eye examination, with or without glasses. The law does not state that a person must wear glasses while driving after passing the test."

Arguments Scheduled

Oral arguments have been scheduled for June 3 in the Nebraska Supreme Court in the test suit challenging the validity of the Sunday closing law enacted by the 1963 Legislature.

Donald Wood, Scotts Bluff County attorney, in appealing the case to the high court asked that the law be declared void. Defendant in the action is Terry Carpenter, Inc., a corporation owned by state Sen. Terry Carpenter. He contends the law amounts to class legislation and is therefore contrary to the Nebraska Constitution.

Several months ago, the Scotts Bluff County District Court ruled the act unconstitutional. It said the law discriminates between businesses and persons.

The act also was held invalid by the Lancaster County District Court.

One of the more controversial parts of the law is a "mama-papa" clause permitting stores with only two full-time employees and one part-time worker to remain open seven days a week. Anderson also notes that those who conscientiously observe Saturday as their day of rest to remain open on Sundays, if they close on Saturdays.

The law permits the selling of approximately 70 items on Sunday.

New Commissioner

For the first time in the 29-year history of the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission, a woman has been named commissioner.

She is Mrs. Alma Stephens, 50, McCook, who was named by the governor to serve out the unexpired term of Vernon O. Taylor, St. Paul, who resigned.

The other two commissioners are Francis Robinson, Ashland, and Ray Osborn, Lincoln. Robinson and Mrs. Stephens are Democrats and Osborn is a Republican.

Hire Coordinator

The State Health Board has authorized the hiring of a chronic illness coordinator who will operate within the State Health Department.

He will oversee all recreational, nutritional and occupational therapy activities in Nebraska. He will also administer an educational program.

Verne Pangborn, hospital division director in the State Health Department, said the coordinator is "vitally needed."

Federal chronic illness funds will be used to pay the coordinator's salary. Pangborn said he would start immediately screening applicants for the new position and added that he hopes to hire the coordinator by July 1.

Boundary Talk

Gov. Harold E. Hughes, Iowa, believes the key to economic growth in Iowa's western counties is settlement of the Iowa-Nebraska boundary dispute.

He recently told a group of Iowa Democrats that the boundary should be established in the middle of the Missouri River, which would entail shifting of Carter Lake, Ia., to Nebraska.

The Iowa governor said western Iowa communities have done a commendable job of stimulating economic growth but that eastern Iowa "has developed much more rapidly." One of the primary reasons for this, Hughes said, has been economical transportation afforded by the Mississippi River. He said completion of a six-foot channel on the Missouri "opens up the river to navigation by large commercial barges and this should be a tremendous stimulus to business and industrial development."

A channel shift years ago left the little community of Carter Lake on the Nebraska side of the river. And Carter Lake residents have fought attempts to have the town ceded to Nebraska.

Hughes, Nebraska Gov. Frank Morrison, and the boundary commissions of both states have recommended that Carter Lake be given to Nebraska and that thousands of acres of Nebraska land on the eastern side of the stream should go to Iowa.

Negotiations Begin

University of Nebraska and federal representatives have begun negotiations for a new dental college building.

The total project, according to Vice Chancellor Roy Holly, would exceed \$4 million in cost.

A federal team checked the university's proposed dental college program last week. The team's recommendations on the general principles involved in the project will go to an advisory council. More negotiations on program and faculty details should come after that, Holly said.

The last legislature authorized about \$1.7 million in state tax funds for a new dental college. If matching federal money could be obtained, legislation providing the federal funds has cleared the House and is awaiting action in the Senate.

The university currently restricts the number of students in dental classes to 33. It is

Praise for Unicameral

"It's the only system that I know that would work in my country," he said. "We can't afford to have two houses."

"Hail Damage Likely"

Hail results in a crop loss measured in millions of dollars annually in Nebraska. Intensity and frequency of hail decreases from west to east across Nebraska. Premiums for corn vary from \$24.00 in Western Nebraska to slightly under \$3.00 per \$100.00 of coverage in the extreme east.

A short course for crop-hail adjustors on growth and development of the corn plant and its reaction to several types of injury is given each year at the university.

The stage of growth when hail strikes is critical. Corn two feet tall or less will make a remarkable recovery with favorable moisture and fertility.

A complete loss of leaves at this stage has reduced yield as little as five percent under ideal conditions. Three years' data show complete leaf removal at early stages of growth delayed tasseling no more than one day.

Experts advise against destroying hail damaged corn in haste. Check your policy if insurance rules of adjustment. Consider the costs and lower prospective yields from late replanted corn.

