## Credit Bureau Service Available for Wayne

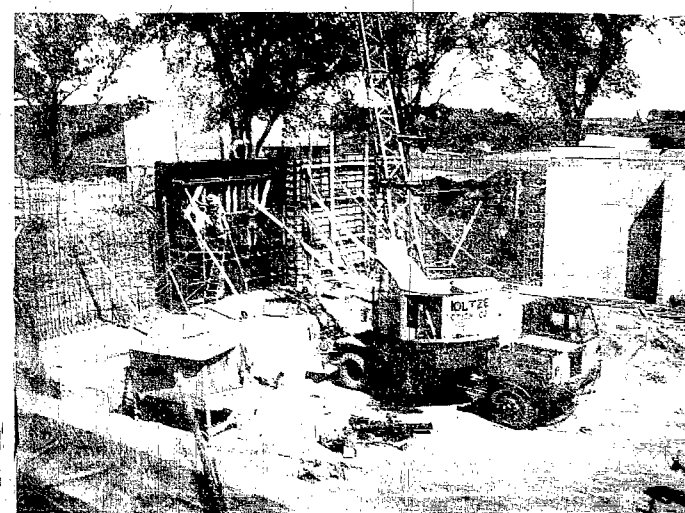
Wayne businessmen have organized a credit bureau service with a direct line to the Norfolk Credit Bureau office. Bob Merchant was named president of the Wayne group.

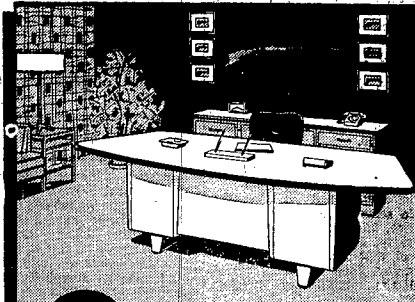

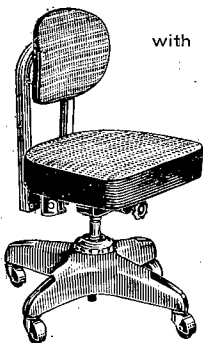

Reifenrath will enter the 100 and 220; Humpal the shot put and discus. Under the pressure of such competition both could improve their own Wayne records in any of the four events.

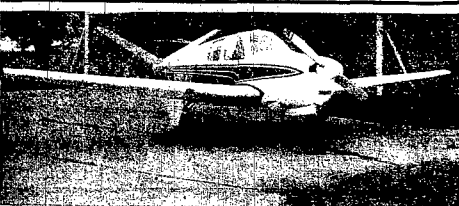
