

If there is a crimigal violation of laws affecting social security, it could mean a fine and imprisonment. The director called latention to a sentence imposed in Des Moines on a social security beneficiary who did not report that she had remarried.

A lady who was receiving social security payments on the account of her deceased husband, remarried. She did not report this to the Social Security Administration, as the law requires, but leontinued to receive and cash her checks.

The case was brought before the Federal District Court at Des Moines by the U. S. Altorney. As a result, this remarried widow served 30 days in fail and was released on condition that she pay \$50.00 per month for 36 months into the Social Security Trust.



Feeder Says Industry Overproducing

Editor's Note: The cattle industry — a vital sigment of Northeast Nebraska's economy has been taking a beating for the last 20 months. The "Why?" of the crisis has been the subject of speculation by politicians, editors and commendators bankers and businessmen. They have attempted to place the blame on excessive imports of beel, monopolistic buying practice of grocery stoles and overgroduction for the current depressed market. In the next few weeks it will be our intent to examine this cattle crisis. Not as experts for my haven't the experience to comment intelligently on is complicated a business. Rather, it is our intent to quote experts themselves. Economists, men engaged in the retail meat industry, government officials and feeders themselves. Eth have definite opinions on the reasons for the declining prices of beef cattle. Our series will quote these men. We then believe the reader's should form their own opinions.

Renneth Monfort, a partner in the largest cittle feeding concern in the world, expressed his opinion at a meeting in Fot Collins, Colorado recently, le blames himself and other cattle feeders. His domments were carried in the Greeley Tribune.

"The whole industry is overproducing for its market," Monfort asserts, "Feeders mark thuit, feeding cattle past their best market weights and finish and must become highly realistic about the prices market weights and finish and must be market weights and finish and must be market weights eabout the price of the product of the price of the product of the price of the product of the price of the product all the beef that our growing and affluent population will desire and demand.

Future Prosperity

"I believe that those of us that can survive the next three or four years, whether we he rancher or feeder may look forward to greater prosperity." Monfort said "We have seen a decline in choice cattle prices in the past months of over 30 per cent.

"Most cattle feeders have suffered consecutive losses on two or three crops of fed cattle. Cattle feeders have lost the bulk of their equity. Many are being forced to quit feeding. Many others are mortgaging their real estate in an effort to stay in the business or even to pay off current borrowings. The banks in every case taking a long hard look at the industry."

Political Plumb

Monfort charges that politicians are having a field day with the cattle situation. "Each and every one of them is birsy proving to the cattle industry that he is its staunchest supporter. Six mouths ago these elected officials didn't know a steer from a heifer but now they have become experts on the entire beef business," he continued.

"We must make changes to exist," Monfort asserts. "These changes don't involve import quota or chain store investigations. They involve us, the cattle feeders, who must look at our own industry."

Monfort asserts that foreign imports are not the cause of current problems. He points out that in 1962, a bumper year for cattle feeders, imports were al-so at an all-time high.

"Another factor in the very important picture that is seldom mentioned is that of our exports. Very little beef is exported. However, large ambunts of beef byproducts are exported. The dollar value of these beef exports, I admit, is not as large as the value of our beef imports. imports.
"However, I honestly believe that the

"However, I honestly believe that the net effect of imports and exports upon the cattle industry is a plus. The loss of our export market in hides alone would cost an estimated \$4. per animal. A similar loss of market on other items such as tallow, livers and ox-tails-would undoubtedly be great. I just cannot possibly believe that beef imports have hurt us that much," he declared.

Monfort said the industry would be naive to believe that imports of one item could be drastically reduced without eventually causing a curtailment of other export items.

out eventually causing a curtailment of other export items. About wholesale buying practices, Monfort said "I think it best that we understand that basically the grocer is indeed on the side of the producer."

Feels Stores Fair

Monfort said he feels a chain store investigation will prove that most stores operate in the best interests of the industry and the nation.

"My fear of such an investigation is that in being handled in the wrong way, it might easily make the American people think that they were being 'taken' when they buy beef. This would' be a disaster for our business.

"I also question the morality of such an investigation without some proof of possible market fixing or collusion. I know that I would have been highly irritated if in October 1962 the government had investigated our industry for making too much money and creating beef that was too costly." Monfort pointed out.

What can the cattlement do not better.

what can the cattleman do to better What can the cattleman do to better his lot? Monfort thinks it should be made less appealing for the rancher to build up tremendous cow numbers. He suggests doing away with capital gains on dows that have already been depreciated.

Aid Not Immoral

"Let the 'cow business rever't to the hands of the true producer and take" it out of the hands of the tax gimmick people." he urged.

Monfort also favors types of government aid. "A large portion of our industry believes that any government help is immoral. To me, government help was established to help its citizens when they cannot help themselves. I believe this is the situation we are rapidly approaching.

"Assistance from the government can take many forms. I have mentioned repeal of capital gains on cows. There is also room for other tax revisions that might be beneficial. Beef buying programs for the armed forces and school lunch programs should be funded and ready for immediate expansion.

"Perhaps there is room for a large scale beef program in connection with the announced war on poverty. Perhaps

lle beef program in connection with announced war on poverty. Perhaps should take an extensive new look at beef grading," he said.

Under the new sctup of issuing commissions, none is given out without the prior approval of Budig's office. "This hasn't been the case in the past," he said.

In addition to establishing a quota, Budig would also like to have some specific requirements for eligibility. "In other words," he added, "We would like to restore some meaning and prestige to the commissions. Back in Governor Griswold's time, it was an event worthy of good newspaper coverage when someone was made an admiral. In those days they were quite selective and when someone was commissioned, it had much more meaning and impact."

The Griswold system contrasted.

The Griswold system contrasted sharply with those employed by some succeeding governors. During one two-month period, Budig said, the late governor Anderson issued 599 admiral certificates.

At any rate, the applications for membership have snowballed to the point where Budig said the brakes had to be applied.

He acknowledged the certificates can be "very effective" as a public relations and promotional gimmidk. He said many senators and congressmen from the Midwest area have commissions "and, they display them proudly. Oddly, the greatest demand comes from out of the state. We get a lot of requests from Washington, D. C.

But he reiterated that regardless of where the requests.

But he reiterated that regard-less of where the requests come from, the number of commissions issued in the future will be limissued in the future will be limited strictly to 20 per week or less. "The average in recent weeks has been running about 16," he said somewhat proudly. "After the first of the year we'd like to cut the number to 10 a week," he haid.

Budig seemed to mean it when he said that the matter of issu-ing admiral's certificates "we've become real stingy."

The Wayne County Said Conservation District has completed records for the 1984 tree planting season. Trees were planted on 44 differient cooperators farms. Some of these plaquings consisted of two or three rows of confers on the north and west sides of existing windbreaks. This prevents snow and surface winds from blowing through the windbreak.

Completely new farmstead wind-breaks were planted on the farms of Noel Bennett, Paol Sievers, Marty Willers, Marvin Dunklau, Victor Kniesche, Khyne; Carl Berg, Dick Carstens, Alvin Schmode, Winside; Duane Bohn, Rendolph; Ed Fork, Kearney Lackas, Carroll; and Emil Greve, Wakefield. Approximately: 20,000 trees were planted this spring and about half of these were conifers.

Planting the trees is just part of the job of establishing a windbreak Keeping thee windbreak keeping thee windbreak free of weeds is essential in starting trees.