"College Costs"

The biggest reason farm youth decide against college is because they figure they can't afford it. An increasing number of farm parents are willing to go into debt to send their children to college.

Money alone isn't the only barrier to college education for rural youth. A lack of information keeps many a farm boy and girl out of school. Students in rural high schools need better vocational counseling, for one thing. They need to be made aware of the amount of education it takes to qualify for technical and vocational careers and of the advantages of making an investment in education.

But even with better guidance programs, many more low-interest loans will have to be made available to help rural youth get the training they need to compete in today's labor market.

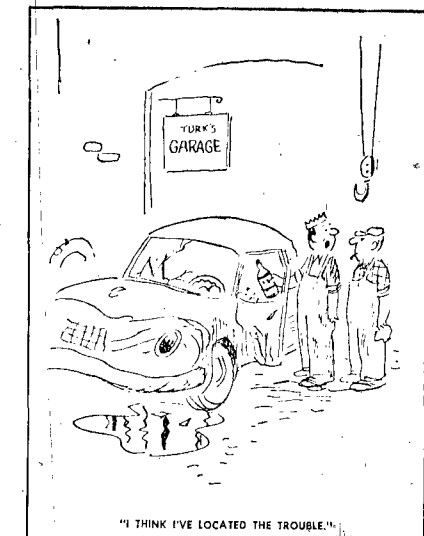
After Tulip Time

If you didn't get as many large blooms from your tulips as you had in this year, they probably need replanting. A few small flowers are a sign of overcrowding. Digging the bulbs should be delayed until the leaves turn yellow.

To be sure they are ready, uncover a few without disturbing them. The bulb coat should be light brown.

Keep the bulb out of direct sunlight, particularly just after digging. Spread them in shallow trays and dry them in an airy, shaded spot.

When the outer scales are dry, move the bulbs to a cool, dry, dimly lit area—your garage or cellar. Be sure not to leave any

soil on the bulbs during storage. In early fall when the bulbs are dry—separate those that have formed clumps.

Plant the bulbs in October or November in Nebraska.

Efficient Use of Dishwashers

Your automatic dishwasher will do its job if you use it properly. Agricultural Research Home Economists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture have made recommendations for more efficient automatic dishwashing. These recommendations are based on performance studies of various dishwashers.

If the machine's cycle provides two separate washes and several rinses, usually there is no need to scrape and rinse the dishes before loading. If the dishwasher cycle provides only one wash and two or three rinses, the dishes should be scraped and rinsed before putting them into the machine. The job of scraping and rinsing can be eliminated by following this procedure:

1. Stop the machine after the wash and first rinse.

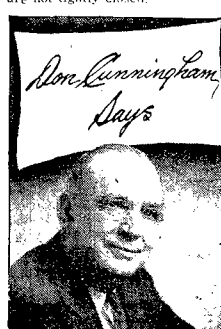
2. Add a second measure of washing compound and reset the control for the complete cycle.

Three "musts" should be considered when using automatic dishwashers:

Be sure that water temperature is at least 140 degrees F at the source. If the water tank is small, schedule dishwashing at times when hot water is not needed for laundering or bathing.

Never use a hand dishwashing detergent or laundry detergent in a mechanical dishwasher. The speed of the washing mechanism will create a volume of suds which may cause flooding or even damage to the machine.

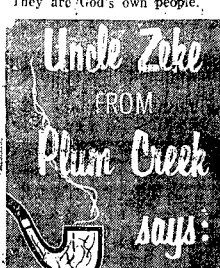
Researchers suggest trying several of the special dishwashing compounds to find the one best suited to local water conditions. Store the washing compound in a tightly closed container. Dishwasher compounds are affected by moisture and will deteriorate rapidly if containers are not tightly closed.

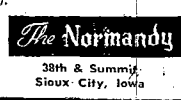

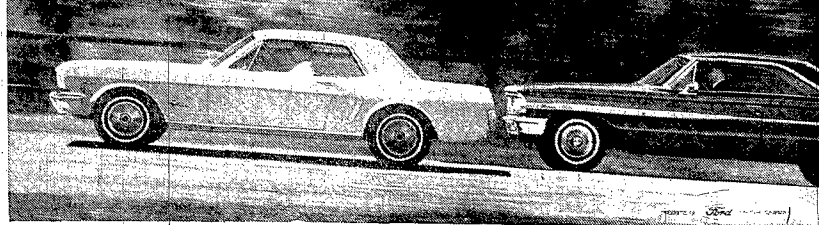
